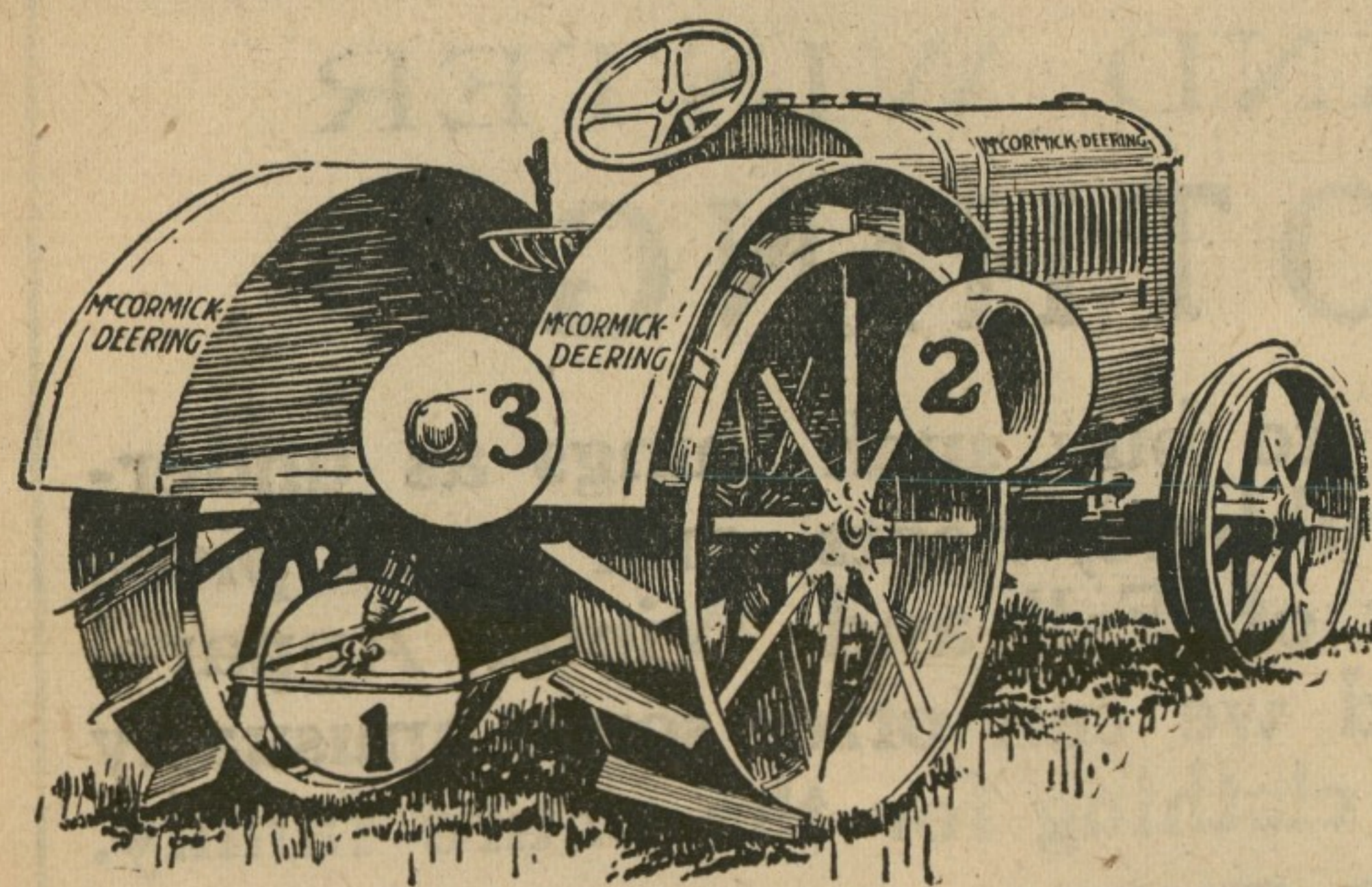

HOGAN'S EXPRESS WANTS TO RUN TO CENTREVILLE

That the Public Service Commission will decline to grant a franchise for the operation of a freight bus line into Centreville, in competition with the Baltimore and Eastern Railroad, is the confident expectation of Centreville business men, following the hearing in Baltimore on Thursday when petitions were presented, couched in definite and unmistakable terms, urging that nothing be done which might result in the abandonment of steam freight service between Centreville and Queenstown.

Queen Anne's county was officially represented by Thomas R. L. Price, of the Board of County Commissioners, and John M. Mason, of the Board of Town Commissioners.

Hogan's Express was represented by Attorney John D. Urie, of Chestertown, and Haley, DeGrief and Halep, had as counsel, Atty. Maurice W. Zepin, of Baltimore. No decision will be rendered in the case for several days, due to the fact that Attorney Urie requested an extension of time to prepare a brief for submission to the Commissioners.

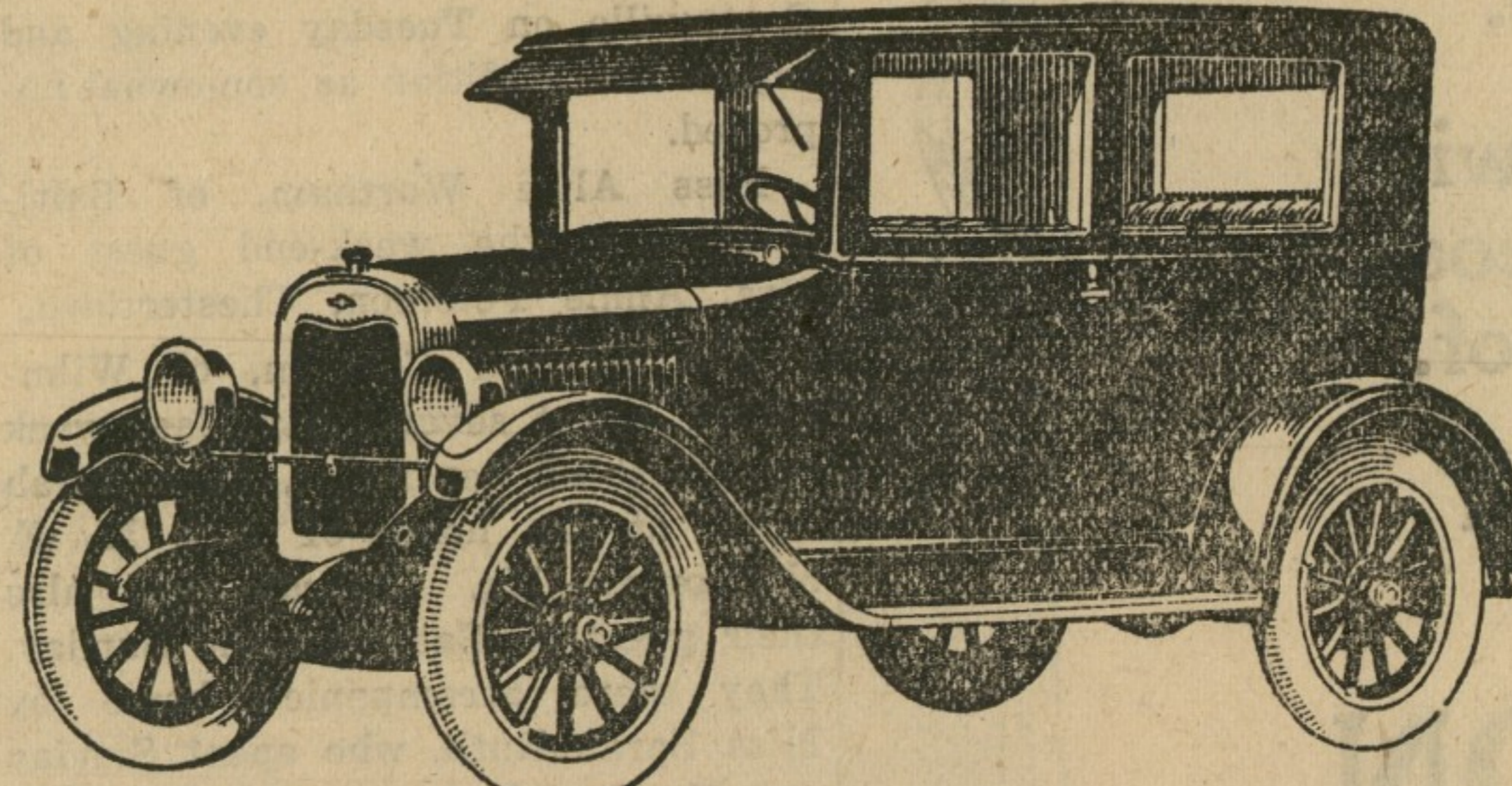
