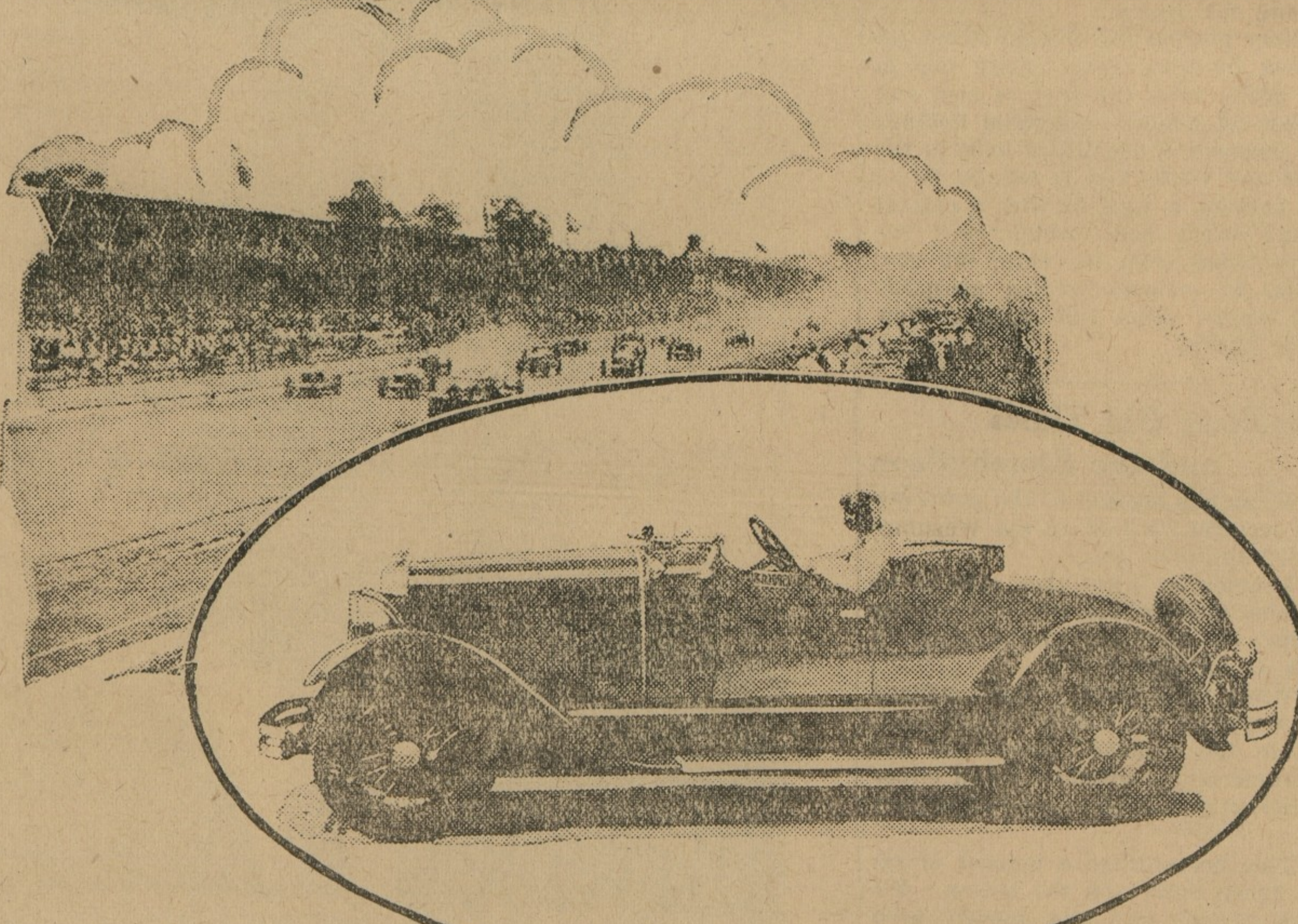

They're Off—Start of Indianapolis Grand Prix



ONE OF THE MOST THRILLING SPECTACLES in sport is the start of the 500-mile Memorial Day race at the Indianapolis Speedway. This year, Studebaker's President Eight Roadster will pace the field of tiny race cars around the 2 1/4 mile track in what is expected to be the fastest race ever staged on a big speed oval. FINE DUCKING SHORES BOUGHT

Turkey Point Farm, between Cox's Creek and Eastern Bay, on Kent Island, popularly known as one of the most valuable ducking grounds, was sold last week to a group of Queen Anne's and Kent County sportsmen who contemplate building a road into the property and also will construct a handsome club house.

The farm was formerly owned by T. Herman Palmer and the purchase price is reported to have been around the \$30,000 mark. It was rumored later that the new owners had been tentatively offered about \$75,000 for the tract by a group of New York sportsmen. This rumor, however, could not be confirmed.

The property contains 220 acres and last season its shores were thronged daily by innumerable choice wildfowl. The new owners are: Dr. C. H. Metcalfe, and Senator Dudley G. Roe, of Sudlersville; Dr. Merritt Brice, J. Paul Comegys, Millington; J. B. Metcalfe, Jr., and J. G. Metcalfe, of Chestertown.

NEGROES GO TO U. S. ACADEMIES

Three Chicago negroes have been nominated for the Annapolis Naval Academy and the Military Academy at West Point by Representative De Priest (Republican) of Illinois, the first negro to be elected to Congress for nearly 30 years.

De Priest's allotment is two candidates for Annapolis and one for West Point.

The most famous West Point negro graduate was the late Col. Charles Young, who was appointed military attaché to Liberia. He is buried in Arlington National Cemetery. Between 1870 and 1880 three negroes were admitted to Annapolis from South Carolina and Mississippi, but they left before their third year.

De Priest's secretary confirmed the report that he had submitted to the War and Navy Departments the names of three youths for admittance into the two service schools. He was asked:

"Is it true that these youths are colored?"

"I do not know about that," the secretary replied.

"That is not a factor that Mr. De Priest would take into consideration."

In recent years no negroes have been named to either school. De Priest comes from a district described as being 90 per cent inhabited by members of his own race.
