A KENT GIRL TAKES HONORS

Miss Mary Ingersoll, of Quaker Neck, the only girl entered in the Fifth Annual Live Stock Day of the University of Maryland, and the first girl ever to compete in contests which featured the day, Saturday won the sweepstakes prize in the fitting and showing contest, the outstanding event on the program, with a Dorset-Merino sheep.

In addition to carrying off the sweepstakes prize, which consisted of a loving cup donated by the faculty of the dairy and animal husbandry department, Miss Ingersoll won two ribbons and a championship medal. The medal given by the Alpha Gamma fraternity, was for the championship in the sheep division, and one of the ribbons was for first place in the Dorset-Merino Class. The other was for second prize in the Guernsey Class of Dairy Cows in which she also competed.

BETTERTON WHARF SOLD

It is reported the Tolchester Company has sold its wharf property at Betterton to Howard Turner, representing some Philadelphia interests.

Mr. Turner states the Tolchester Line will continue to run their summer excursions to Betterton and also the wharf will be made a gathering place for yachts at the head of the Bay.

A gasoline station for power boats will be established and other improvements made. Eventually it is hoped a contract will be made with Wilmington and Philadelphia to establish this point as an excursion resort.

The object of the new company will be to develop a greater interest at the Head of the Chesapeake Bay.

COMMENCEMENTS

IF BOND BILLS PASS TODAY

Following the publication last week of the list of roads to be improved by concrete and slag should the two bond issues be voted upon Saturday pass, numerous protests were received by the County Commissioners and the Commissions in session with the Citizen's Committee Tuesday proposed for improvements.

It was estimated by officials of the State Roads Commission that a mile of 16-foot concrete road would cost \$25,000 and a mile of 9-foot concrete road would cost \$18,000.

All of the concrete roads under the proposed construction plan are 9 feet wide except those started last year at Millington and Massey. These will have a 16-foot width.

One of the most important changes was to give a concrete road from the Chestertown concrete road up the Morgne river road to the village of Morgne.

The County Commissioners realize that there are still some roads in the County which should be improved. They also realize that more concrete roads are proposed in the First and Second Districts than in the other Districts of the County but they feel this is just in view of the fact that both the First and Second Districts have nearly twice as much road mileage as any other District in the County.

The County Commissioners have pledged themselves to faithfully carry into execution the construction of the roads as outlined in this program and if the citizens desire that the county be relieved of its present intolerable road condition and permit practically every resident to have improved roads at or near his gate, then both issues should be approved.

The Commissioners concerned with the suggestion to use concrete on the secondary roads and slag on the branches or tertiary roads. The concrete roads will be immediately taken over by the State for construction and maintenance. The slag roads will be maintained by the county. It is proposed to advertise for bids and construct the slag roads by contract.

QUARTERLY MEETING AT WASHINGTON COLLEGE

The Board of Visitors and Governors of Washington College held its quarterly meeting Saturday. It was voted at the meeting to confer the honorary degree of Doctor of Laws upon Colonel Hiram S. Brown and the honorary degree of Doctor of Divinity upon E. H. Dashiell. Clarence Poe, of North Carolina, who was last year voted a degree of Doctor of Laws but was unable to receive it will have it conferred at the coming college commencement.

The Board also announced that from a donor, whose identity was not revealed, the college has received \$6,600. The gift came through Secretary Clarence Perkins, of Baltimore.

Prof. Lawrence Ford, who has been on a leave of absence this year, will return to Washington College next term as assistant professor of Latin and Romance Languages. Prof. and Mrs. Ford, who have been living in Halifax, Nova Scotia, where he has been attending Kings College, will shortly leave for Europe where they will spend the summer.

They agreed to double the dormitory space for girls by duplicating the present Reid Hall. The addition to Reid Hall, a replica of the present building, will be added on the south side and the dormitories will appear as one building. Henry Hopkins, the architect for the college, is working on the plans and the college authorities expect the building to be ready for occupancy when the fall session opens.

By bringing all of the girls together in Reid Hall the Hodson and Strong houses will be freed and according to Dr. Paul E. Titsworth will probably be used as fraternity houses. With one fraternity already started and at least two more in the process of formation these houses will find ready use.

CHESTER RIVER BRIDGE

The State Roads Commission were in Kent Wednesday and stated that hearings will be held at an early date as to location for bridge. They want to please the people here and after hearing all sides will use their best judgment in locating the site. Two places are being considered, viz., at foot of High street and in Barroll's hollow.
