## 1929 FAIR DATES

The Secretaries of Fairs, which comprise officials of the Del-MarVa Penn Fair Association, met in Salisbury for their annual session Monday afternoon and elected officers and decided upon the dates of 1929 fairs on the Peninsula.

Ernest Raughly, of Harrington, Del., was elected president and H. E. Mears, of Keller, Va., secretary and treasurer. James M. Crockett, of Pocomoke City, who has held the office of president for the past twelve years declined re-election.

Eastern Shore fairs and the dates selected for each are as follows:

- Harrington, Del., week of July 23.
- Tasley, Va., week of July 30.
- Pocomoke City, week of August 6.
- Salisbury, week of August 13.
- Cambridge, week of August 20.
- Keller, Va., week of August 27.

The duration of each fair is left to the judgment of the local fair management.

## "SCOTTIE" GIVEN SIXTY DAYS IN RUM CASE

Federal Court session was held in Denton, Caroline County, on Monday and Tuesday of last week with a number of Talbot County cases on the docket and several of the jurors chosen from Talbot.

Scottie Gosnell, of Kent, who was sentenced to one year in the House of Correction by the Circuit Court for Talbot County, at its last session in November, was tried on a federal charge of illegal sale of intoxicating liquor and was sentenced to 60 days in the penitentiary with the sentence from the State court.

Gosnell was represented by Edward T. Miller, Easton attorney.

Pete Borza, represented by Nehemiah Clark, was sentenced to 30 days on a charge of liquor law violations. Borza's sentence was suspended, however.

Leonard Norton, of St. Michaels, represented by Mr. Miller, was sentenced to sixty days on another liquor law charge, while J. Dawson Chester, also of St. Michaels, was given 75 days.

United States District Attorney Amos W. W. Woodcock, of Baltimore, conducted the prosecutions.

## NEGRO HISTORY WEEK

This is Negro History Week. At this period each year special attention is given to the study of the part that this "tenth man" of our population has played in the making of our nation. It has been no little part. White authors, too, have written countless volumes dealing with Negro life. While historians seem chiefly to have limited their studies to a particular section, and these works are really in the main sociological, educational or religious. But in the field of music and literature, the white author has found apparently that the Negro offers material as rich and rare—if not more so—as that offered by any other group. For some of the most brilliant productions of the last decade have been based upon Negro life. It is not necessary to mention in this connection the unprecedented popularity of the Negro spiritual, and the researchers that have been made in that subject by both white and colored writers in the last few years.

The Negro really entered upon his era of freedom, therefore, in 1866, and up to 1926 had made progress to the following remarkable degree: (That first figure throughout represents the status of the Negro in 1866; the second in 1926.)

**Economic:** Homes owned, 12,000—700,000; farms operated, 20,000—1,000,000; businesses conducted, 2,100—70,000; wealth accumulated, \$20,000,000—\$2,000,000,000.

**Educational:** Per cent literate, 10—90; colleges and normal schools, 15—500; students in public schools, 100,000—2,150,000; teachers in all schools, 600—48,000; property for higher education, \$60,000—\$400,000,000; annual expenditures for education, \$700,000—\$37,000,000; raised by Negroes, \$80,000—\$3,000,000.

**Religious:** Number of churches 700—47,000; communicants, 600,000—5,000,000; Sunday schools, 1,000—46,000; Sunday school pupils 50,000—3,000,000; value of church property, \$1,500,000—\$100,000,000.

The above figures tell their own story, and the like of it has never been told before in the history of the world. Everyone is familiar with a pet declaration of many orators, including the President of the United States, who usually gets it into most of his important speeches; "No race in the history of mankind has made such remarkable progress in a similar period as the (Negro) has made," et cetera ad infinitum!

## BANK RECEIVER ASSESSES STOCKHOLDERS

On Tuesday, J. M. Swan, receiver of the Peoples National Bank of Middletown, Del., declared an assess- ment of one hundred per cent on the capital stock of the bank, amounting to \$80,000. In other words, the stockholders in that institution will not only lose what money they have invested, but they will also be forced to pay an equal sum in addition. 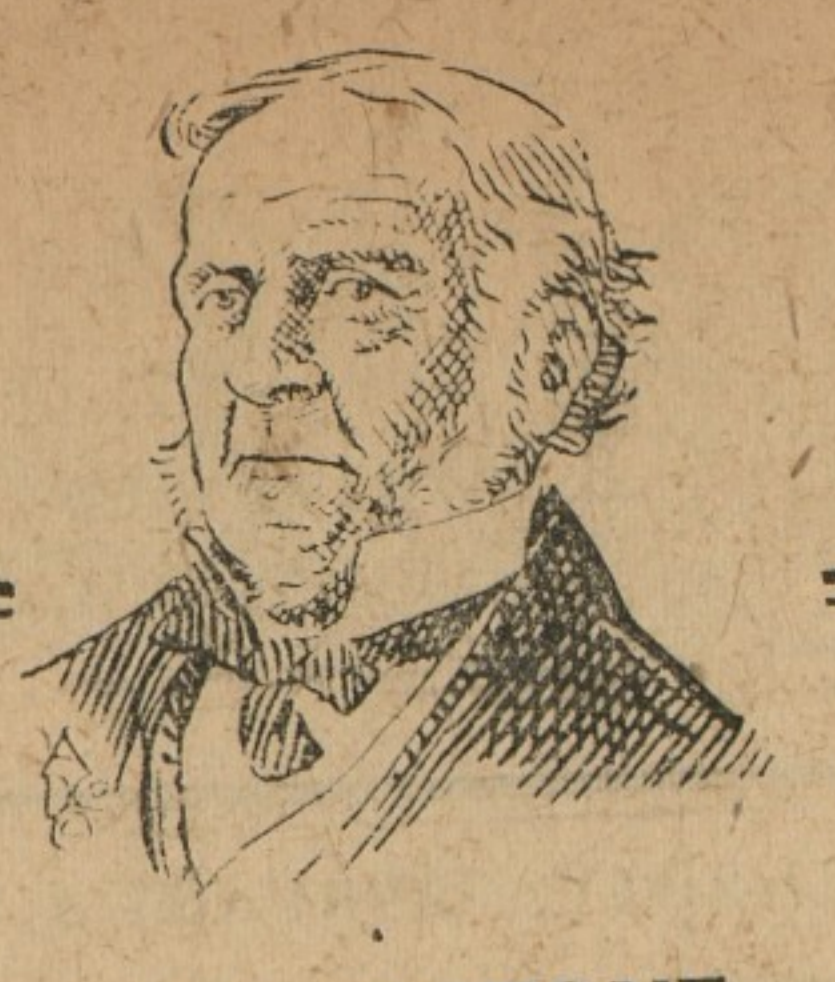

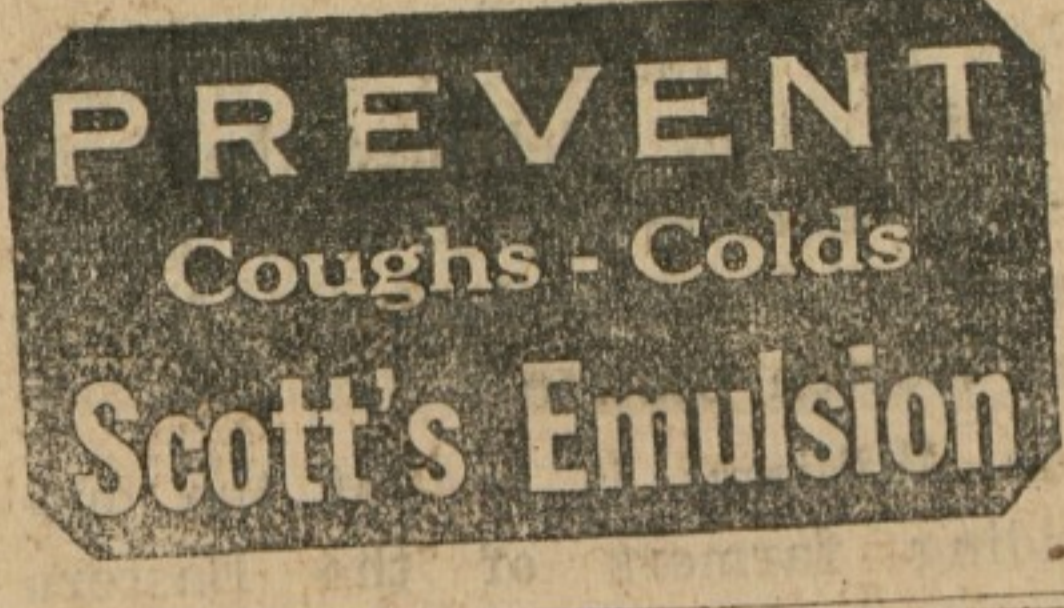
