The World Series stands a tie with total attendance of over 95,000 and receipts of \$366,473.00.

Kent county watermen are practically unanimous in expressing the sentiment that the bivalve industry would doubtless be improved by eliminating the month of September from the open season. Those who oppose the new movement to prevent the catching of oysters throughout the entire month of September, are of the opinion that at least the first two weeks could be dispensed with without injuring either the profits or prospects of tongers or packers.

But fully ninety per cent of the watermen are outspoken in favor of eliminating one "month" from the oyster calendar. They admit that this will shatter an age-old custom, but are equally emphatic in voicing the belief that the change, in the long run, will be highly beneficial to the oyster industry.

Farmers own 3,821,085 of all automobiles operated in the United States, according to automobile trade statistics. Of these, 3,453,159 are passenger cars and 367,926 motor trucks. Iowa leads all the other States in the number of farmer-owned cars with 219,854. Texas is second with 207,384 and Illinois third with 195,788, followed by Ohio with 192,080, Pennsylvania with 191,793 and New York with 178,019. In the proportion of automobiles to farm population, the figures show, California is first with one car to every 3.8 farm people. Then comes Nebraska with 4.3, Iowa 4.5, New York 4.6, Pennsylvania 5.2, and Ohio 5.9. For the United States, including the negro farm population, the average is one automobile to every 8.1 farm people. The average in cities of 100,000 population or over is one car to every 8.3 people. In New York and Chicago the average is one to every 15.5. Use of the automobile on the farm is increasing rapidly. It is estimated that farmers will buy 1,119,500 automobiles in 1925 at a cost of \$864,760,245.

A movement is on foot to build a new fire house in Chestertown rather than undertake to enlarge the present quarters.

Henry W. Catlin, Esq., of New York and Chestertown, will make one of the principal addresses today in New York at the planting of a tree in Central Park, New York in honor of Gov. Albert C. Ritchie, of Maryland. The tree is planted in the "Living Honor Grove" of Central Park.

The Living Honor Grove Society of New York will have charge of the exercises and all Marylanders have been invited to be present to form an Honor Guard for the reception of the Governor of our State. Every State in the Union will sooner or later have a tree planted in Central Park, New York, in honor of its Governor.
