3. Saddle Class. To be shown at walk, trot and canter and to be judged on conformation, manners and performance. Conformation to count 25 per cent; manners 50 per cent; performance 25 per cent. Prizes same as above.
4. Suitable to become hunters. Shown over four 3 ft. jumps to be judged on performance and manners. Prizes same as above.
5. Handy Hunter. Prizes same as above.
6. Open Hunter. Four ft. jumps. To be judged on manners and performance. Prizes same as above.
7. Open Hunter. Four ft. 6 in. jumps. To be judged on performance only. Prizes same as above.
8. Flat Race. Over about a mile. Prizes same as above.

Julian C. Numbers, of Parlin, N. J., visited his parents, Mr. and Mrs. F. C. Numbers, last Sunday.

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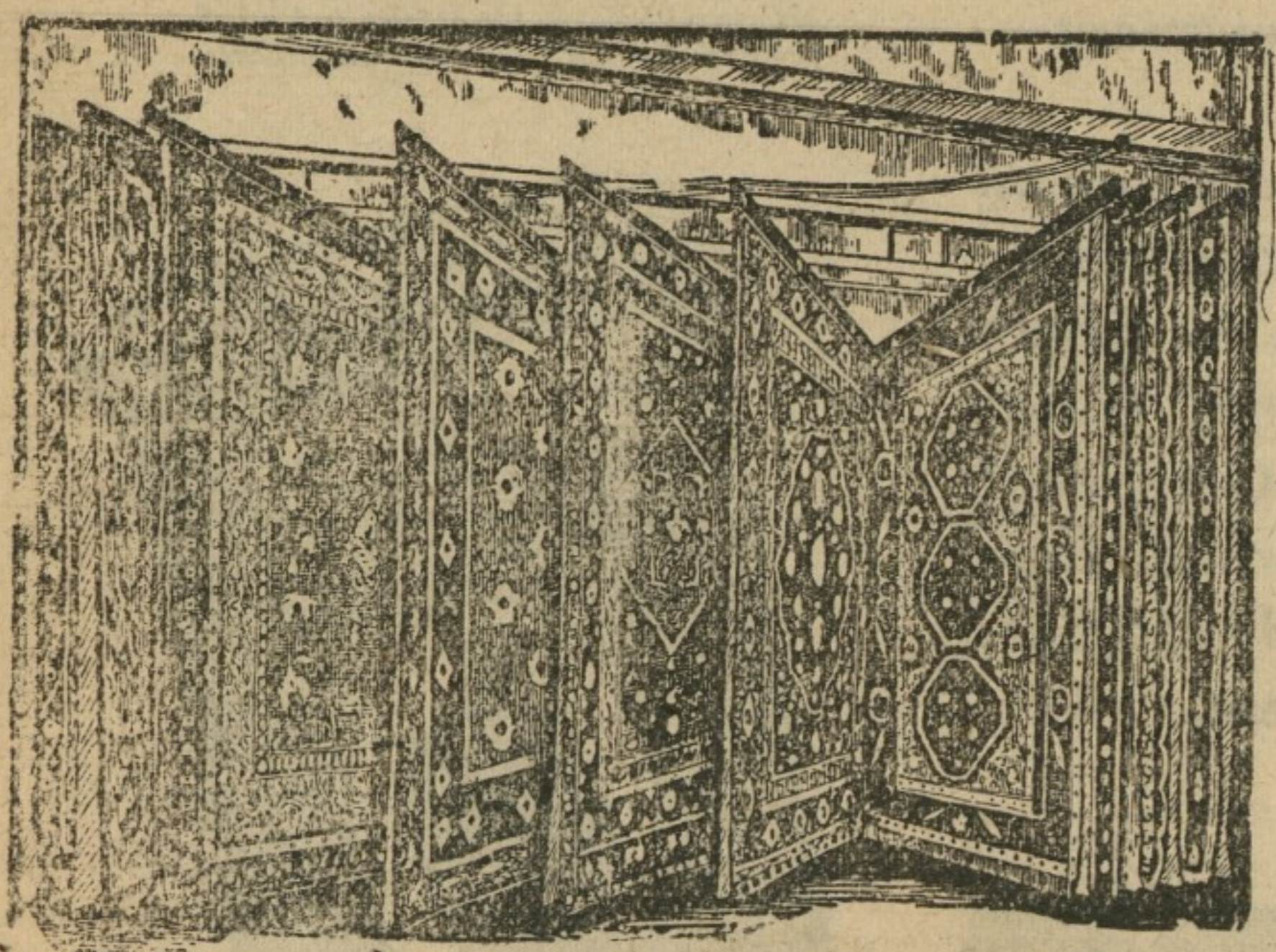
