Harrison Rider, president of the Board of County Commissioners of Baltimore county, was named Insurance Commissioner by Gov. Ritchie Wednesday to succeed Carville D. Benson, who died two weeks ago. Mr. Rider will assume office when he completes pending business before the County Commissioners.

Mr. Rider is regarded as the most powerful Democratic leader in Baltimore county. He is interested in several business enterprises and is a director in several banks. He has served several terms as one of the Baltimore County Commissioners. The salary is \$6,000.

22 GOVERNORS WILL PARADE

Promise of variety and color in the presidential inauguration ceremonies has assured definite proportions with the announcement by the inaugural committee that 22 state governors will have reserved space for themselves and retinues in the parade.

At the same time, the committee announced other entertainment features on the tentative program of events—among them being concerts, air stunts by army and navy flyers, and a great display of fireworks on the mall.

Many of the executives, the committee said, will come with escorts garbed in gay uniforms. The governor of Alabama will be accompanied by two companies of foot soldiers from the State National Guard and a band of 53 pieces. From Delaware, New Jersey and Virginia, artillerymen and cavalrymen will come with their chiefs. The governor of Virginia will have 450 members of Richmond Blues, the Richmond Howitzers and the Richmond Grays, and a five and drum corps.

In the second division of the parade, the committee announced, 15 additional military and civic units already have been assigned positions. The tentative program of public entertainment is to begin two days before the inauguration. On March 2 the Navy Yard will be thrown open to visitors. The army and navy on this day will stage an air circus over the city, and there will be a riding circus at Fort Myer, Virginia.

On Sunday, March 3, special services will be held in all Washington churches. There will be a pilgrimage to the tomb of the unknown soldier in the afternoon, with a concert in the evening.

Monday will be given to the inaugural ceremonies, with the parade and charity ball in the evening.

GAME WARDEN MISQUOTED

State Game Warden E. Lee LeCompte says that "On Saturday there appeared an article in the Evening Sun of Baltimore quoting me regarding the use of sink boxes, also the use of pump and automatic guns. I was misquoted in as far as saying they should be stopped. My statement was to the effect the automatic and pump guns were opposed by a great many people and it probably would only be a matter of time when the Federal Government would prohibit the use of same for hunting migratory birds."

SHORE BOARDS FOR ALMSHOUSE

The executive committee of the Eastern Shore Commissioners Association, composed of the presidents of all the county boards of the nine counties, met in Easton and decided to back the Eastern Shore Almshouse bill and several other proposed measures of vital interest to the people of the Eastern Shore.

Delegations from every county on the Eastern Shore will go to Annapolis and fight for the passage of the erection of an Eastern Shore almshouse, in which the poor and needy of the different counties may be taken care of without having to mix them with the insane patients in the different state hospitals.

Field Day for the white schools of Kent County has been set for Tuesday, May 14, by Dr. William Burdick State P. A. L. Director. The meet, as usual, will be held on the Washington College athletic field. The date for the meet of the colored school is set at Friday, April 12. The county winners are eligible to attend the State meet in Baltimore.

LINDBERGH TO GET \$25 A DAY

The Secretary of Commerce, Wm. F. Whiting, announced yesterday that Col. Charles A. Lindbergh has been appointed technical adviser to aeronautics branch of the Department of Commerce.

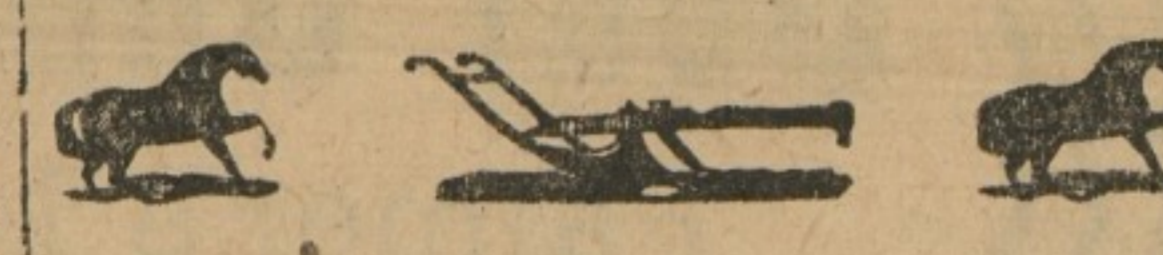

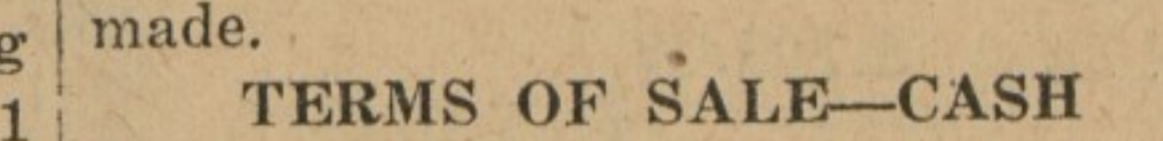
