A NEWSPAPER REPORTER'S TESTIMONY

In 1913, I was covering police headquarters in Kansas City, Mo., for the Kansas City Star. Kansas was dry, Missouri was wet. There were four police stations at that time in Kansas City, Kansas, a city with a population of 100,000. Saturday nights the calls would pour into police headquarters, and by midnight the patrol wagons would have every cell filled with drunks from the state line.

In 1918, I covered the same police station for the summer. What a difference! The city now had a population of 120,000. There was only one police station now, besides the headquarters. Many a Saturday night we would remain in the press-room until 2 o'clock Sunday morning, and not one trip would the patrol wagon make. Missouri was now dry under national prohibition and the wettest block in the nation was no more.

And still some people try to tell us there are more "drunks" now than in the days of the saloons!

DIRT ROAD SECTION FIRST DISTRICT

April 16, 1929.

Editors of Kent News, Chestertown: Gentlemen:—Would it not be wise to face the facts on the present financial condition of Kent county before adding an additional tax as advocated by the sponsors of the two Road Issues?

I am told 80 per cent of the farm land of Kent county is mortgaged 70 per cent for its full value and at present paying only about 3 per cent on the investment. These figures show farm property is no longer a safe investment at a fair money value of 6 per cent.

Town property is mortgaged up to about 60 per cent and is not a paying investment in the smaller towns but pays only in Chestertown, Rock Hall, Kennedyville and Betterton. Thus is condition of property owners.

The tenant farmer had no crops last year, lost his cattle in the test, hogs died of cholera and all his labor forced him to go to a farm company and purchase a car for their undivided use. So he cannot stand any more taxes sure. The teachers last month received but 60 per cent of their salary and there is no money for roads, it has all been spent.

The public officials have not been paid. The merchants of the county have extended credit until they cannot extend it longer. The fellow with a little home and patch of ground cannot pay his taxes and insurance. The patrons of the Kent News, Transcript and Enterprise owe for notices, advertisements and subscriptions.

The laborer cannot feed his family and pay rent, so face the facts and tell me who can pay this additional tax. And who will this road building benefit? Only places used as feeders to the present State Road. People living on way back roads like I do will go on just as we always did.

I answer, yes I was born and raised in Kent county, still live here and love the dear old place better than any spot in the world.

Yes, like the rest I ride in a tin lizzie when I can buy or get trusted for a little gasoline but admit I am not able to own a wheelbarrow.

Should we not pay up the outstanding bonds before issuing more? If I am wrong tell me so and I will come down to your office, go over to the Court House steps and make you a public apology.

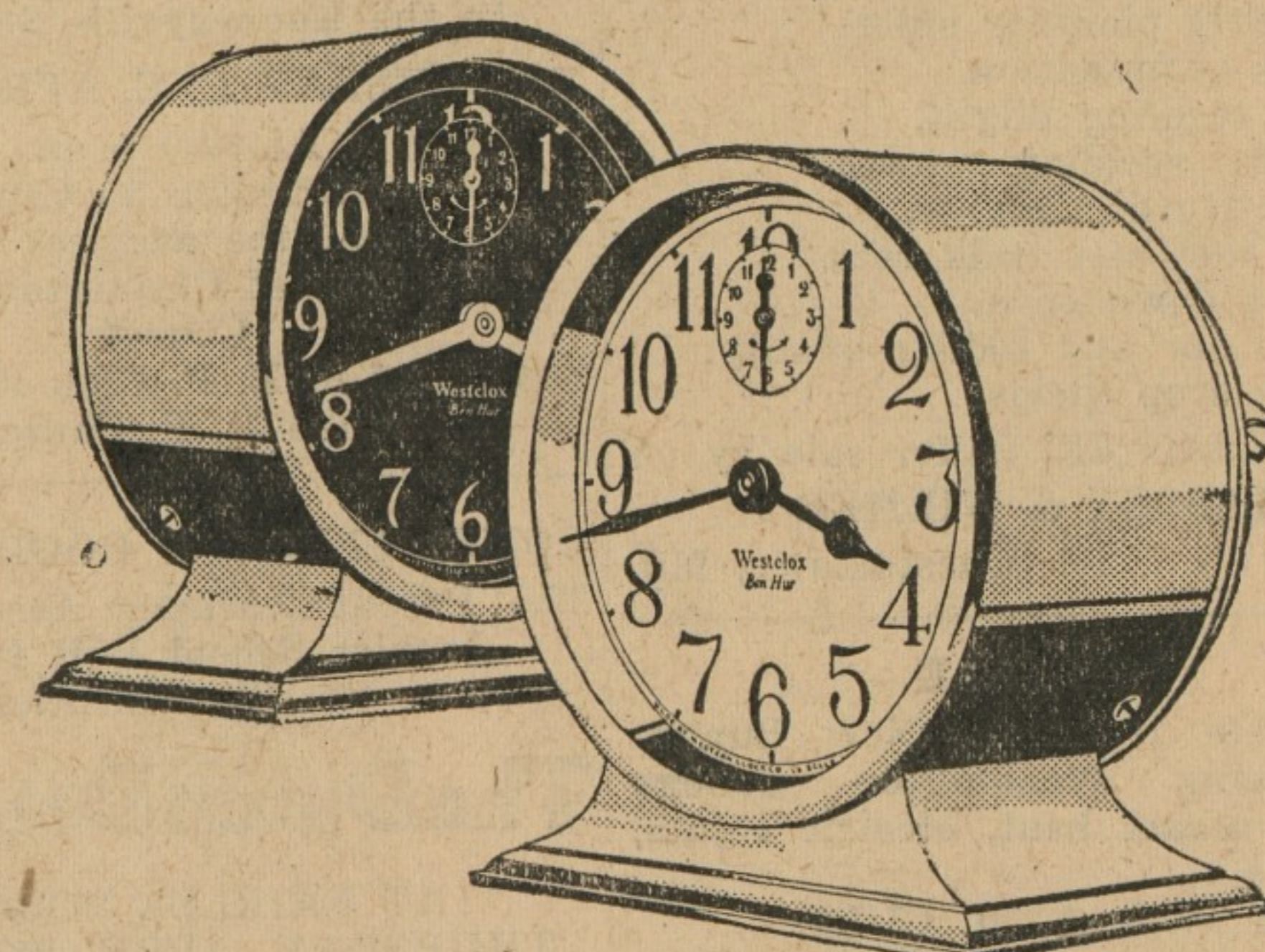

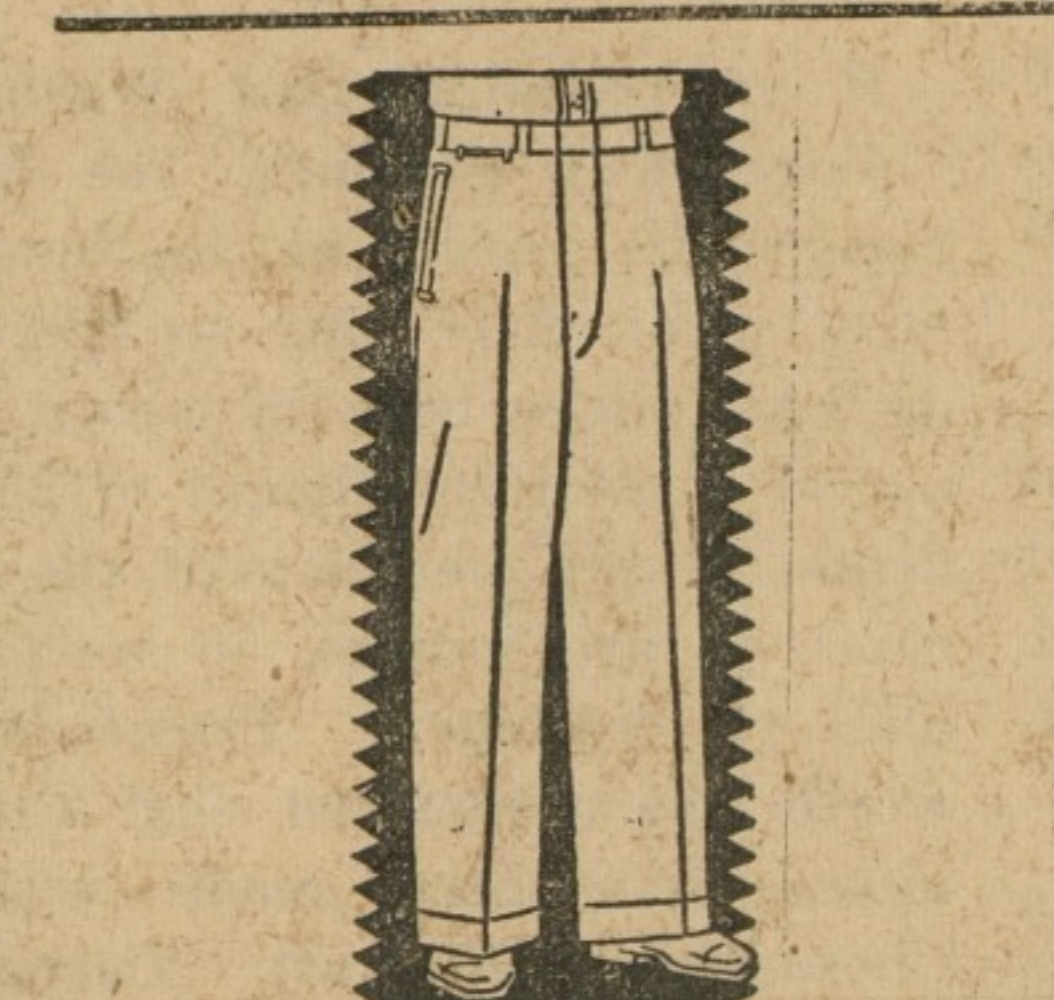
