Healthy work with the Maryland Tuberculosis Association will go a step further this year, if response and cooperation from the counties enables them to carry through a widening schedule.

Plans have been made to open, during the month of May, the Children's Preventorium at Claiborne, as a Vacation House for frail young women employed in stores, factories and offices.

Applications will be considered from women between the ages of 18 and 25, who are 10 per cent underweight, tuberculosis contracts, or in need of such a wholesale vacation as the Preventorium can offer. No one will be accepted for a period of less than two weeks. A nominal charge of \$5.00 a week will be made for each guest and the number will be limited.


In order to open the Preventorium for this program, it is necessary that a sufficient number of registrations be received by the middle of April. For, unless the interest of the counties in such work warrants the project, it is useless to attempt it.
