Mrs. Lola P. Brown, wife of Nelson J. Brown, cashier of Church Hill Bank, last Saturday was appointed Attendance Officer of the Queen Anne's County Board of Education, to succeed Mrs. Margaret H. Feddeman, on July 31. Mrs. Feddeman tendered her resignation on that date.

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**KENT GIRL WINS CONTEST**

Selection of Miss Sarah Myers, of Wornton, Md., high school girl as champion of the State of Maryland in the Sixth National Meat Story Contest in which high schools girls of every state took part, has just been announced by a committee of prominent home economics women who serve as judges.

The judging committee was composed of Miss Margaret Fede, chairman, home economics department, University of Nebraska; Miss Josephine Wylie, associate editor, Better Homes and Gardens; Prof. Mabel V. Campbell, chairman, home economics, University of Missouri; and Miss Florence La Ganke, home economics editor, Cleveland Plain Dealer.

Miss Myers' story was on the subject of "Meat, and Its Nutritive Value." Other subjects ranged from meat production to cooking methods. The meat story contest is conducted annually as an educational feature by the National Live Stock and Meat Board in cooperation with high school home economics instructors. More stories were submitted in the contest just closed than ever before, it was said.

The national championship was awarded to Miss Ruth Cullen, of LaGrande, Ore. The champion in the central district was Miss Emily Ellis, Ida Grove, Ia., in the southern district, Miss Genevieve Molt, Shreveport, La., and in the eastern district, Miss Elizabeth Wescott, of Marlton, New Jersey. Prizes were awarded in every state.

Another of Kent's old and respected residents has answered the last call. Mrs. Kate Rosa Beck, widow of the late George Beck, died on Monday, May 13th, at her home in Broad Neck, Kent county. She was in her 84th year.

She was the daughter of Joseph and Leonor Scott Harris. Her father owned and operated the "Packet" a passenger sail boat plying between Rock Hall and Baltimore. At that time Kent's only means of communication with Baltimore.

She was the mother of State Senator S. Scott Beck and Mrs. Samuel Emory, with whom she had been living.

For many years she was one of the prominent members of the Old St. Paul's Protestant Episcopal Church and during her early life was active in social and agricultural affairs of the county.

Funeral services were held at 2 p. m. Wednesday at St. Paul's, with the Rev. John White, officiating. Interment was made in the adjoining cemetery.

The bearers were J. Page Gale, Charles A. Jessop, Wm. B. Wilmer, Philip G. Wilmer, Dr. Frank B. Hines and Allan A. Harris. The floral offerings heaped about her grave in beautiful Old St. Paul's Cemetery were mute but magnificent tributes of affection for the dead and sympathetic tokens for those left behind.
