WILLIAM T. DIXON ENDS HIS LIFE AT GREEN POINT FARM, WORTON

A Shocking Tragedy In The Life Of A Young Man—Beautiful Home, Large Circle Of Friends—Happy Family Life—No Special Reason Can Be Assigned For The Act.—Interment In Baltimore.

This community was given another severe shock Wednesday when the tragic death of William Thomas Dixon at his home at Green Point was known to be a fact. Known to his associates as "Billy" he was a big-hearted, courteous and unselfish citizen and it was difficult to believe that he had taken his life.
Mr. Dixon was found by his wife lying on the floor of a second-floor porch used as a sleeping porch, about 9.30 a. m. Beside him lay a pistol. The bullet had been fired into his temple.
With his wife and friends gathered around him on the hope that he would revive sufficiently to explain the mystery, he died an hour later without regaining consciousness.

Dr. Harry L. Dodd, county coroner, and Dr. Henry G. Simpers and Frank B. Hines were summoned. Dr. Dodd said he was convinced Mr. Dixon took his own life. The only motive suggested was that Mr. Dixon at times was given fits of morose-ness.
His financial affairs and his family life were described as "the very best."

He lived for the past ten years on his farm "Green Point" where many social affairs of note were held, one of which was recently for benefit of Volunteer Fire Company.
"It is Kismet—I must die by my own hand," he declared a year ago to Jesse D. Maxwell, son of the former head of the Maxwell Motor Company and his nearest neighbor. That was on October 5, 1924, the day after his friend, Horace W. White, Jr., of the Green Spring Valley hunting set, had plunged to his death from a window of his office on the tenth floor of the Maryland Trust Building.

Dixon had telephoned to Mr. Maxwell, who hurried over to his house and found him reading the accounts of White's death.
Not long before that two other chums of Dixon and White—Donnell Stewart and Henry Rowland—had committed suicide under circumstances that never were fully explained.

The four had been chums from boyhood, had served together in the World War, had served in the same regiment—the One Hundred and Tenth Field Artillery, which was recruited largely in Baltimore and the nearby counties.
Dixon, one of the most jovial members of his set, was deeply depressed by the tragic deaths of his chums, and when he telephoned for Maxwell that morning he blurted out that he had determined "to finish it."

Funeral services were held Friday morning in the Greenmount Cemetery Chapel. The services were conducted by the Rev. Dr. Arthur E. Kinsolving of Old St. Paul's Protestant Episcopal Church.
The body was carried to Baltimore Thursday afternoon from the home at Green Point farm, ten miles from Chestertown. Services at the farm were conducted by the Rev. Dr. S. S. Hepburn, rector of the church of which Mr. Dixon was a member; C. E. Dodd, undertaker.
Mr. Dixon is survived by his widow, Mrs. Lillie Cristfield Dixon, and three children, William, Elizabeth and Josephine Dixon. A brother Isaac Dixon, Jr., six sisters, Mrs. H. Childs Frick, Mrs. H. Ridgely Simpson, Mrs. John L. Dorsey, Mrs. Horatio Turner and the Misses Catherine and Deborah Dixon, and his mother, Mrs. Elizabeth White Dixon, also survive.

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MANY AUTOMOBILE ACCIDENTS IN KENT

Harriet Lindsay, a 5-year-old colored girl, while crossing Maple avenue near Titter's Restaurant, about 9 o'clock Monday morning was struck by one of the Shore Transit Company's busses and instantly killed. Richard Schaubert was driving the bus and was enroute here from Centerville.

Coroner H. L. Dodd summoned a jury of inquest, who, after hearing the evidence, exonerated the driver. The evidence showed that the child had been to the store and ran in the road immediately in front of the accident and turned the bus so much as to strike the little girl with the rear wheel of the machine. Her skull was fractured.

William Cole, driving a Ford car, collided with an Eastern Shore bus driven by Peck Taylor on the draw of Chester bridge on Sunday. The bus side swiped the small car taking off fenders and running board.

French Skirven had a lucky escape with his life Saturday evening when he was in collision with another car driven by Eddie Patrick near College street. Both cars were injured but Mr. Skirvens was almost a complete wreck and yet neither driver was hurt.

MRS. J. HYDIE THOMPSON RUN OVER BY AUTOMOBILE
Mrs. J. Hydie Thompson was knocked down and run over by an automobile in Baltimore on Tuesday at about 12:30 o'clock. Mrs. Thompson with her husband had been doing some shopping in the business centre of the Monumental City, when she was struck and knocked down by an approaching automobile, the driver bringing his machine to an abrupt stop with the wheel resting on her foot. Mrs. Thompson was picked up and rushed to the hospital where an X-ray was taken of the foot, it being found that no bones, however, were broken. She was able to return to her home in Chestertown Tuesday evening and is nursing a badly bruised ankle and suffering somewhat from shock.
