HOME NEAR HERE DESTROYED BY FIRE

To be awakened near midnight and find your home enveloped in flames was the experience of Mr. and Mrs. R. Woodall Robinson, tenants on the farm owned by Harry P. Skipper, of Baltimore, at 3 a. m. Sunday. This farm lies on Chester river directly opposite Chestertown and the home in on Primrose Point. Mrs. Lewis W. Wickes was up at this hour and was the first to see the fire. She telephoned Claude Truslow thinking it was his home and he in turn notified Mr. Robinson. The house was totally destroyed together with all furniture and clothing with the exception of a few articles, causing a loss estimated at \$10,000, with insurance of \$3,000 on the residence and \$500 on contents and clothing. The inmates of the home, consisting of Mr. Robinson, his wife and two daughters, knew nothing of the fire until notified over the telephone. They had barely time to get out of the burning house in their night clothing, only grabbing up coats which were down stairs. The fire originated in the kitchen, but from what cause none of the family knows as there had not been any fire in the kitchen stove so far as Saturday evening. The Chestertown Fire Co. responded to the alarm and succeeded in preventing the flames from spreading to the outbuildings. Mr. Robinson and family are quartered for the present in a small tenant house on the farm. The eldest son was not at home at the time of the fire and he saved the suit and overcoat he wore, but lost a valuable gold watch given him for a graduation present last June. Mr. Robinson had a check for \$35 cashed on Saturday afternoon and placed the money in his trousers pocket which was burned.
