DR. TITSWORTH SPEAKS TO PRESS

Addresses by Governor Buck, Dr. Paul E. Titsworth, president of Washington College, R. P. Graham, superintendent of the Delaware division of the Pennsylvania Railroad, and an illustrated talk by John E. Allen, of New York, editor of the "Linotype News" featured the closing session of the 15th annual meeting of the Del-Mar-Va Press Association, held Saturday afternoon in the Hotel duPont Biltmore, at which the News was represented.

Governor Buck spoke briefly of the important part a newspaper plays in the life of a community and expressed his appreciation of the support the press of this State has given him during the years he served as State Highway engineer.

Mr. Allen's talk on "How Does Your Newspaper Look?" was illustrated with interesting examples of newspaper pages in which he pointed out how type was used to good or to poor advantage.

The present attitude of co-operation between the railroads and the press was praised by Mr. Graham. He pointed out how the relations between the two have improved within the past few years and expressed his appreciation of the treatment which has been accorded him by the press. Dr. Titsworth made a most happy speech and altho' at a late hour being called upon, held the attention of all.

Dr. Titsworth extended an invitation to the association to hold one of its meetings in the buildings of Washington College, Chestertown.

At the close of the meeting William F. Metten of Wilmington, who has been secretary of the association since its organization, was presented with a fountain pen desk set as a mark of his services.

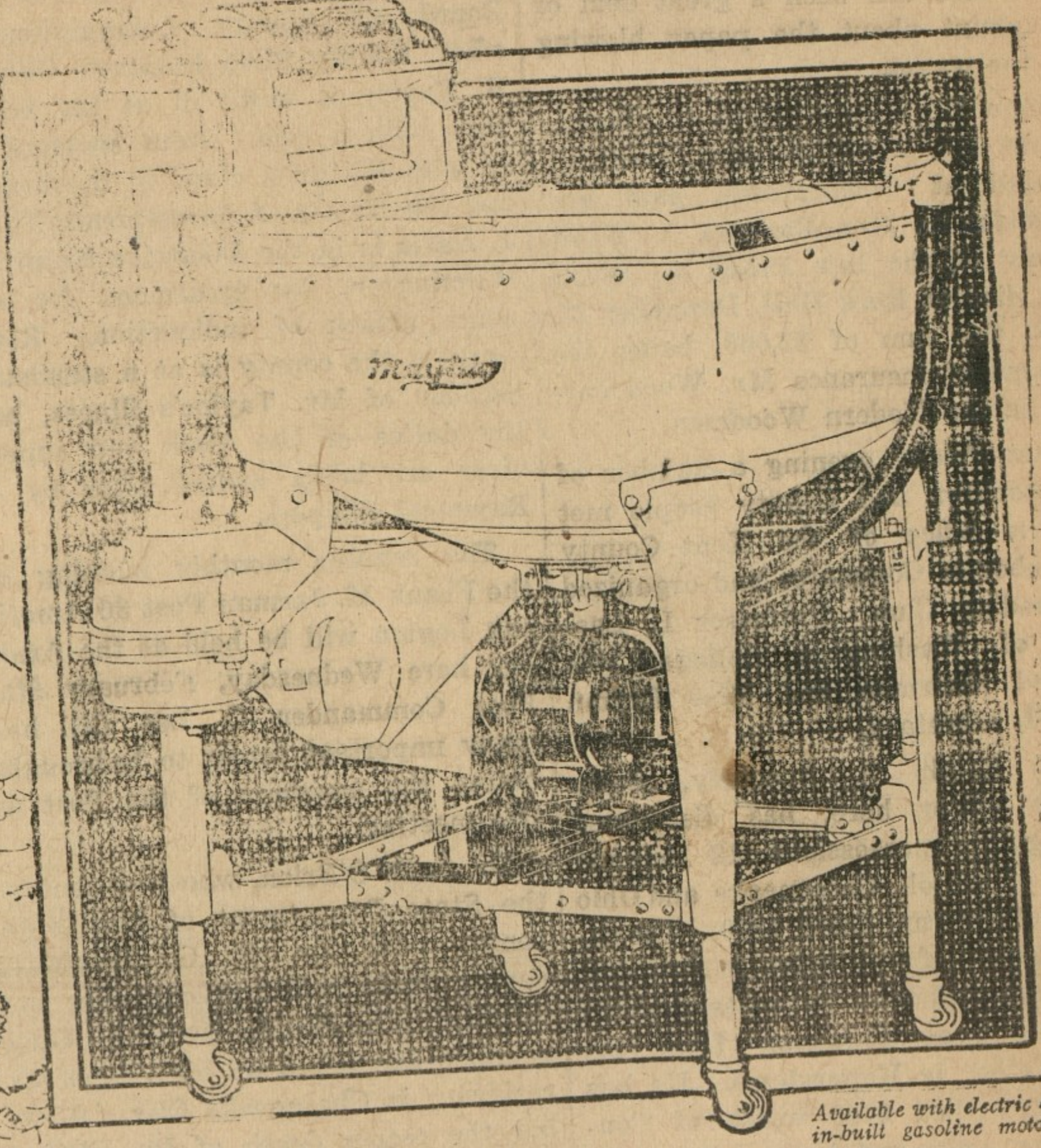
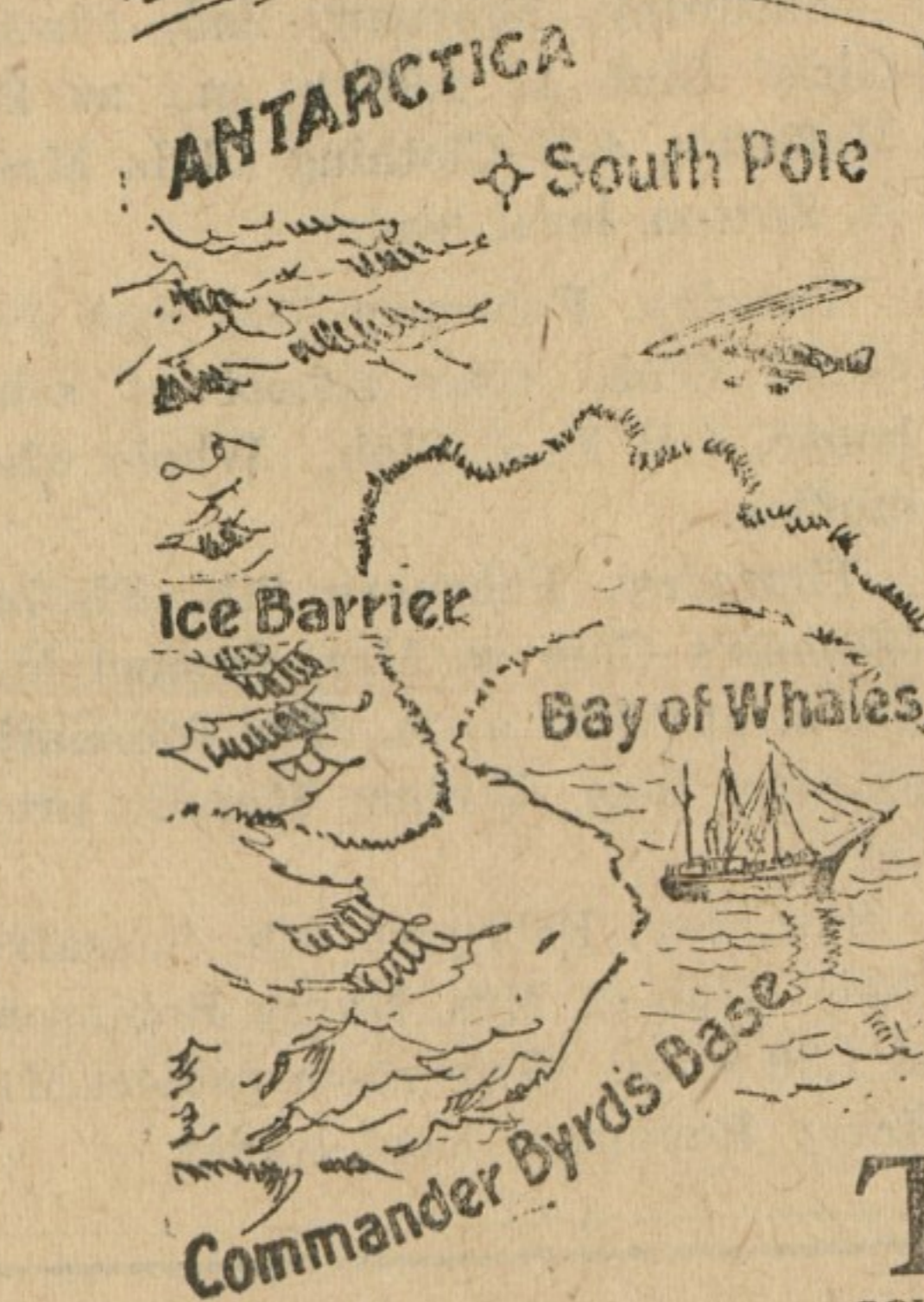

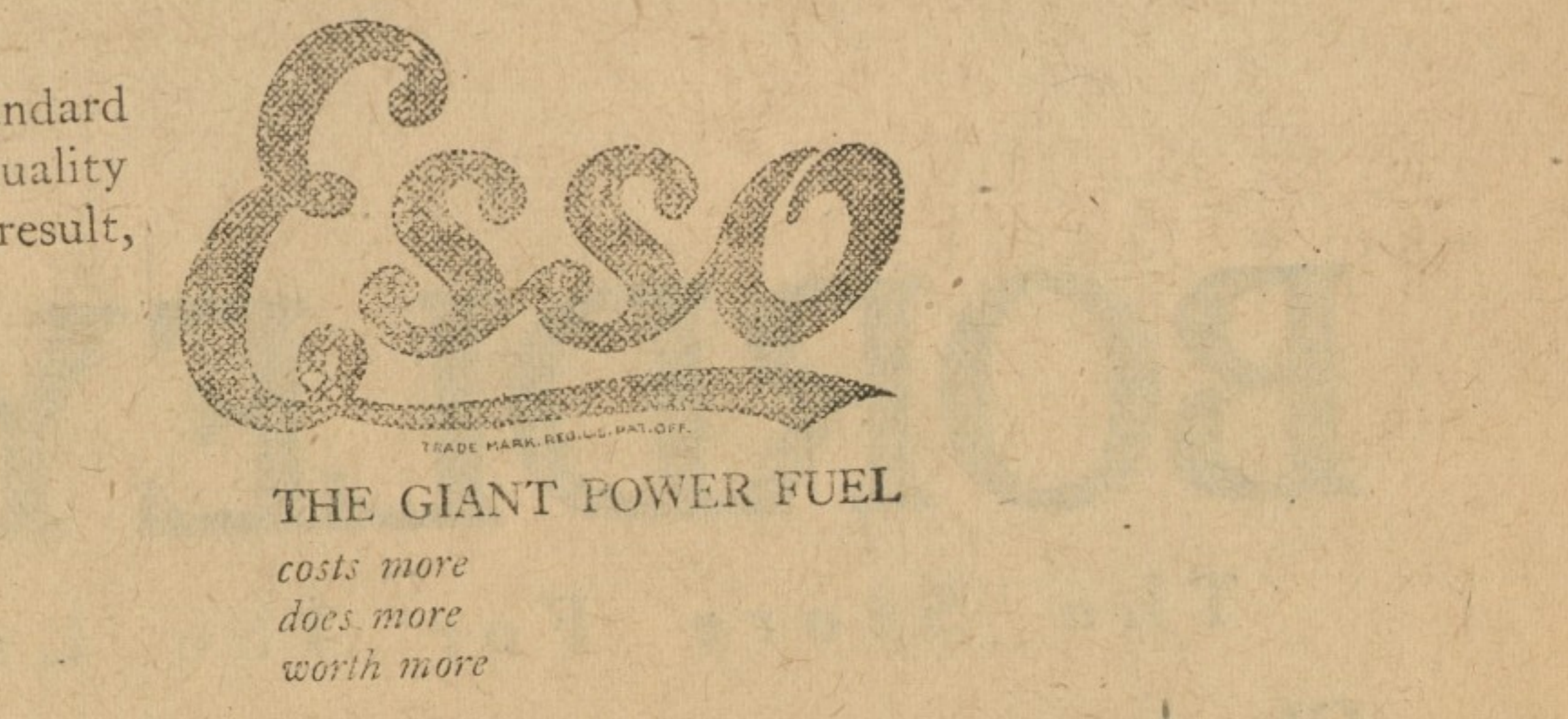
