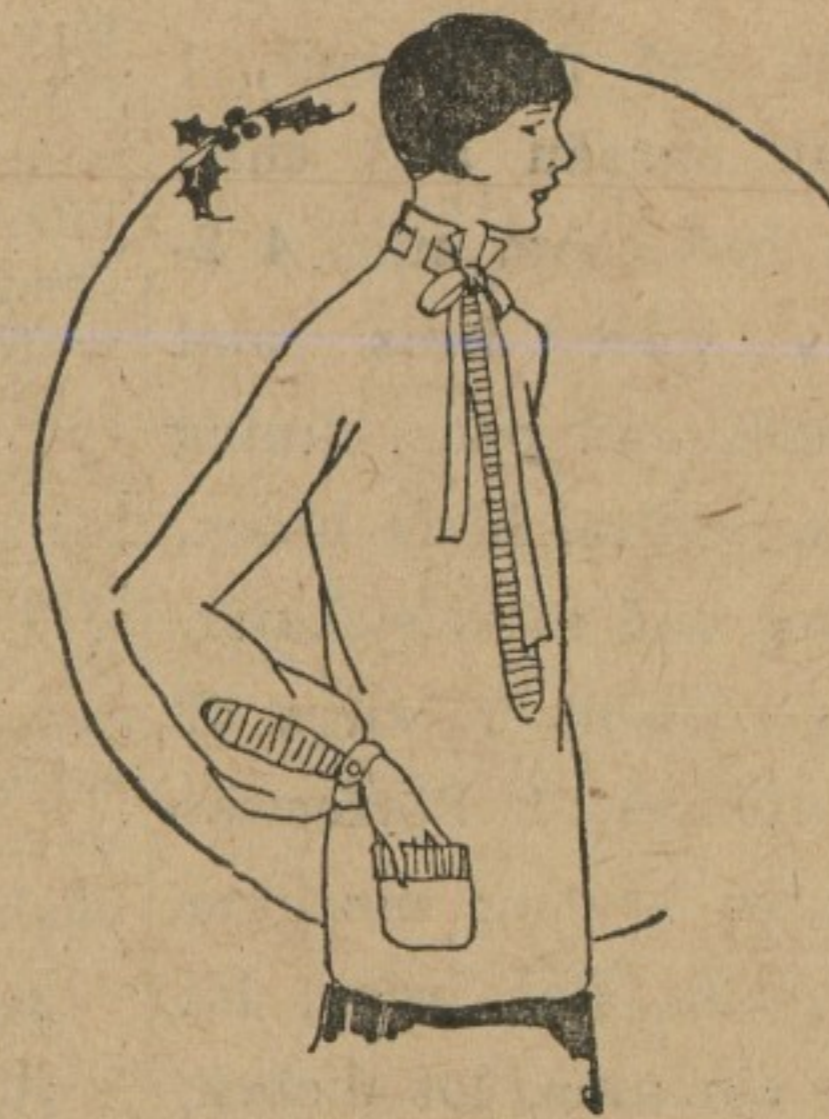

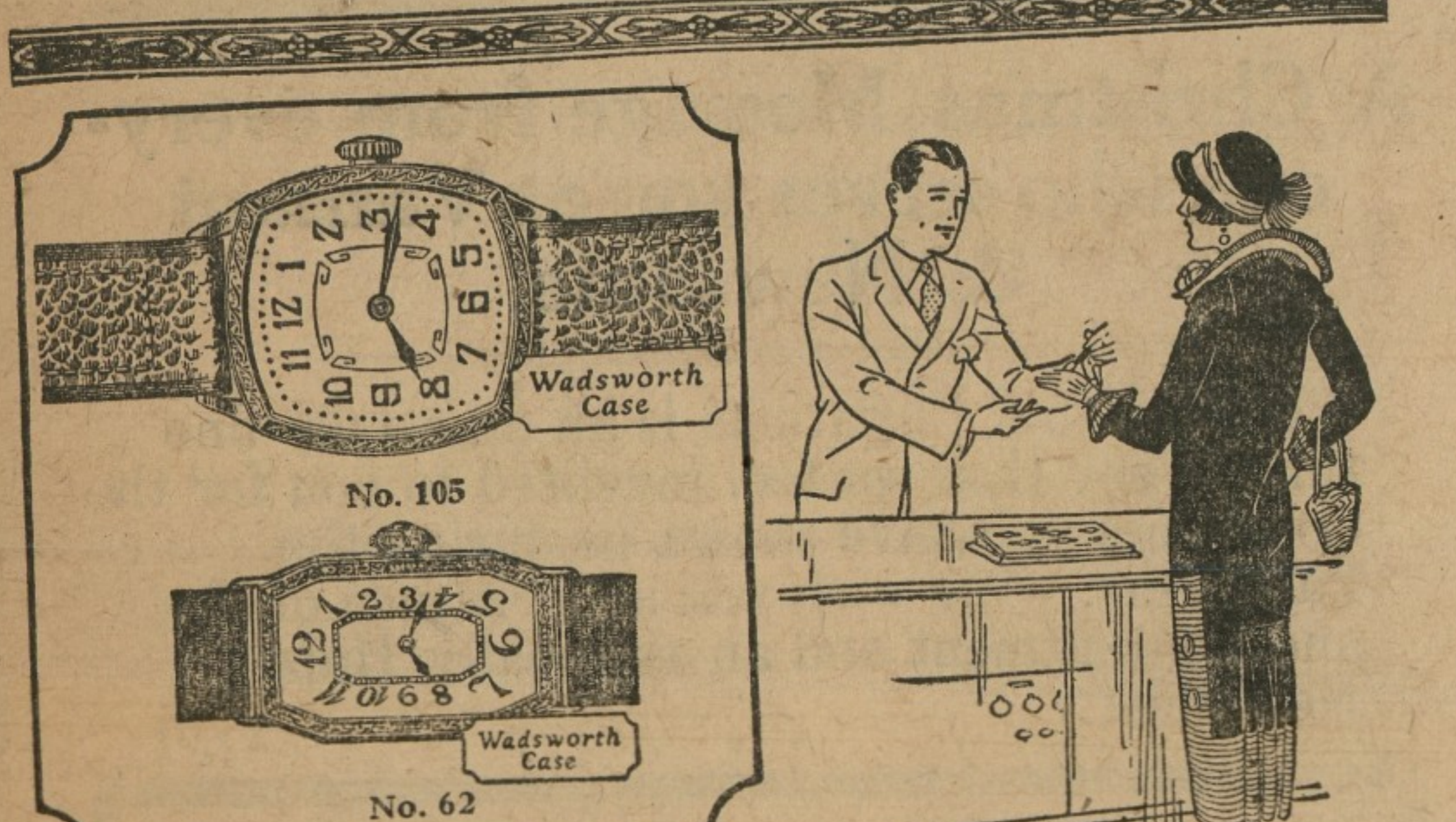

TURNER'S CREEK SCHOOL
You have no doubt read the article printed in this sheet signed by Louis C. Robinson, County Superintendent of Schools, setting forth certain facts, relative to the building of a one room school at Turner's Creek to replace the one destroyed by fire about a year ago.
This article also contained a portion of the law of our state governing the construction of schools.
As I view the situation these were facts of minor importance.
There has been built of fine materials, on the old site, a one room school with cloak rooms, at a cost of \$1200.00.
This building is better than we had hoped for, and far superior to the one the children would have been attending if it had not burned.
It is comfortable, well lighted, and presents an unusual cheery appearance so far in advance of the old room that the two cannot be compared.
For a month the building has been ready for occupancy, but no move has been made toward the opening for which we have looked so long.
We all know that it is impossible in this life, to lay down hard and fixed rules to govern all situations, without the least deviation. Because in no two instances do like matters stand out with the same importance.
In this case we have a school far more comfortable than anything we have had in the past and the children that should be attending this school have been without instruction this entire term. This to my mind is a very serious condition, and in this case the important matter, that should be considered to the exclusion of all others.
The reason for building this school was that at certain seasons it would be practically impossible to transport the children because of the condition of the roads due to the effects of winter. This season has arrived and if there is not something done, it means that the children will remain without instruction during the winter and early spring.
Now this is not right or just.
The important matter has been overlooked, or set aside, for one of minor importance in this case.

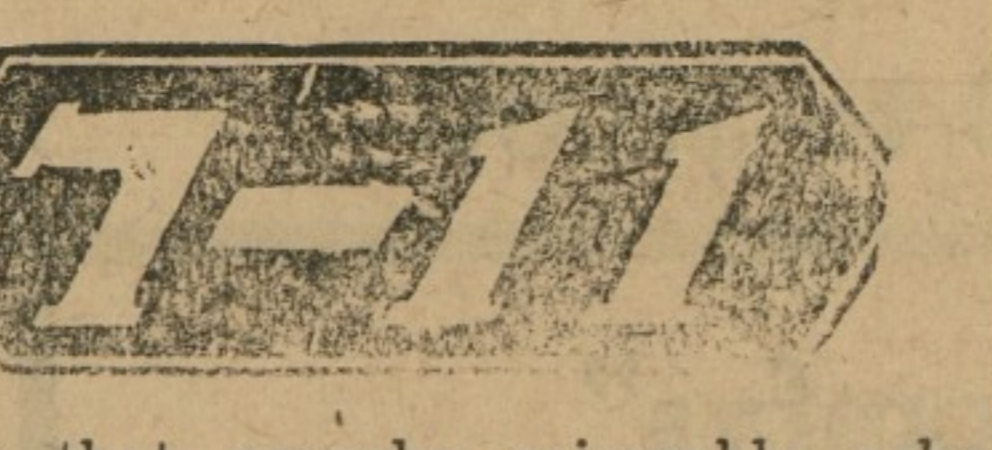
WASHINGTON QUINT DRAWS 32 ENTRANTS
