HOW TELEPHONES HELP THE PRESS

"GET THE FACTS" High-Speed News Gathering Has Been Made Possible By Use Of Wire Reporting

The important part played by the telephone in getting out a large city newspaper is shown in the case of the Chicago Daily Tribune, where an average of 22,606 telephone calls is made for on a day's issue of the paper.

"Number, please?" Not only is the telephone of the greatest value to editorial workers, the reporters and the city desk, where it is a vital time-saving factor, but it is equally important to the advertising department. On a recent Friday and Saturday the Chicago Tribune received as many as 3,963 want ads entirely by telephone. To handle the immense amount of telephone inquiries, a special machine switching system was installed this year.

In this connection it is interesting to note that the first public demonstration of the invention of the telephone by Dr. Alexander Graham Bell was participated in by an enterprising newspaper reporter. The demonstration took place in Salem, eighteen miles from Boston, on February 12, 1877, and an enterprising representative of the Boston Globe telephoned an account of the demonstration to his newspaper, which was printed the next morning. Thus the first telephone newspaper dispatch was printed.

Today, in all the important cities, there is a corps of newspaper reporters who never, or hardly ever, write a single line of copy. Their duty is to secure the news and get it to the newspapers. They telephone the facts to the city desk, which assigns a writer usually known as a "rewrite man" who jots down the facts and prepares his "story" in his own way, but the man in the field is no less a news writer than is the man at the desk who takes the points as they are telephoned, and weaves them into newspaper copy.

A TELEPHONE PIONEER

W. T. Williamson, Vice-President, With Headquarters At Charleston.

One of the popular telephone officials of the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company of West Virginia is W. T. Williamson, vice-president, whose headquarters are at Charleston.

Mr. Williamson entered the service of the Southern Bell Telephone and Telegraph Company as manager of the Charleston office, January 1, 1901, but was soon promoted to assistant superintendent. Later he was made superintendent of the Southern West Virginia district.

In 1912 when the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company took over the properties of the Bell Company in West Virginia, Mr. Williamson was made division manager for the State. He has been a director of the company since July 20, 1916.

He was active in bringing about the merger of the Central District, Consolidated, and Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Companies in 1917.

On February 16, 1923, Mr. Williamson was elected vice-president of the company. He is a member of the Telephone Pioneers of America.

Mr. Williamson is active in church work. He has twice represented the West Virginia Conference in the General Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church and is now a member of the World Service Commission of that Church. He is also a member of the Board of Trustees of West Virginia Wesleyan College at Buckhannon, West Virginia.

"John N. Cadby, executive-secretary of the Wisconsin Utilities Association, has completed a survey estimating the average daily value of telephone service to the average farmer in Wisconsin and presents his calculations in the following form," says the Public Service Magazine.
