TRAINED LIBRARIAN AT THE COLLEGE

Washington College is now to have a full-time, trained librarian on its staff.

Every since the College has had a library, it has been in charge of a member of the faculty who was carrying full work in his department. With student help Prof. William R. Howell, the present librarian, has put the college library in excellent shape. Yet the growing number of books and the enlarged student body at the College and the consequent increased use of the library have long made desirable and now make imperative a trained worker who can give entire attention to this, one of the most important phases of college work.

Miss Bahnie Wedekind, of Fowler, Cal., who has been selected as librarian, comes, despite her very German name, from long-time and thoroughly American stock, was a student for three years at Davis and Elkins College, Elkins, W. Va., transferred then to the University of West Virginia, from which institution she was graduated. She since studied at the University of California and has completed her residence work at the University of Illinois for her M. A. degree.

While a student at Davis and Elkins, she organized the college library and acted for two years as librarian. She was assistant librarian at the University of West Virginia. Also, at Davis and Elkins, she started a Y. W. C. A. She has taught in elementary and high school and in college. Interested in English, she has written and published several short stories and has had some of her one-act plays presented by amateur groups.

The College believes itself very fortunate in securing as its librarian a young woman of such character, ability, and training as Miss Wedekind. She will begin her duties on November 14.

\$600,000 IN BEQUESTS WILLED

James Gambrell who died recently in Wilmington made bequests of \$600,000.00. Grace Church gets an endowment of \$100,000. The Board of Foreign Missions of the M. E. Church, \$100,000; Newark College of Newark, \$100,000; Trustees of Dickinson College, Carlisle, Pa., \$100,000. These bequests became effective at the death of the principal heir to the estate, whose name the executors would not disclose. Other bequests to become effective at the death of other heirs follow: Morgan College, colored, Maryland, \$20,000; Newark College, \$5,000; Lincoln University of Pennsylvania, \$10,000. Outright bequests included in the will which will be settled as soon as possible by the executors follow: Peninsula M. P. Church, Wilmington, \$5,000; Dickinson College, Carlisle, \$50,000, the income to be used only in educating young men for the ministry.
