TUBERCULOSIS DEAD CLAIMS 20 IN KENT

Active Cases in County Last Year Totaled Approximately 180.

According to records given out by the State Health Department there were 20 deaths in this county last year from tuberculosis, and there were approximately 180 active cases. Although the death rate from this disease has declined almost yearly since 1900, and has been more than cut in half, there still remains much to be done.

The vigorous campaign which is now being waged all over the country under the leadership of the National and State Tuberculosis Associations and their County Branches is for the purpose of raising funds with which to continue the combat against this terrible scourge.

More than 23,000,000 Tuberculosis Christmas Seals have been allotted to the State of Maryland, and the Maryland Tuberculosis Association and its County Branches are now making a special effort to dispose of this allotment of seals in this State.

Seventy per cent of all the returns collected in this county will remain in the county for health work. The thirty per cent which is sent to the State Association is used to help support the "Miracle House," at Claiborne, Md., and the regular monthly Tuberculosis Clinics which have been conducted by the State Association for more than a year.

FLAX GROWING PROPOSITION

Charles T. Gordon, director-general of James F. Low & Co., flax-spinning machinery manufacturers, of Monimeth, Scotland; William M. Watson and H. Edward Jefferson, of the firm of Edward Jefferson, textile machinery importers, of Philadelphia; Dr. L. C. Cope, representing London capitalists; Theodore H. Haughey, flax engineer, and Simon Friedberger, president, Sani-Knit Textile Mills, Philadelphia, and Mr. Hoy, of Wilmington, were in Chestertown recently investigating this territory as a suitable place in which to grow flax.

Dr. Cope, who represents the London syndicate, has made a study of climatic conditions necessary to the production of flax, and he states that in all of his travels and investigations he has found no locality in the United States more conducive to growing flax than the Eastern Shore of Maryland presents.

These men state that from two to three tons of flax is grown per acre and the price is \$20 per ton. The late Prof. Milton Melvin experimented with the growing of a small plot of flax and found it did finely.

"How Far That Little Candle Throws His Beams! So Shines a Good Deed in a Naughty World."

Hervey's "Book of Christmas," published in 1845 recounts that Christmas was once known as the "Feast of Lights," and that the rich had tall candles decorated with wreaths of evergreens. "There is always considerable ceremony observed in lighting them on Christmas Eve," he states. "It is thought lucky to snuff one and certain augurs are drawn from the manner and direction of their burning."

In Ireland from time immemorial even the poorest peasants light the Christmas candle with ceremony. They must be made in a particular way, so as to burn all day, or it will portend evil for the ensuing year. "In West Jutland (Denmark)," states Clement A. Miles in "Christmas in Ritual and Tradition," two great tallow candles stood on the festive board. No one dared to extinguish them, and if by any mischance one went out it was a portent of death. They stood for husband and wife, and that one of the wedded pair whose candle burnt the longer would outlive the other.

Thus the candles in the Christmas Seal are shown reflecting their rays through the double-barred cross, the emblem of the world fight against tuberculosis, bringing health to the world.
