The Betterton Produce Exchange bought a big lot of turkeys and are making arrangements for the Xmas trade.

James R. Downey and son, of Rock Hall, have purchased of Hulbert Townsend the Sewell farm, near Swan Creek. Price is said to have been about \$5,500.

Drs. Joseph C. Bloodgood and Thomas S. Cullen, Chairman of the Maryland Cancer Committee, have arranged to hold a meeting in Baltimore, 1211 Cathedral street, Tuesday evening, December 18th. Public invited. There will be a meeting in Chestertown at an early date at which the public will be invited. The subjects will be "the control and cure for cancer."

The co-operative canneries on the Shore are forming an association for mutual benefit. H. C. Willis represented the Fairlee cannery in the meeting.

A championship checker tournament has been arranged between Jos. N. Wheatley, undisputed champion of Kent county, and Robert Caldwell, champion player of lower Delaware, who at present resides in Smyrna. The 40 games arranged for the tournament will be played alternately in Chestertown and Smyrna. The tournament will decide the championship for Maryland-Delaware Peninsula. 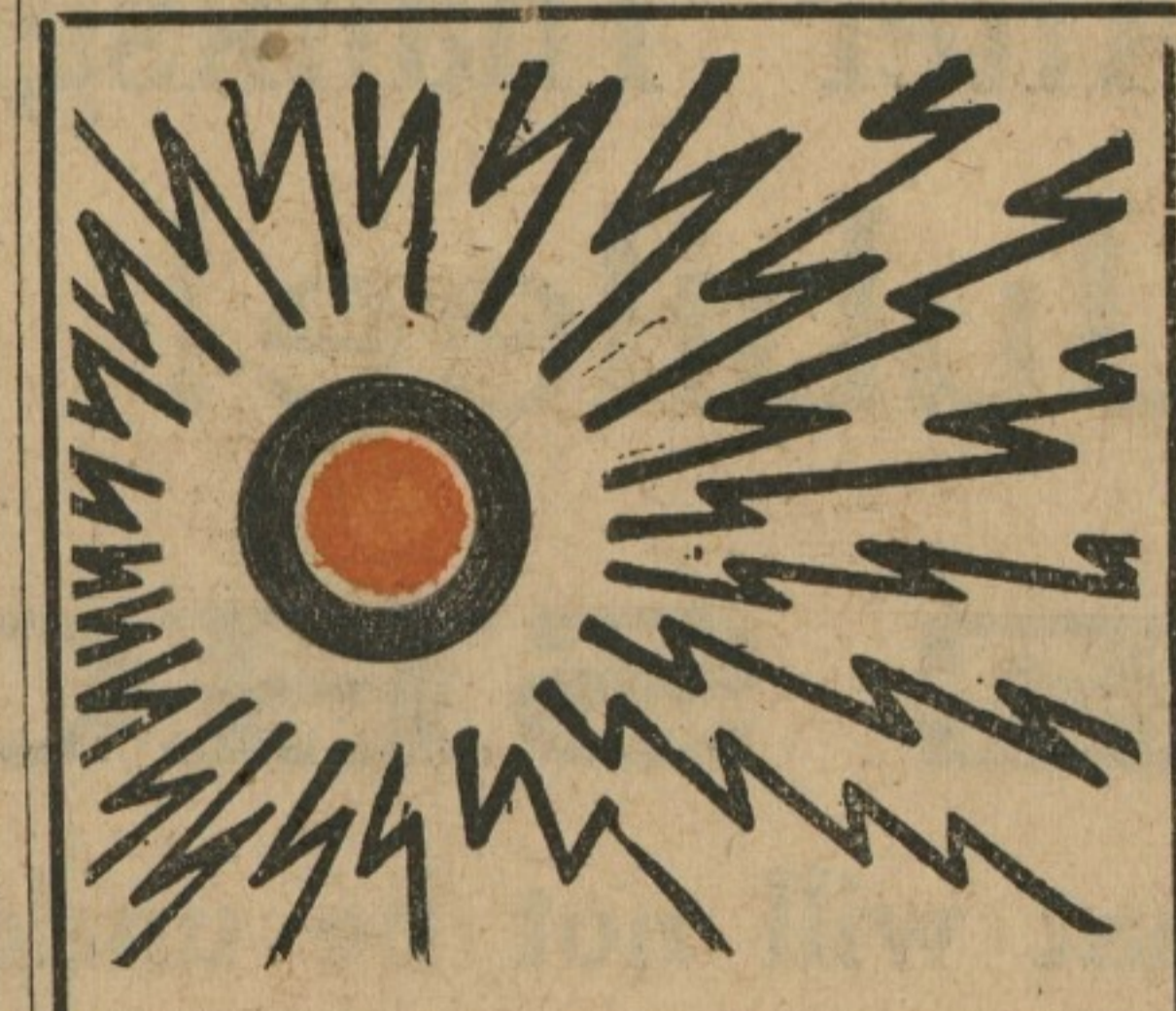
