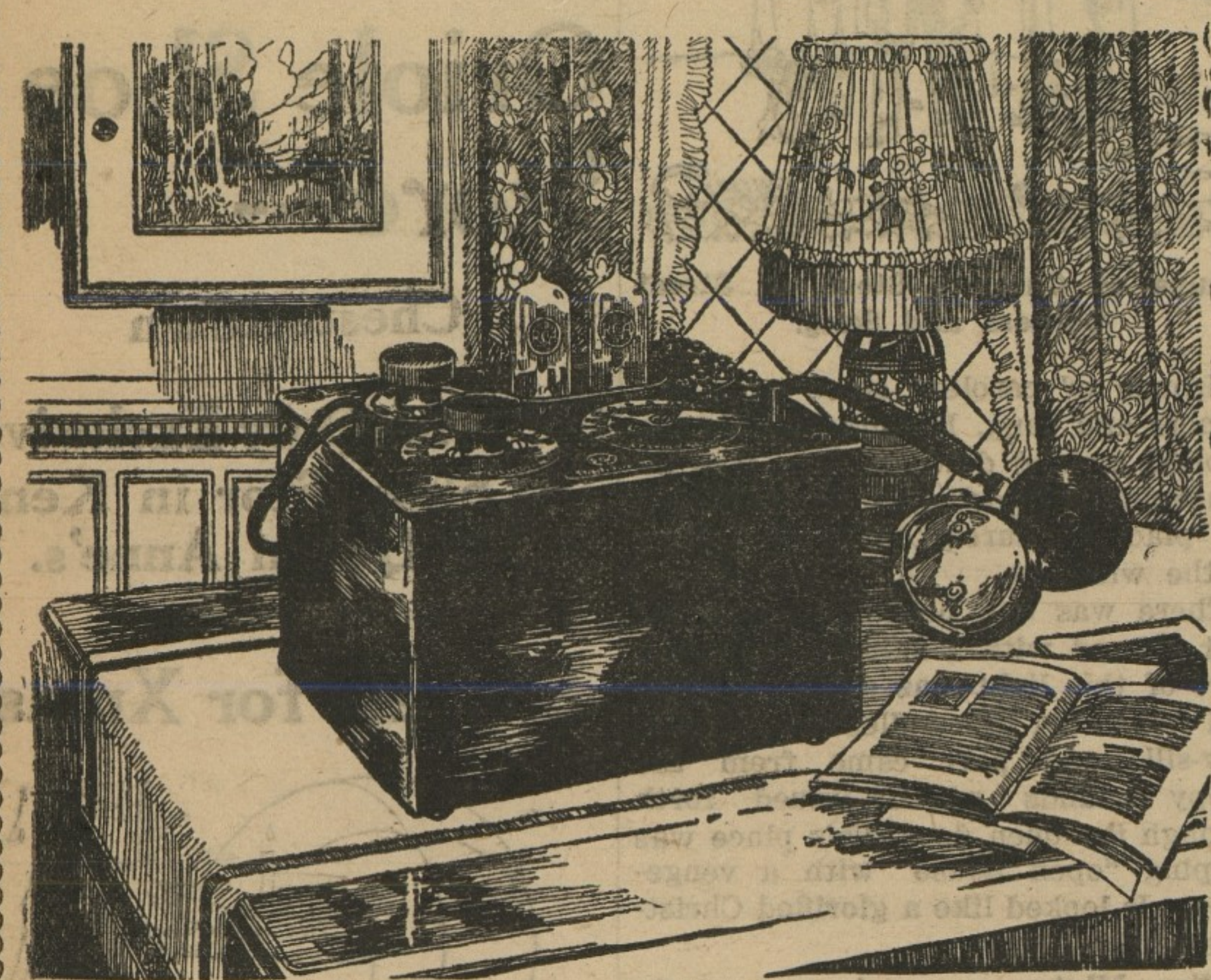

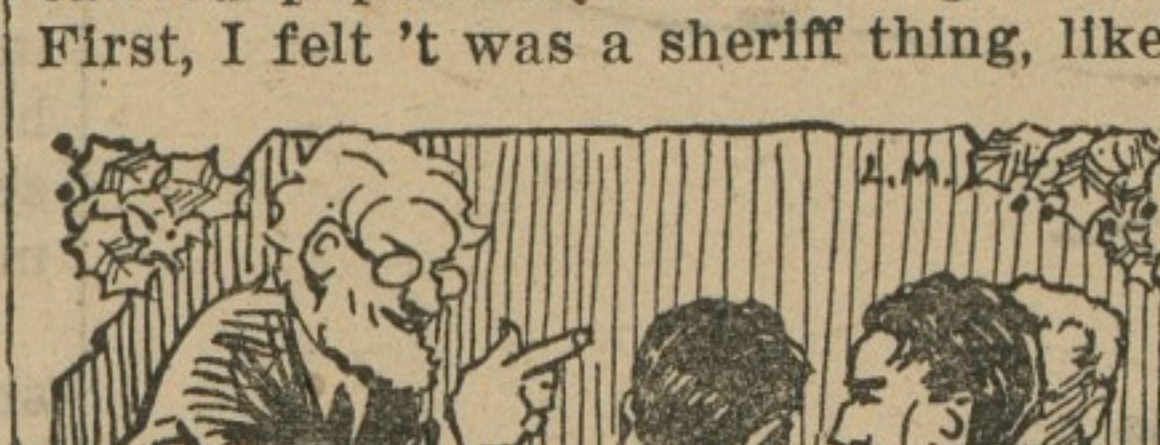
In the evening came a big church community Christmas tree.

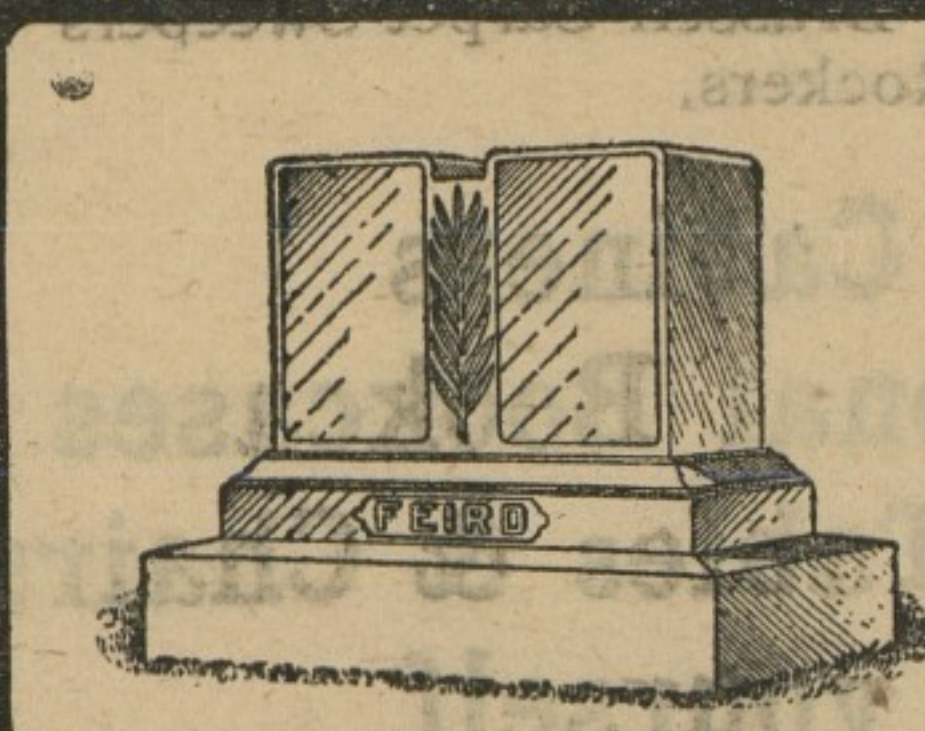

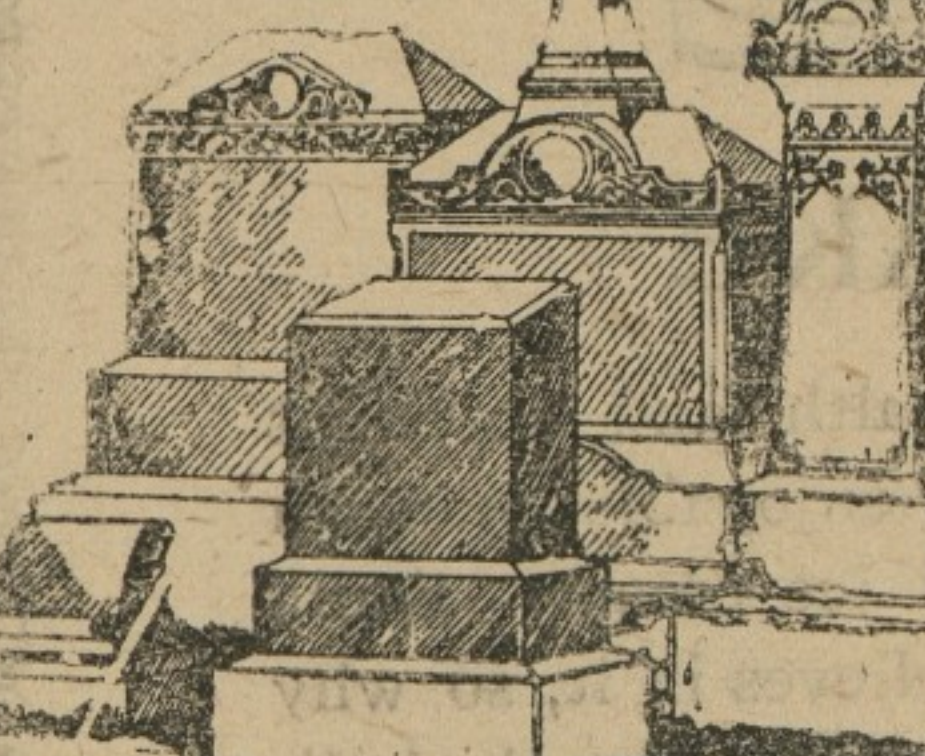
