SHEEP KILLINGS
STIR FARMERS

William B. Willis, a farmer living on Worton Point farm, ten miles from Chestertown, presented a bill for \$96 to the Board of County Commissioners Tuesday for the loss of sixteen valuable sheep killed by dogs. The law requires the commissioners to reimburse the owners of sheep to the extent of \$6 a piece when killed by dogs, but this amount is said to be insufficient to cover the owners' loss.

Edmund B. Hurt, living near Locust Grove, is reported to have suffered a heavy loss of sheep the same night. He will also present a bill to the commissioners for his loss.

Since July 1 the commissioners have paid owners of livestock and poultry \$1130 for damage caused by dogs allowed to roam at large, and there is a strong sentiment among the taxpayers for a law making the owners of such dogs liable for the damage done to farmers' property. Last week Charles H. Crew's entire flock of young turkeys was torn to pieces, and Wm. J. Biggers, who lives near Millington, lost fifteen turkeys in one raid and ten in another.

CIRCUIT COURT WILL FINISH TODAY
Friday Afternoon

State vs. Dudley Everett, presented for carrying concealed weapons. Plead guilty. Sentence suspended. S. S. Beck for State; H. W. Vickers for Everett.

State vs. Oscar Berry for larceny. Plead not guilty. Jury trial. Verdict not guilty. S. S. Beck for the State; Thomas F. Bernard for Berry.

State vs. Bernard Wagner for larceny. Plead not guilty. Court trial. Verdict not guilty. S. S. Beck for State; Stephen R. Collins, for Wagner.

State vs. Thomas Johnson for shooting Frank Johnson. Plead not guilty. Jury trial. Verdict guilty. Sentenced to three years in Maryland Penitentiary. S. S. Beck for State; Thomas F. Healey for Johnson.

Monday
Court convened at 9.30 with Judges L. W. Wickes and Thomas J. Keating on the bench. The trial of J. K. Lynch for forgery, which was moved from Caroline county was taken up and continued until Wednesday night when the jury returned a verdict of not guilty.

This was an interesting case in that it was a family affair. Two brothers married two sisters. The case was that of John K. Lynch, of Caroline county land owner and political leader, charged with forging the name of his brother, D. C. Lynch on notes to the amount of \$8,000 of the Bank of Ridgely.

The defense attorneys produced most of the 102 character witnesses, consisting of well-known business and professional men and farmers of Caroline county, who testified as to the general standing of the accused. This testimony was used in support of a plea that the brothers had a mutual agreement to indorse each other's financial paper.

The difficulty arose, it is alleged after John K. Lynch indorsed obligations incurred by his son during the war. The defendant is sixty-three years old.

S. S. Beck assisted State's Attorney Thawley in prosecuting the case while H. W. Vickers and W. F. Russell, Jr., assisted Messrs. Owens and Richards in the defense. All of these gentlemen made strong pleas for their respective sides.

WEDDING NOTES
L. Bates Russell, Jr., and Miss Ruth R. Clark, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. Frank Clark, were quietly married Tuesday evening at the parsonage, Kennedyville, by Dr. J. W. Trout. The bride for a number of years past has been secretary to Dr. Paul E. Titworth, at Washington College. The groom is associated with and General Manager of the Noland-Bennett-Russell Motor Company. The young couple will, as soon as improvements are completed occupy the apartments of the N-B-R Garage.

The wedding of William Russell Pennington and Miss Anna U. Donohoe, of Philadelphia, took place at the Chestertown M. E. Parsonage on Monday noon, Rev. T. J. Sard officiating. The groom is a nephew of Mrs. George Cooper and Mrs. G. Frank Clark and the couple stopped a few minutes at their homes on Kent Circle after the ceremony.

The hunting season will open in Kent Tuesday, November 10th and ducks and geese on Monday. All over the county and State gunners are telling of the abundance of game, especially rabbits and partridges. On the Shore there have been many stories told of large flocks of pheasants.

The dry spring made life worth living for the young rabbits. Their warrens have not been flooded and they have lived in comfort. The same is true of the quail, and there is scarcely a road in the rural section where automobiles are not being held up by mother quail with their families, now approaching full growth.

It has been a long time since pheasants have been reported in coveys. Occasionally stories have been told of one or two pheasants being seen in isolated spots, but this year sixteen or eighteen in a covey are reported.

The only damage done to game this year has been that perpetrated by the hordes of stray dogs and cats that infest the wooded lands, prey upon the young and helpless game. This tale is told in practically every county in the State. Dogs do more harm to game than the elements, and the lovers of the sport, despairing of any other aid to relieve the situation, have started a war with guns upon canines. They are reported shooting dogs caught in the act of despoiling game.

The ravages of dogs are probably worse in the Octoraro Hills, in Cecil and Harford counties, than in any other part of the State. A herd of deer tried to establish itself in the recesses. They escaped the hunters and still operators, but dogs could not be eluded. Four fawns were seen there last season, but they have disappeared. A fawn was found drowned at the mouth of the Elk river, with marks of dog teeth on its throat and body. Nine deer were reported together in Charlestown barrens last year. So far, there has been no report of their having been seen in 1925.

For some weeks owners and renters of the ducking shores along the bay and rivers have been repairing clubhouses, strengthening blinds and baiting shores in anticipation of a fine season. From the head of the Sassafras river, along the bay shore and as far up as Chestertown may be seen the happy hunting grounds of the gunners who are anxious to get after the ducks.

More good ducks have been feeding in Chester river during the early fall than for some years.

Besides the usual supply of early ducks, gunners in the Chester river get full benefit of the migration from the Susquehanna Flats.

For the first time in many years wild geese will be found by the thousands. Reports indicate the advance guard already here is larger than at any time in the last 20 years.

Pin-tail ducks have already taken up their abode all over the State. Canvas-backs are seen in large numbers in Eastern bay, Tar bay and Fishing bay, while the black ducks, mallards and green-wing teal are too numerous to attempt any count.

But it is over the presence of the wild geese that Warden LeCompte is becoming enthusiastic. At the head of Tar bay, he says, they can be found by the hundreds, while Hoopers Island and Sinepuxent bay, at Ocean City, report huge flocks.

Gunners will begin to derive the benefit of the protective measures we have thrown around wild fowl in Maryland when they take up the sport on the opening of the season, November 1 next.

"Ducks will be plentiful, and what is rare, there will be large flocks of wild geese.

"Part of this is due to the enforcement of the laws against ruthless killing of these birds and also thru the fact we are benefiting by the action of Canada in setting aside 250,000 square miles of territory as a game preserve where the geese and wild ducks propagate during the mating season before they start their flight South.

"From now on we may expect large numbers of wild fowl annually."

AUTOMOBILE BURNED
James Cotton, a colored employee of Miller Strong, near Rock Hall, was surprised to find upon awakening Sunday morning that his automobile had been set on fire and destroyed. James sleeps on the Strong farm and awoke during the night and saw a light, but supposing it to be from Mr. Strong's car as he drove up to the house went to sleep. Mr. Strong and wife spent the night with the miscreant, Edgar.

The miscreant had come to the garage, pushed the car outside and set it on fire. The footprints of the man's shoe could be plainly seen as he slipped on the wet ground. Officers are at work on the matter and have some valuable leads. Fortunately no buildings took fire.

THINKS KENT TAX ASSESSMENT LOW
The State Tax Commission believes that Kent, along with four or five other counties, has an unequal or insufficient tax assessment.

Aware of the inequalities in the percentage of assessed value to true value of real property among the counties, and particularly between the counties and the city, members of the State Tax Commission agree that the task of equalizing assessments throughout the State has not been accomplished.

They refer to the increases in assessments obtained in the counties through the supervision of the commission over reassessments in 1923 and in 1918 as evidence that the commission has succeeded, in a measure, in bringing about conditions by which the counties are bearing more of their equitable share of the State tax burden than they did in other years.

The inequalities which exist despite this supervision are attributed by the commission primarily to the fact that reassessments in the counties are made by inexperienced men once in five years, while trained assessors are at work reassessing continuously in the city. A second cause, the commission declares, is the fact that assessments are made by county boards of commissioners on individual properties, and that the assessors are appointed by the County Commissioners to assess the districts in which they live.

The News cannot agree with the State Tax Commission. The farm lands in Kent and Queen Anne's are assessed far beyond the price they bring at public sale.
