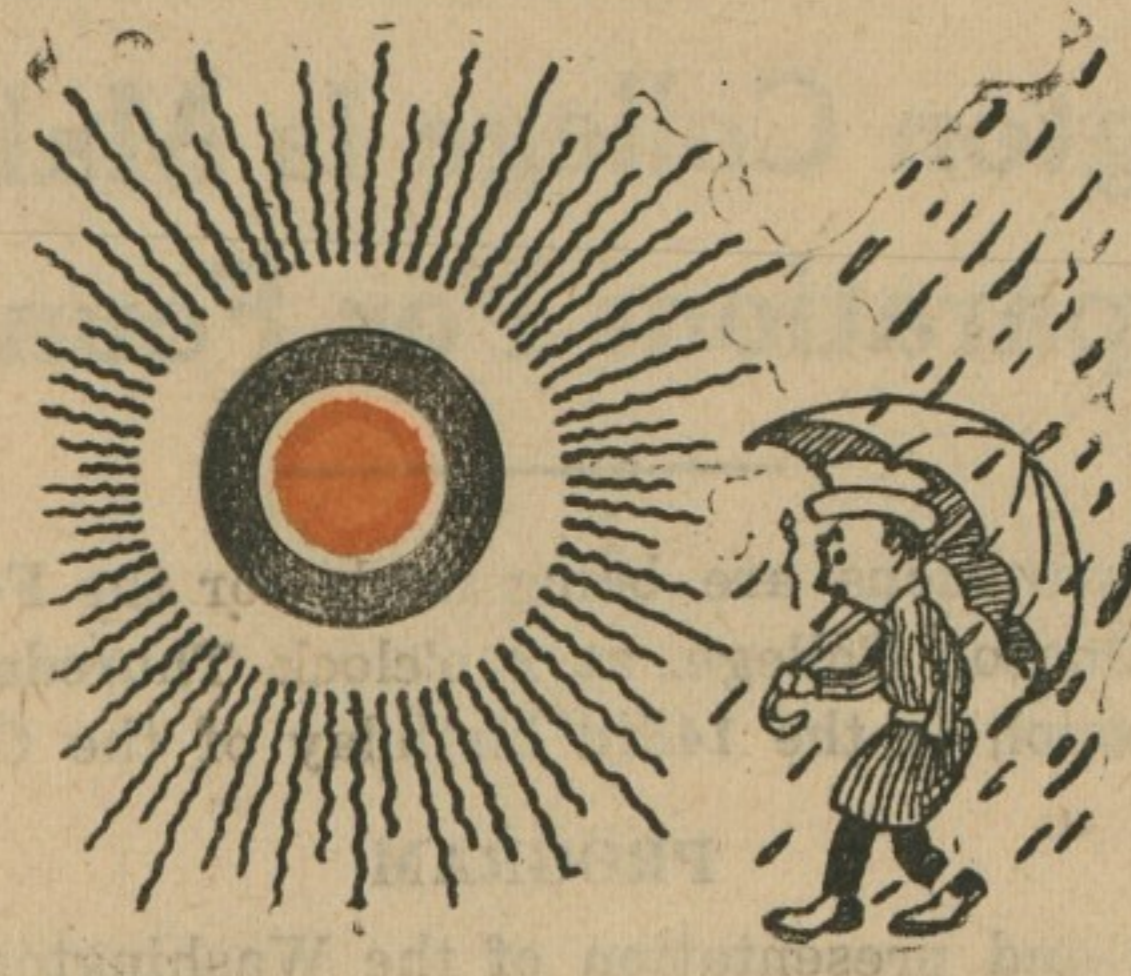


**The Past Week In

the county be represented. Chester M. Davis, of Washington College, spent the week-end with his parents here.

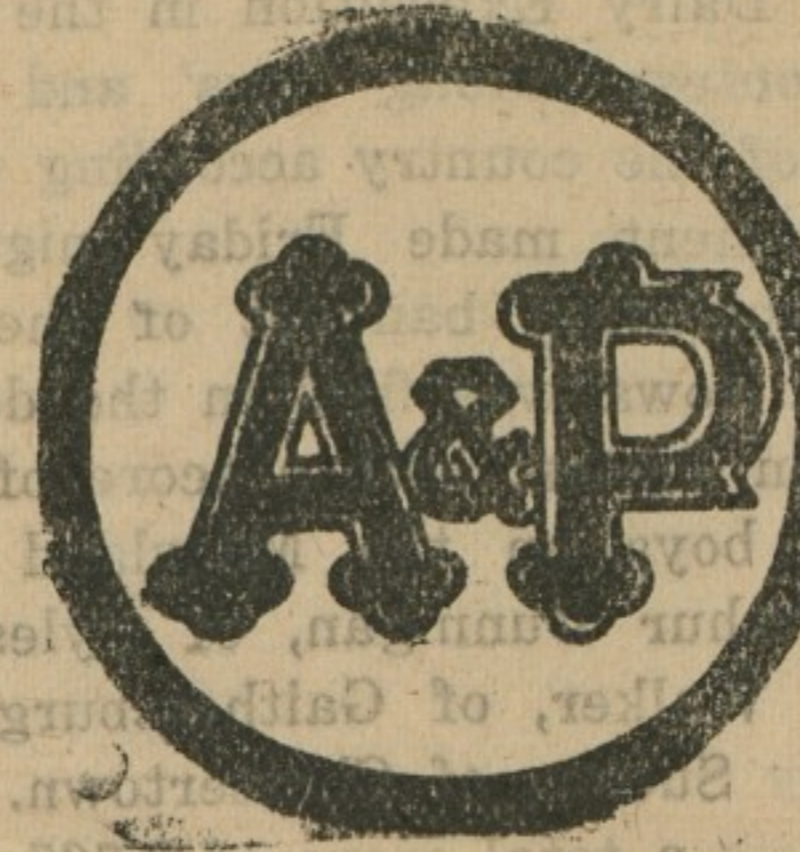

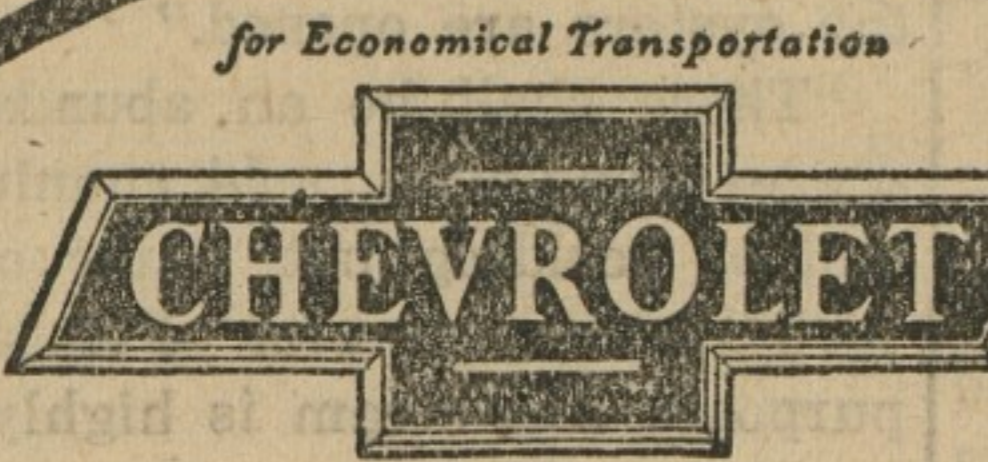

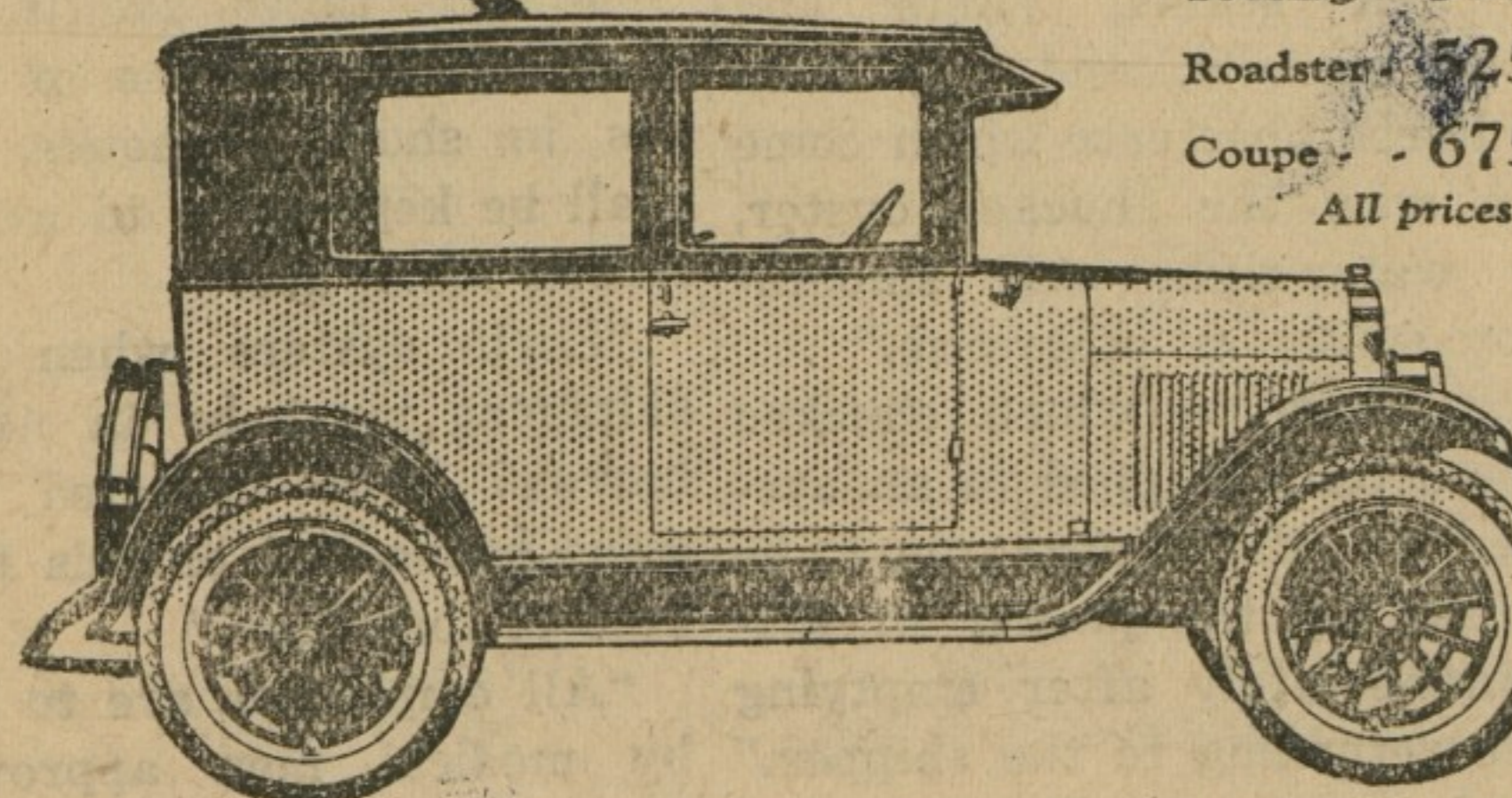
