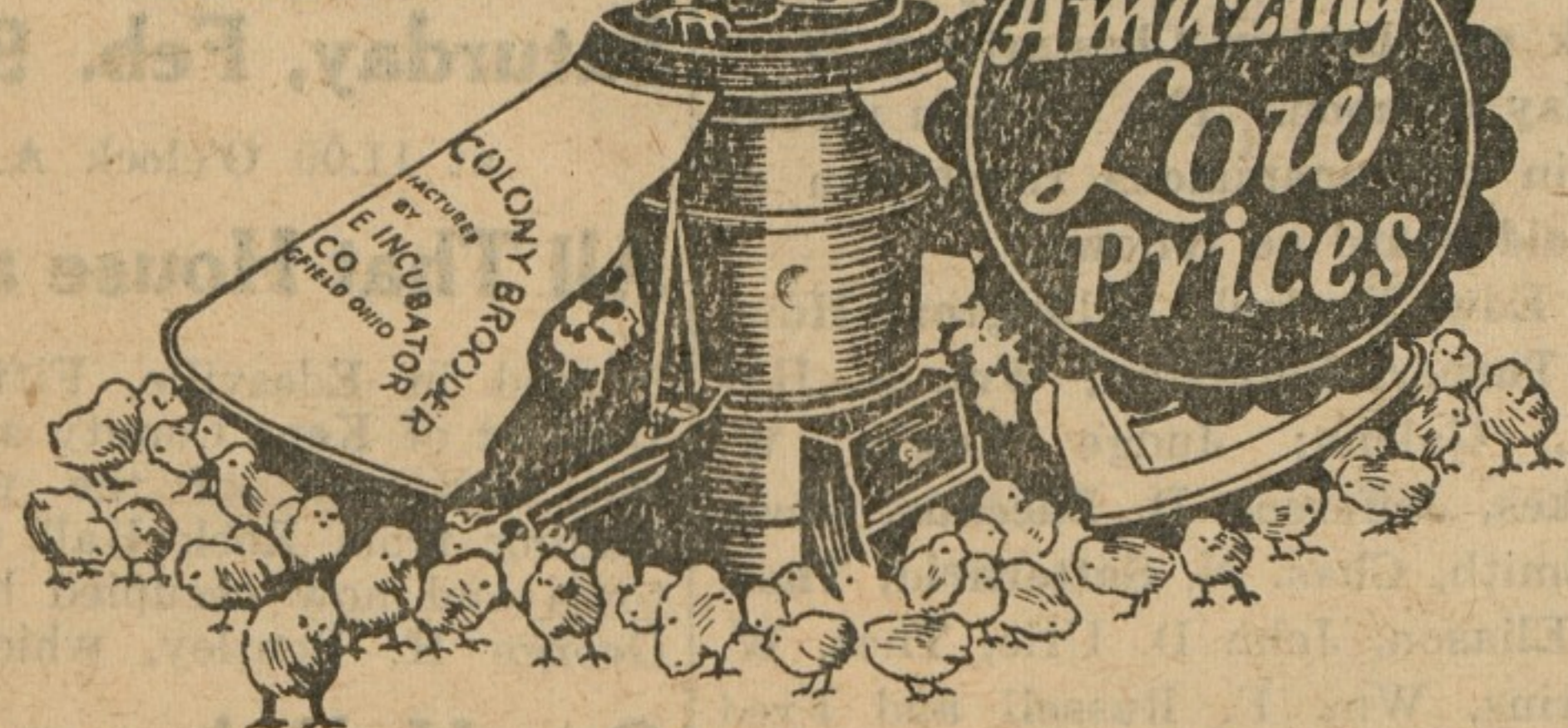

FINE REPORT OF DR. TITSWORTH

oring a nine-foot road building program for the remaining secondary highways of the County.

After considerable public discussion, the matter was brought to the official attention of the County Commissioners who went on record as approving this procedure for the building of future hard-surfaced roads.

By constructing a nine-foot concrete slab, the road builders, with the State money allocated to Kent, can complete the County's secondary roads within a period of ten years whereas the previous program of constructing the sixteen-foot road would have required twenty years.

Projects Under Weigh or to be Undertaken
In enumerating the things done, this brief report has not told half its story. Certain other projects having been started should be pushed to completion, or nearer to completion, this coming year and certain additional matters should be begun.

The Chamber has been cooperating with the Delmarva Eastern Shore Association, through Congressman Goldsborough, to reach three objectives: a weather bureau for the Peninsula, continued publication of market reports grown in Delmarva, and

a tariff on tomatoes. Momentarily the weather bureau is out of reach, but the market reports and the tomato tariff appear obtainable. Congressman Goldsborough and a Delmarva Association committee are to appear at a congressional hearing to be held late this month.

Cooperation With Local Unit of National Guard

The officials of the Chamber have gone to considerable trouble at times to assist the officers of the local unit of the Maryland National Guard in their appeal to the State for an armory. This addition to Kent County community life has been approved by Governor Ritchie and within a few months should be a reality. It is hoped that this new structure may be so located as to be of greatest public convenience and so constructed and situated as to add architectural dignity to the community.

A Possible Air Mail Service
Already the airport committee, working with Mr. Goldsborough, the mail officials of Baltimore City and the Baltimore Association of Commerce, has started negotiations for a trans-Chesapeake air postal service. Such mail delivery should cut down to minutes this service which now requires a day at least.

A County Calendar

A minor but important work just now being undertaken by the Chamber is that of keeping at headquarters a perpetual calendar of county social and other events. Often it happens that important entertainments and meetings each of which appeals widely and equally to Kent County, are unwittingly scheduled for the same day and hour, with the re-

sult that tempers are damaged and worthy causes poorly patronized. In your arranging for events of county-wide appeal, it is urged that you call Mrs. Westcott at the Chamber office, Chestertown, 115, and have her record your selected day and hour. In case other events, likely to interfere with the success of yours, are down for the same or nearly the same time, she will advise you of the fact and thus possibly spare you disappointment.

Flax

During the past year, the Chamber has followed with keen interest the growing and harvesting of flax as Mrs. John J. Raskob has been experimenting with this crop in Queen Anne's County. She has demonstrated that flax can be grown in this section. The next step is to interest capital to purchase and set up machinery for the processing and give the farmer a market for what he raises. The Chamber plans in the near future a conference with Mr. John Chambers, superintendent of Mrs. Raskob's farm, to discuss with him his experience of this year and the possibility of finding a way to finance flax processing.

New Projects Suggested

Other projects which the Chamber should undertake during the coming year are:

1. Securing an even more representative membership in the County;
2. Holding get-together luncheons in the towns of the County in order to interest their citizens and inform them about the purposes and work of the Chamber and to learn how the Chamber can serve these communities acceptably;
3. Making a careful industrial and agricultural survey of Kent as a basis for intelligent pride in the County and for persuasive publicity;
4. Publishing an attractive descriptive folder of the unique opportunities here for the business and professional man and the equally unique opportunities for pleasurable living;
5. Supporting the county hospital which has been courageously established by public-spirited men and women with a vision of a more adequate county health service;
6. Organizing a turkey section and a chicken section which shall take up vigorously and methodically the marketing of the poultry products of Kent;
7. For this help given the farmer by the Chamber there is a growing and enthusiastic request on the part of the farmers themselves. In all probability a meeting for the organization of such poultry sections will be held around February 1st next.
8. Cooperating with the Delmarva Eastern Shore Association in its marketing program for 1929 which consists of allowing producers of high grade products to use the Delmarva Insignia as a brand mark of quality. To insure uniformity the Association is employing a number of inspectors to grade the crops and packs of those growers and packers who ask for this service. Delmarva hopes to secure the interest of a few of the growers of fine asparagus in Kent County for 1929.

In fine, the Kent County Chamber of Commerce has been endeavoring and will continue striving to perfect an organization competent to deal intelligently and successfully with the outstanding community needs of Kent County.

Recognition of Unusual Cooperation

It is appropriate here to express gratitude to those who have supported the administration with especial enthusiasm and persistence. Congressman Goldsborough has been especially helpful and efficient in bringing the Chamber's requests and the people's business promptly to the attention of appropriate Government agencies.

The work of the Chamber's President of last year, Mr. Thomas W. Perkins, in laying firm foundations for the successes of this year is gratefully remembered.

The thanks of the officials is especially due to the ladies and gentlemen of St. James M. P. Church who provided an unforgettable occasion of gastronomic joy and of good fellowship at the time of the second semi-annual dinner early in December.

The President is under particular personal obligation to the alert, resourceful and competent executive secretary, Mrs. Westcott, and to such fine, outstanding, public-spirited men as Messrs. H. M. Baker, Richard Collins, Harry F. Jefferson, Conlyn E. Noland, Howard Owens, Marion Smith and Sidney Turner, to mention a few of his co-laborers; of such citizens are progressive, worth while communities built.

In closing this report, the President makes a recommendation and an exhortation.

The recommendation is that the Chamber authorize a revision of the by-laws so as to secure to the President of the Chestertown Mercantile Section and to those in any other sections which may be formed, Membership on the Board of Directors of the Chamber.

The exhortation is that the members of the Kent County Chamber of Commerce look forward with anticipation to yet greater successes in the new year which it may secure to the County by an ever larger measure of cooperation and by still more intelligent and persistent effort.

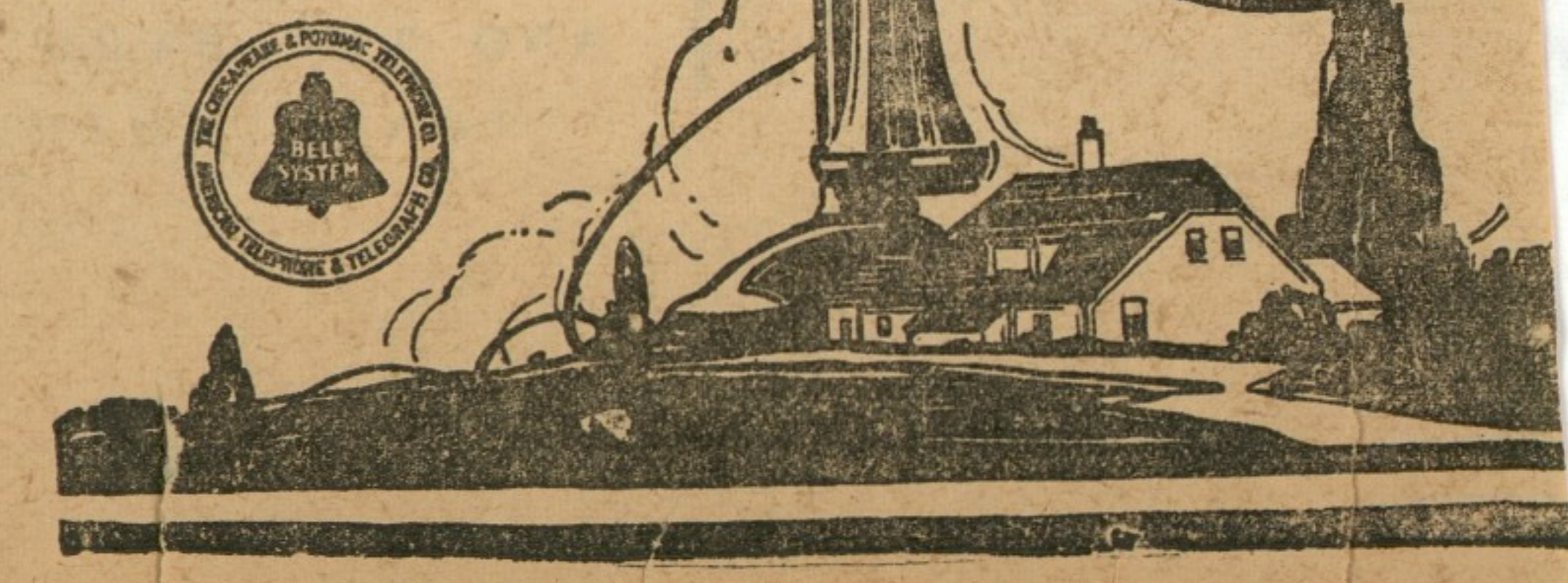

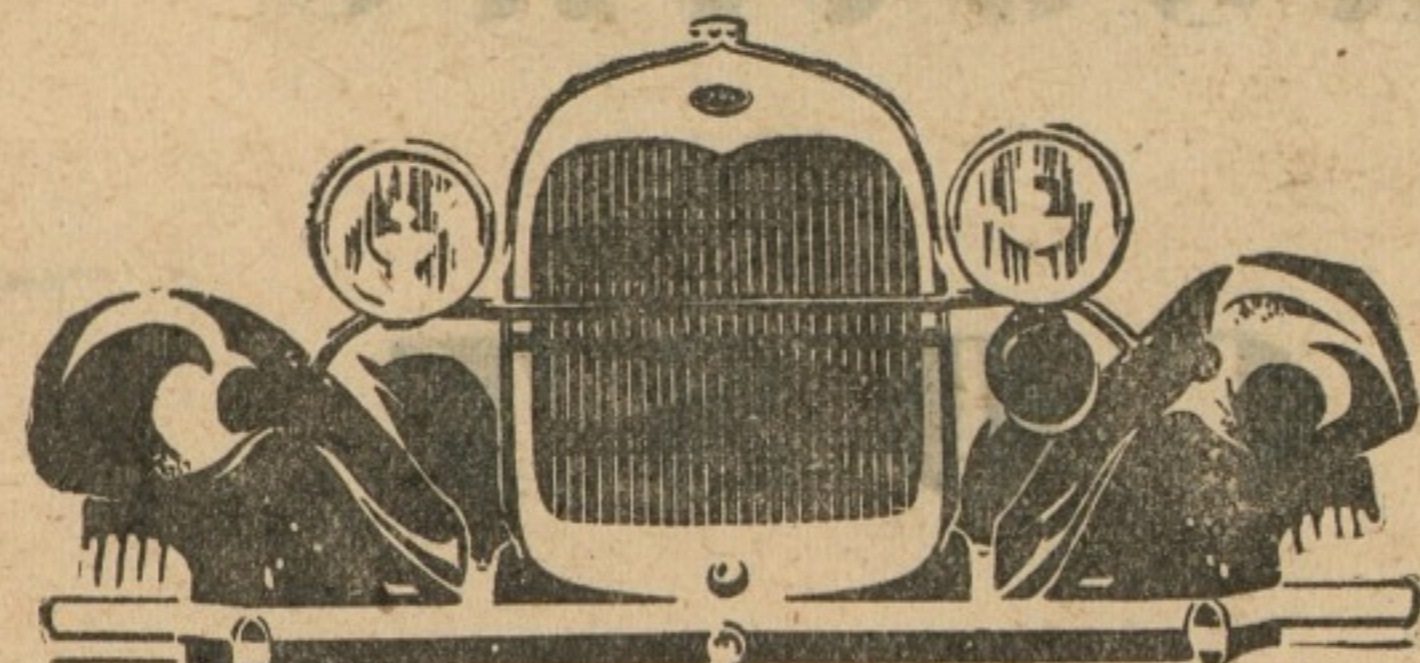

Simplicity of cooling system is a feature of the new Ford



A COMPLETE water plant is a part of every automobile as it is a part of every modern city.

The purpose of this water plant is to keep the engine cooled to a temperature that will make it efficient in operation. If it were not for this, the cylinder walls would become overheated and the pistons refuse to operate.

The cooling system of the new Ford is particularly interesting because it is so simple and reliable.

When the radiator is full of water, the engine of the new Ford will not overheat under the hardest driving. Yet the water is so regulated that it will not impair engine operation by running too cold in winter.

The cooling surface of the Ford radiator is large, with four rows of tubes set in staggered position so that each receives the full benefit of the incoming air. The fan is of the airplane propeller type and draws air through the radiator at the rapid rate of 350 cubic feet per minute at 1000 revolutions per minute of the motor.

The hot water around the cylinder head is drawn to the radiator to be cooled by a centrifugal water pump of new design.

The entire cooling system of the new Ford is so simple in design and so carefully made that it requires very little attention.

The radiator should be kept full, of course, and drained once each month so that sediment will not collect and retard the free passage of water. In cold weather, a reliable anti-freeze solution should be added.

As owner and manager of this important water plant you should also see that the water pump and fan shaft are properly lubricated and the packing around the pump shaft kept in adjustment.

Hose connections may also need replacement after long service. For those little adjustments, it pays to call on the Ford dealer.
