We are reliably informed that the Governor has not named a successor as Secretary of State to Mr. Lee, so that the report that Ridgely Melvin, Esq., had been named is a mistake.

President Coolidge has proclaimed Thursday, November 26, as Thanksgiving Day, when gratitude should be expressed for "many and great blessings" which have come to the people during the past year.

Speeding over a three-kilometer straightaway course at Bay Shore Tuesday, Lieutenant "Jimmy" Doolittle, premier United States Army pilot and winner of the Schneider Cup race, broke the world speed record for seaplanes by flying at a rate of 245.713 miles an hour. The Modest Little Army pilot made his new record in the black Curtis racer with which he won the great international air classic Monday. By flying at a rate of 232.573 miles an hour in the Schneider Cup race Lieutenant Doolittle broke the seaplane speed record, but yesterday his speed was more than thirteen miles an hour greater than over the triangular course of Monday.

The present day need of the American youth is "more home control through parental action." President Coolidge declared in addressing the forty-second international Christian Associations of the United States and Canada.

Describing the home as "the corner stone of the nation" the President declared that control of the nation's youth from this source is preferable "to attempt in some way" to constantly increase "the government's responsibility for the rearing of children."

"Too many people" he continued "are neglecting the real well-being of their children, shifting the responsibility for their actions and turning over supervision of their discipline and conduct to scholars."

"It is stated on high authority that a very large proportion of the outcasts and criminals form the ranks of those who lost the advantages of normal parental control by their youth. They are refugees from broken homes who were denied the necessary parental love and direction."

"It is not enough that there should be action in the pulpits—there must be reaction in the pews. It will not be sufficient to have exalted preaching by the clergy unless there is exalted living by the laity."
