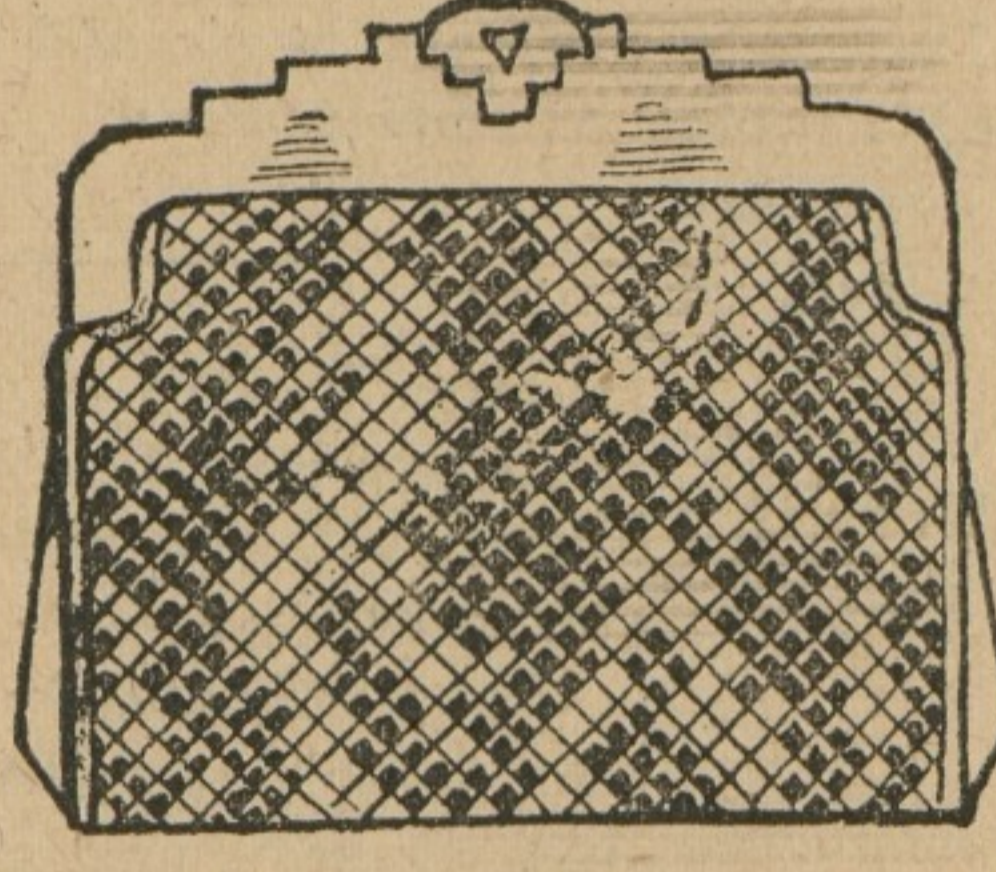
Mrs. James Brinman was operated on at the Hahnemann Hospital in Philadelphia, Thursday by Dr. Northrup.

Mrs. Hesse Miller, of Chester, Pa., rendered a fine solo at Christ M. P. Church Sunday morning.

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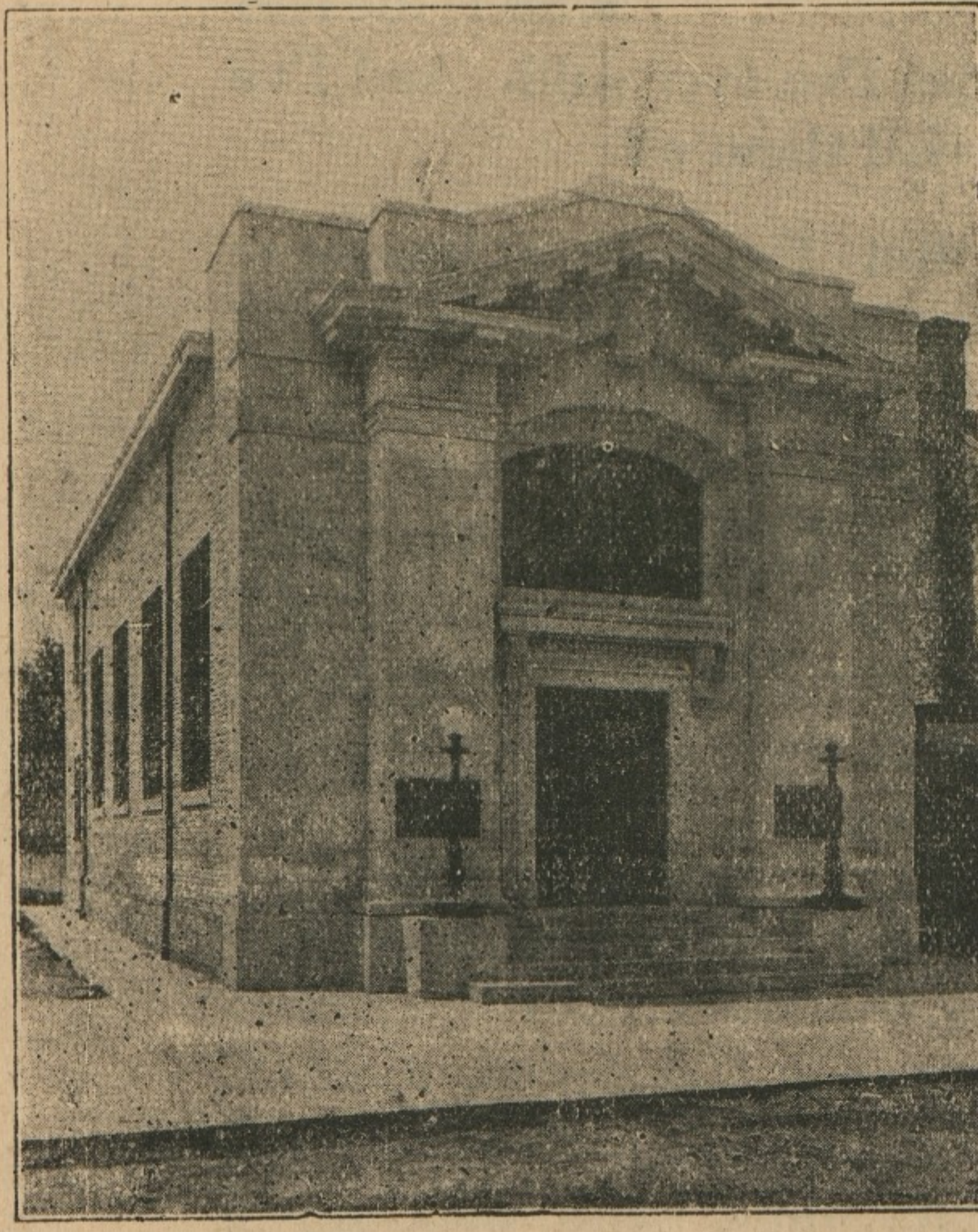
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
