

KENT COUNTY ROAD BONDS

Vital Questions and Answers
Prepared by The Kent Co. Chamber of Commerce

ELECTION, SAT. MAY 11

- 1-Q. What is the amount of the bond issue proposed for building roads in Kent County?
A. \$1,000,000.
- 2-Q. How many propositions will be laid before the voters of Kent County on May 11th, 1929?
A. Two.
- 3-Q. What are the two road propositions on which the voters will have to decide?
A. (1) A bond issue for \$900,000 to build concrete roads on the secondary system. (2) A bond issue for \$100,000 to build slag roads on the tertiary system.
- 4-Q. What will it cost the County to be bonded for \$900,000 for concrete roads?
A. Interest, only, as the State pays the principal.
- 5-Q. What will it cost the County to be bonded for \$100,000 for slag roads?
A. The County will have to pay both the principal and the interest.
- 6-Q. Why is it necessary to pass both proposals?
A. Concrete is necessary for the heavy traveled roads while slag is suitable only for light traveled roads. Both concrete and slag are required for an economical and satisfactory road system.
- 7-Q. What is the life of these sets of bonds?
A. The \$900,000 bond issue will be paid off in ten years. The \$100,000 bond issue will be paid off in twenty years.
- 8-Q. How will the principal of the \$900,000 bond issue be paid off?
A. By the State from funds allocated to Kent County from the gasoline tax and the lateral road fund.
- 9-Q. How will the principal of the \$100,000 bond issue be paid?
A. By the County from funds provided for that purpose.
- 10-Q. What is the present county tax rate and what will it be by years during the life of the bond?
A. The present county tax rate is \$1.54 and the increased rate by years for this bond issue will be as follows:

- 11-Q. What will these two issues mean in average tax increase for the period of twenty years for the man whose property is assessed for (a) \$1,000, (b) \$5,000, (c) \$25,000?
A. (a) \$30.
(b) \$4.50.
(c) \$9.00.
(d) \$22.50.
- 12-Q. What is the average assessment of property in Kent County?
A. \$4,000.
- 13-Q. What would the average man's increase in taxation

- A. \$3.60 increase.
- 14-Q. How many miles of road are there in Kent County?
A. 425 miles.

- 15-Q. How many miles of road can be abandoned?
A. 50 miles.
- 16-Q. How many miles have been paved?
A. 70 miles, complete primary or main fares.
- 17-Q. What are the other of roads in the County how many miles of (a) Secondary, 68 (b) Tertiary, 80 miles traveled, 157 miles.
- 18-Q. How many miles of concrete roads will be provided?
A. Approximately fifty miles of nine-foot concrete.
- 19-Q. How many miles of slag will be provided?
A. Fifty miles.
- 20-Q. How many additional miles of slag road can the County Commissioners build by the use of 10c of the present 20c county road tax as provided by the law?
A. Seven miles per year.
- 21-Q. Who will maintain the miles of concrete road to be built by the State out of proceeds of the \$900,000?
A. The State Roads Commission without cost to the County.
- 22-Q. Who will maintain the fifty miles of the slag road to be built by the County from the proceeds of the \$100,000?
A. The County out of its own funds.
- 23-Q. Why should the County be interested in getting as many miles as possible under concrete?
A. The State maintains all concrete roads. The more it takes over the less the County has to keep up, thereby increasing the amount of money available for the county roads.
- 24-Q. What chance does the average man now living on a dirt road have of getting a hard surface road?
A. Two chances out of three.
- 25-Q. What is the present average distance of a man not on a hard surface road from such a road?
A. Five miles.
- 26-Q. What will be his average distance after the road program is completed?
A. One mile.
- 27-Q. What is the advantage of the bond issue plan over the program of State and County construction?
A. With the bond issue, good roads will be accomplished in two years. Under the present program it would be approximately thirty years.
- 28-Q. When this program is completed how will Kent's road system compare with other counties of the State?
A. It will equal and probably surpass any county in the State.
- 29-Q. What difficulties does the landlord with a farm on a dirt road encounter in securing suitable tenants?
A. A progressive tenant refuses to be hampered by mud.
- 30-Q. How will the coming of good roads influence the outsider who desires to come to Kent County to live?
A. Good roads are bound to attract new citizens from outside.
- 31-Q. What obligation has Kent County to the State of Maryland to improve its road system.
A. The future prospects of Kent County are particularly bright at the present time. Contributing to this condition the last Legislature was exceptionally generous in their appropriations for our development. Authorizations were made for a new Chester River bridge, an Armory, and United States Government postoffice and necessary legislation was passed to make certain the construction of the Chesapeake Bay bridge together with its approaches, all of which will mean the greatest advance that has ever come to Kent County.
