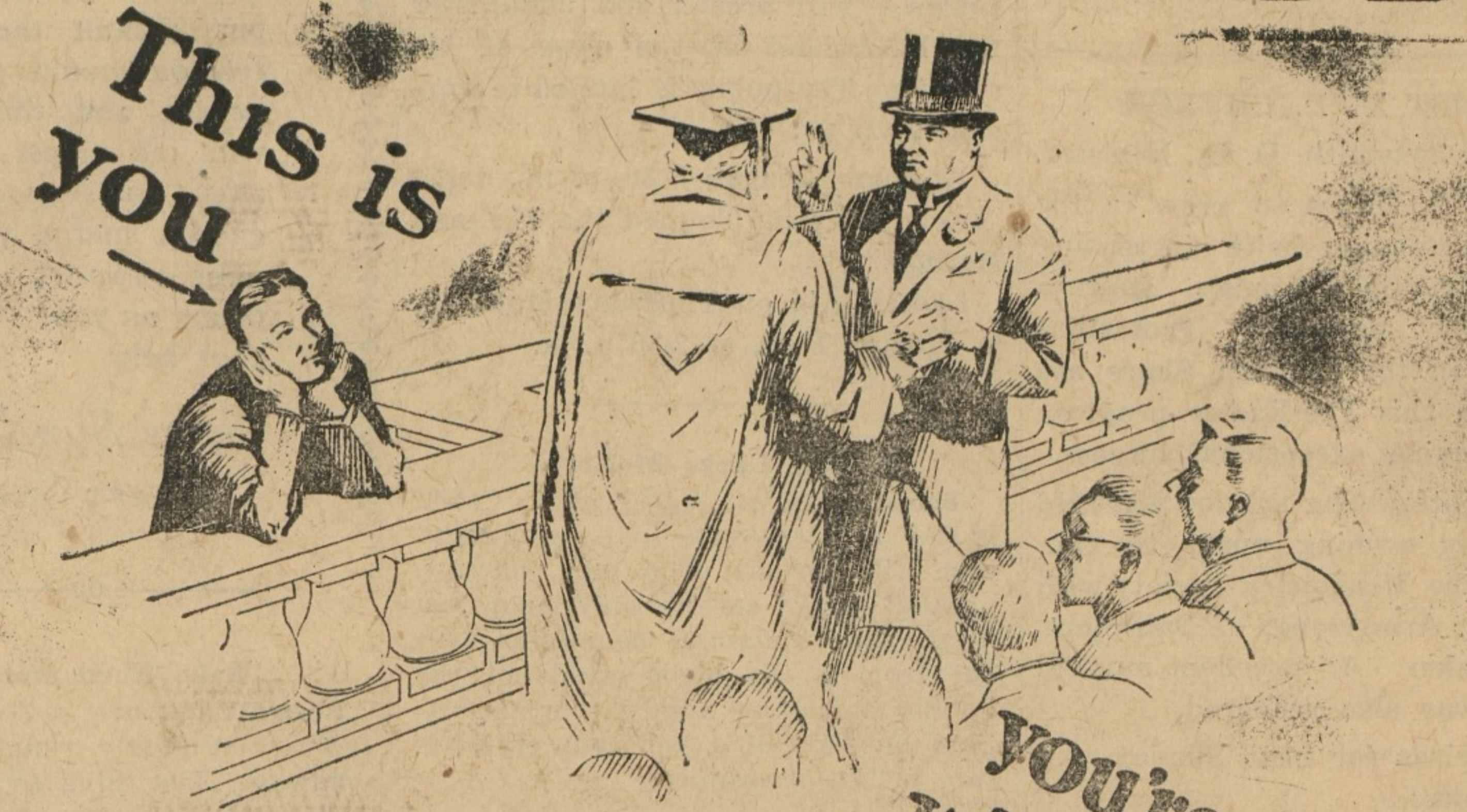
and ushers wore dark blue.

The Chestertown Council D. of A., No. 58, gave a splendid banquet in Fraternal Hall Monday evening. About 100 were served after which an interesting program was presented.

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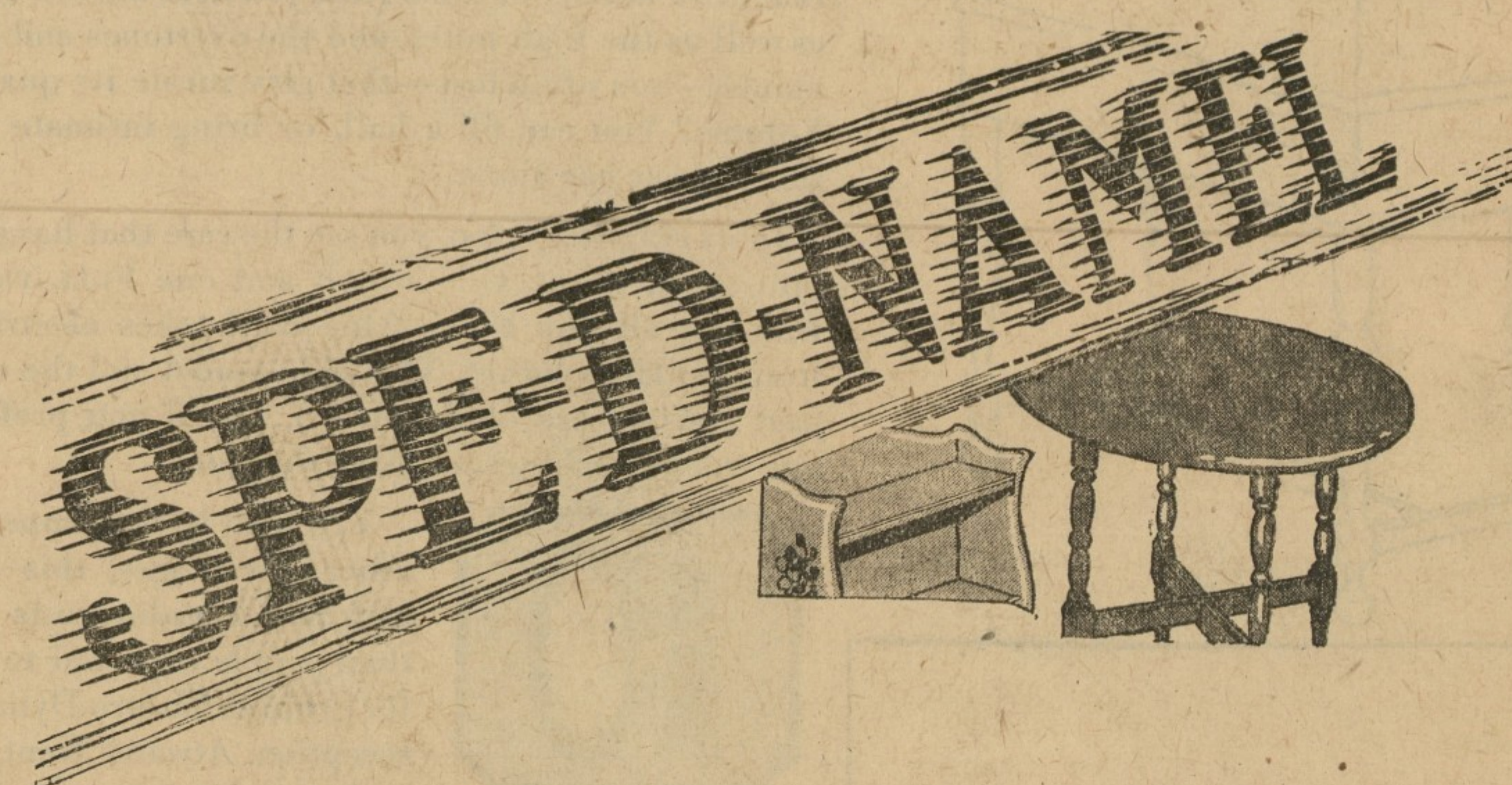
