Hardell, Hood, and Lambdin  
Have a Direct Appeal  
to the Public.

"Hark! the numbers soft and clear,

Plucking music from the air is a popular pastime during the long winter evenings. Radio programs now include well balanced selections of music, both vocal and instrumental, sermons, talks and other interesting features that have a direct appeal to the public. Listeners may frequently hear such popular artists as Everett S. Hardell, Miss Gretchen Hood and Arthur L. Lambdin, who have entertained from the studio of WCAP, over a network of stations that includes the eastern half of the United States.

Mr. Hardell has a mellow tenor voice, which is very popular with the radio audience. He studied music under Mme. Morey, at Boston, and Doctor Archibald P. Davison, at Harvard. While at the latter institution he was a member of the Harvard Glee Club.

The charming soprano voice of Gretchen Hood is also familiar to the radio audience. She is an artist of considerable note, and has studied music at home and abroad. While in Europe she was a student at the Brussels Conservatory in Belgium. Miss Hood has been heard frequently at the San Carlo Opera Company, and as a guest soloist with the United States Navy Band of Washington.

Mr. Lambdin has a baritone voice of unusual excellence. In the national capital he is well-known as a soloist in church choirs. Mr. Lambdin is district traffic superintendent of the Chesapeake and Potomac Telephone Company and studied music at the Peabody Institute in Baltimore.

### GETS JOHN SCOTT MEDAL

The City of Philadelphia has awarded to William G. Housekeeper, of the Bell Telephone Laboratories, New York, the John Scott medal for his contribution to technical progress. The award carries with it a premium of \$1,000 and is made by the City of Philadelphia from the proceeds of a fund left more than a hundred years ago by John Scott, of Edinburgh, Scotland.

The achievement for which the medal was awarded to Mr. Housekeeper is the development of a practical method for making an air-tight joint between copper and glass. It is used in broadcasting equipment manufactured by the Western Electric Company.
