L. Morris, a neighbor, when the dwelling was completely destroyed by fire.

Muskat trappers throughout the county are elated over a substantial rise in prices offered for furs during the week, and they have visions of \$2.00 pelts before the season closes, on March 15.

During the week local buyers have been offering \$1.60 for brown skins, and \$1.80 for black which is an advance of from 60 to 75 cents over the prices offered at the beginning of the season, January 1.

Frank Bransford, of Princess Anne, contractor and builder of the new elementary school building in Rock Hall, stated that the building will be ready for occupancy by the time specified in the contract, March 15.

The building is one of the most modern structures in the State. It is constructed of brick with asbestos shingle roof, is heated by steam with oil burner equipment, contains six class rooms, an office and library, and when completed will cost \$25,000. The County Board of Education is also having erected a \$12,000 addition to the Galena High School building to care for a greatly increased attendance. Walter T. Pippin, of this town, is the contractor. It will also be completed on time.

P. C. Lee, local sportsman, has purchased a half interest in the Centreville Arena, which stages the boxing bouts held frequently in that town. The boxing club is managed by Wm. F. Parrott, a former Chestertown boy.

P. Church Sunday morning with a violin solo. Mrs. Harmon was also the soloist at the Sunday afternoon tea given at the Chestertown River Yacht and Country Club Sunday afternoon. She was accompanied by Miss Russell on the piano.

Mitchell McKewn, of Elkton, has been awarded the contract by the postoffice department for carrying the mail between Elkton, Chestertown and Centreville, commencing this month. The round trip daily is over 100 miles.

Miss Sara Harris, daughter of Mrs. Evelyn Harris, of Betterton, won the distinction of being the only freshman at the Teachers' College, at Fredericksburg, Va., to make the Varsity basketball team. Miss Harris was active in the athletic life of the Chestertown High School.

The largest single haul of fish reported to have been made in Chester River during the Winter was taken last week by fishermen at Quaker Neck Wharf, who caught 25 barrels of white perch, part of which were shipped to New York and the remainder to Philadelphia markets. These fish have been retailing in Chestertown markets during the week at 25 and 30 cents a pound, and the Quaker Neck Wharf catch is believed to have been the richest haul made in this section for some time.

Tuesday, April 2nd, has been set as the date for the annual banquet of the Chestertown Volunteer Fire Company. William L. Fowler was named chairman of the committee on arrangements. At the banquet the award to the member of the active list making the best record in the past year will be presented.

The total membership of the Kent County Chamber of Commerce has been increased to 125 during the past month by the addition of the following members: Walter M. Kenly, of Rock Hall; Leonard C. The Mercantile Section of the chamber is arranging to stage its first Community Day which will assume the form of a fashion show of goods and styles to be offered during the Summer season.

DEATHS

James Edwin Hurlock died suddenly at his home in Millington at 10 p. m. Sunday of apoplexy, aged 76. He is probably the second wealthiest man in Kent and a citizen of great industry and of high character. He was one of the largest landowners in this and adjoining counties. He had been connected with the Kent County Savings Bank here for 35 years serving as a director of that bank.

The funeral was held Wednesday at 11 a. m. at his late home. Rev. J. H. Garner, rector of Holy Cross Chapel officiated and was assisted by Rev. Roy L. Faves, pastor of Asbury M. E. Church. Wells Fairies, of Smyrna, Del., was the undertaker and interment made in the Odd Fellows' Cemetery, Smyrna. The active pall bearers were Samuel G. Caldwell, of Galena; Lewis Dreka, of Sassafras; E. Thos. Massey, of Massey; Leonard Wilson, Paul Comegys, Robert M. Logan, C. M. Melvin, Jr., and W. Leo Gale. The honorary pall bearers were directors of the Kent County Savings Bank, of Chestertown.

Besides his widow, who before her

marriage was Miss Margaret Louise Crawford, he leaves one daughter, Mrs. S. T. Pippin and two small grandsons, William Edwin and James Thomas Pippin, of Millington, also one brother, Walter Hurlock, near Sassafras.

The body of James Alfred Merritt, son of the late James Alfred Merritt, who died in Denver, Col., where he had been stationed as a member of the United States Army, was brought here last week, and interred in St. Paul's P. E. Cemetery. Services at the grave were conducted by the Rev. Chas. L. Atwater of Emmanuel P. E. Church. He was a member of one of the most prominent families in this county. He married Miss Eloise Ringgold, a niece of the late Chief Justice James Alfred Pearce, of the Maryland Court of Appeals. He is survived by a wife and two children.

George Usilton, 45, died at his late home in Worton, on Tuesday morning at 9.30. Funeral services were held from his late home Friday morning at 11 o'clock, interment in Chester Cemetery; undertaker, B. F. Fellows, of Still Pond.
