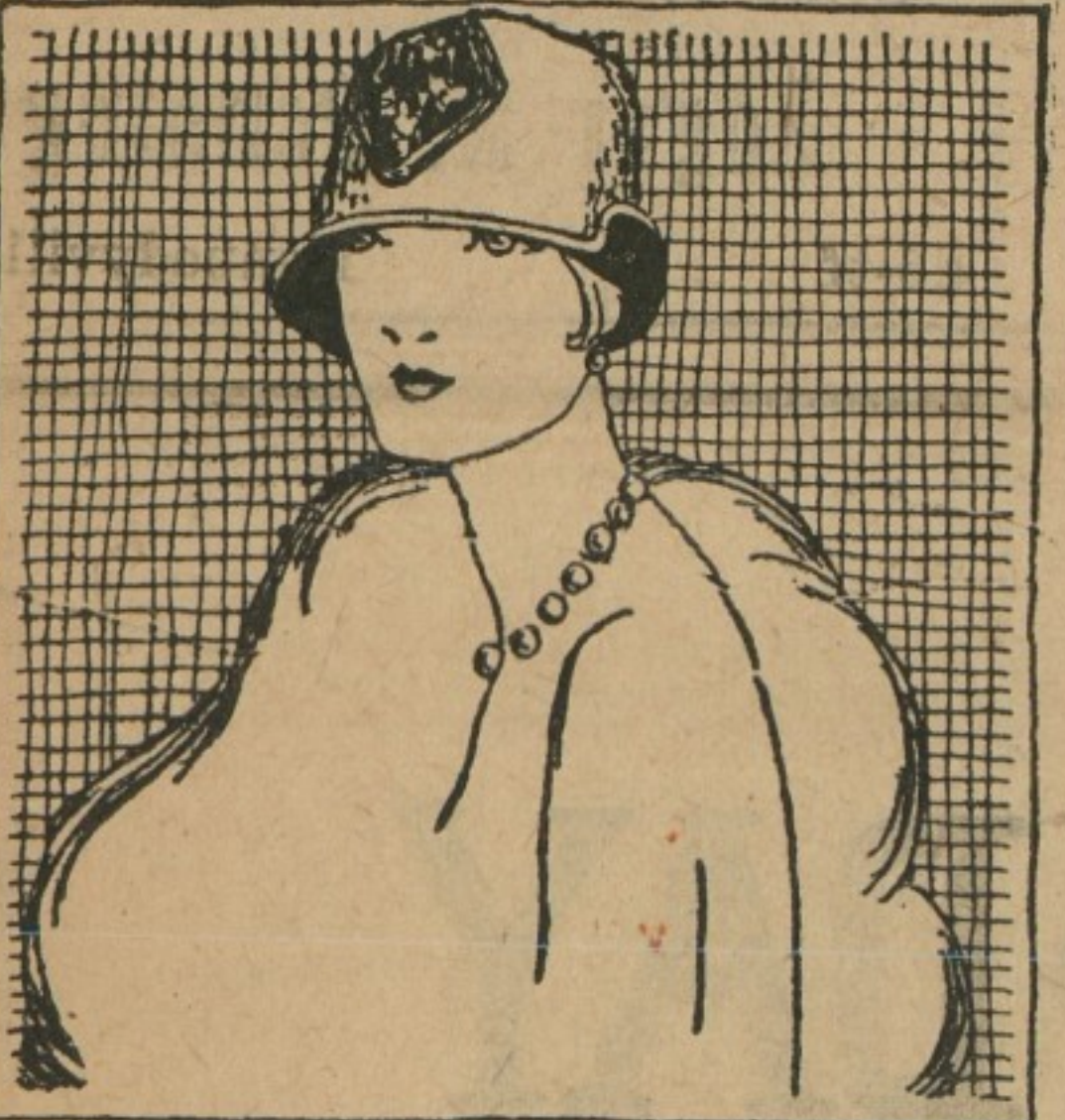

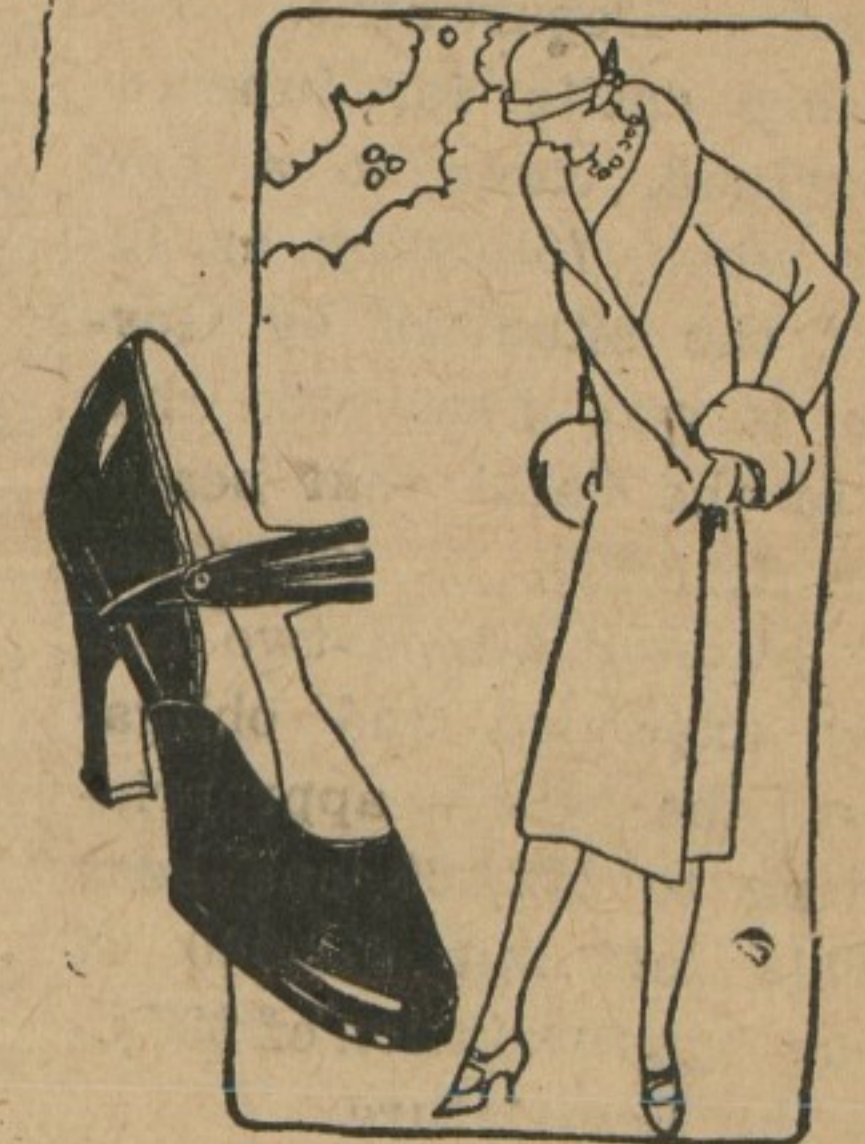

At the end of his junior year at college, Major Lamborn went to

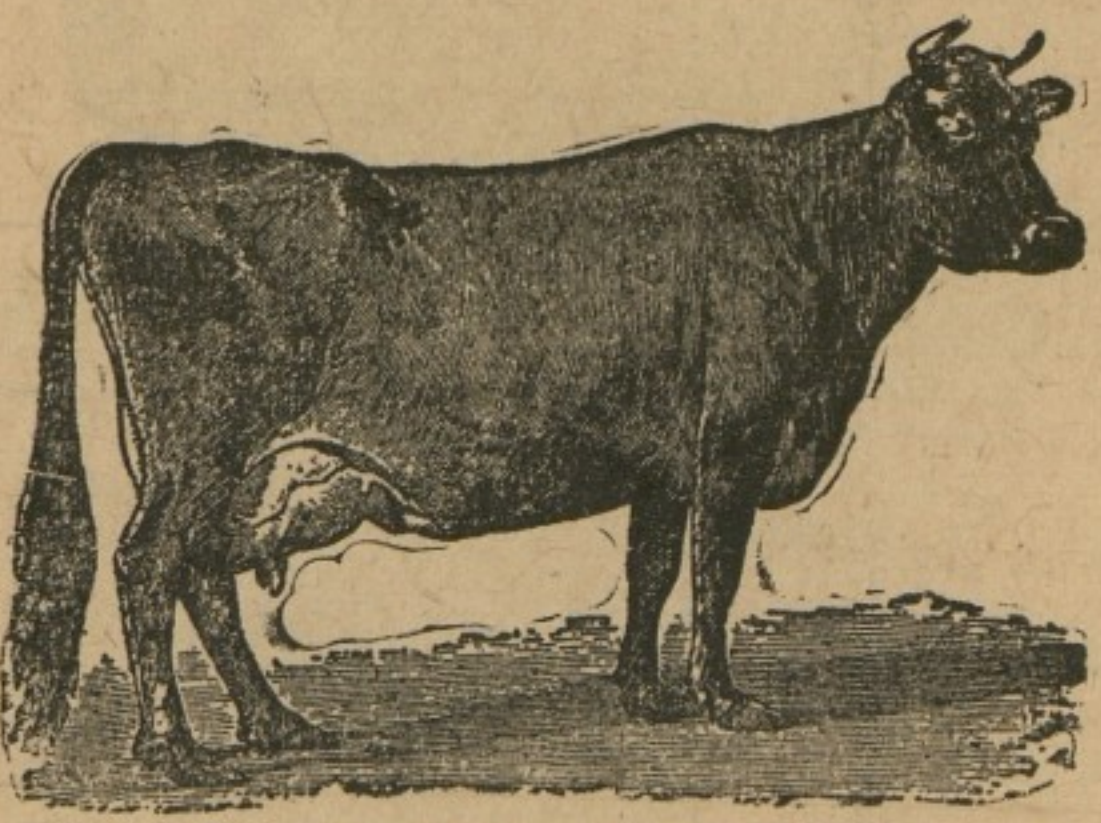
Idaho and worked on a ranch in order to earn enough to complete his education.
