MARVIN SCOTT DROWNED

Marvin Scott, a colored man whose home was at Sharptown near Rock Hall, was drowned Friday morning in Chester river along the Quaker Neck shore. The man was helping his employer, Miller Glenn, pull staves. One of them broke and both men were thrown into twelve feet of water. Both were wearing gumboots. Mr. Glenn, nearly drowned, managed to pull himself into the boat before he knew that the other man was overboard. Then he caught a glimpse of Scott about 20 feet away but he had sunk before any effort at rescue could be made. The unfortunate man was 33 years old and of excellent character. He leaves a wife and two children, besides two other children to whom he had given a home for some time.

The body was recovered about four hours after the accident and an inquest held, when the scales were found very badly cramped, a condition to which the victim was subjected when in the water. Funeral services were held in Sharptown Church, on Monday afternoon at 2 o'clock, being conducted by Rev. J. O. Lockerman, pastor. Interment was made in the adjacent cemetery.

A SPECIAL CLINIC

A special clinic for crippled children and adults will be held at the Kent County Hospital next Monday morning, beginning at 10:30 o'clock, under auspices of the Maryland League for Crippled Children and the Kent County Public Health Association. Officials of the State Department of Health will have the clinic in charge and the specialist will be Dr. Harry L. Rogers, of Baltimore.

A thorough examination will be made of each child and those needing treatment will be sent to Kernan's Hospital for Crippled Children in Baltimore. Adults will be sent to the University Hospital or to Johns Hopkins Hospital, Baltimore.

This clinic will be held annually and is a great aid to deformed children living in rural districts who would be compelled, otherwise, to go to some nearby city for examination. It is hoped that parents of crippled children will take advantage of this opportunity to have their children brought in to Chestertown and examined.

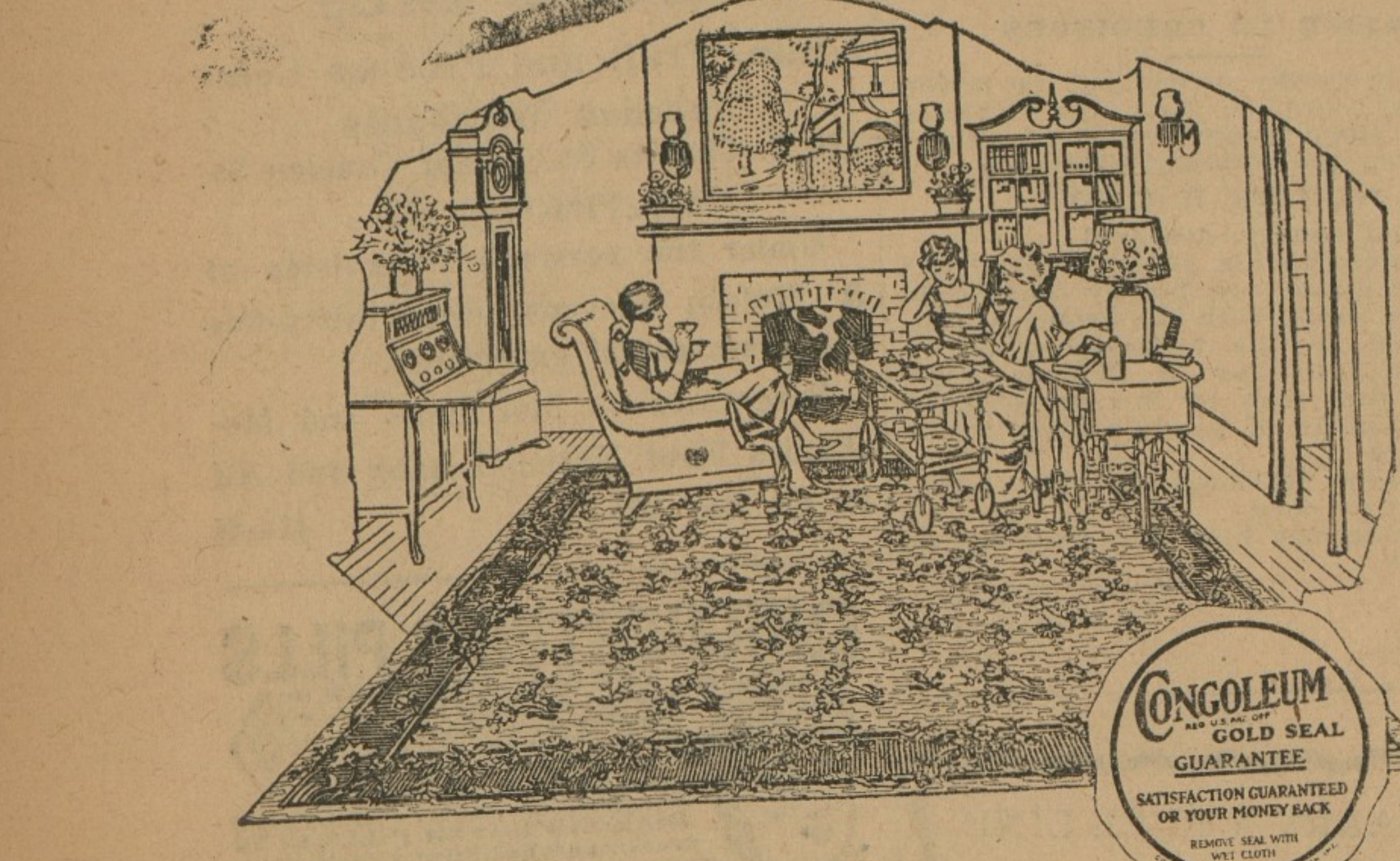
The sermon to the graduates of Chestertown High School is to be delivered in Emmanuel Church Sunday evening, June 9th.

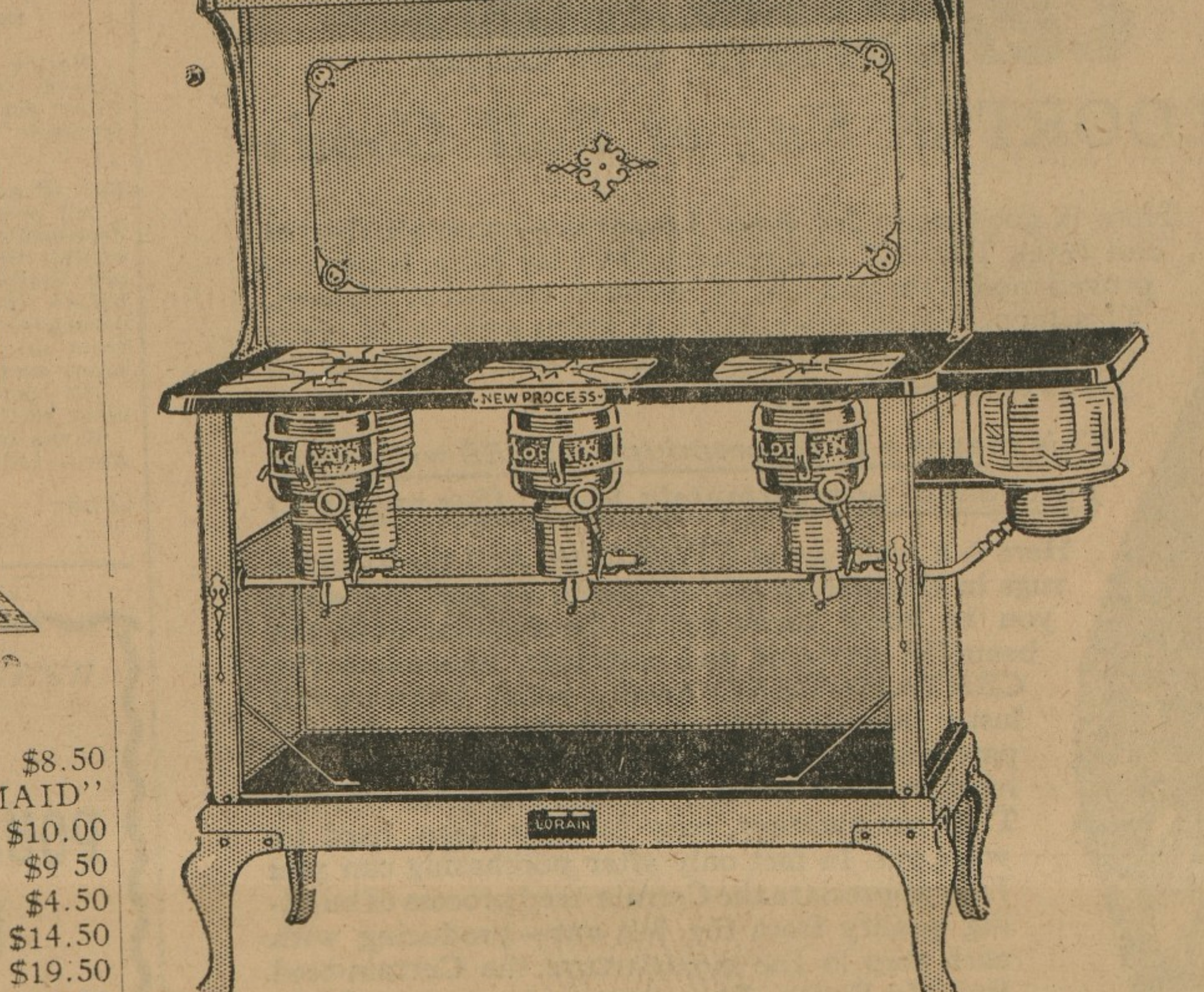

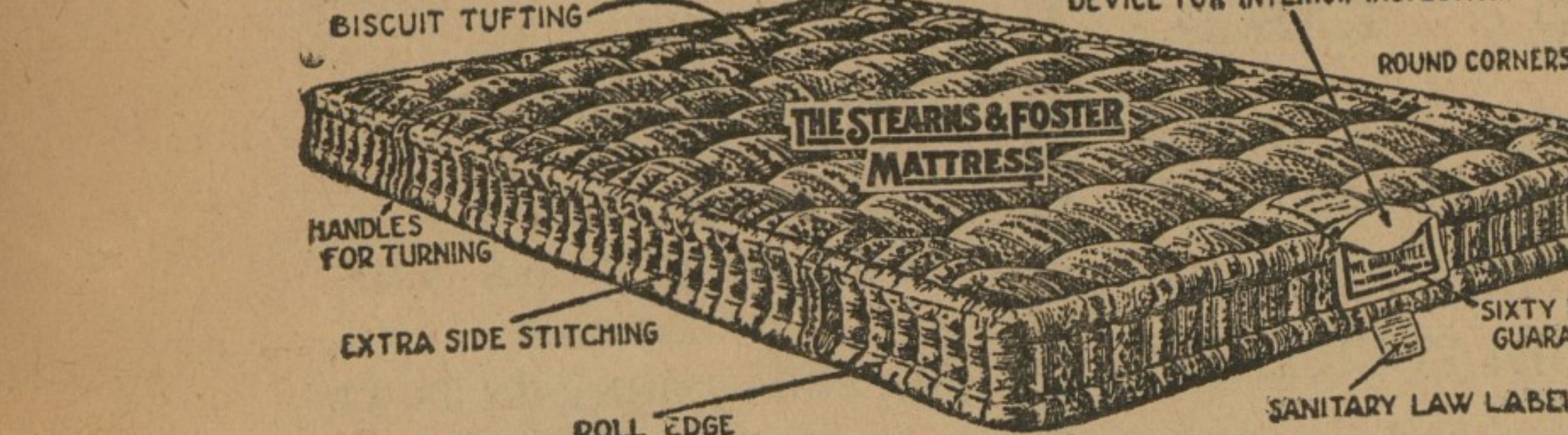

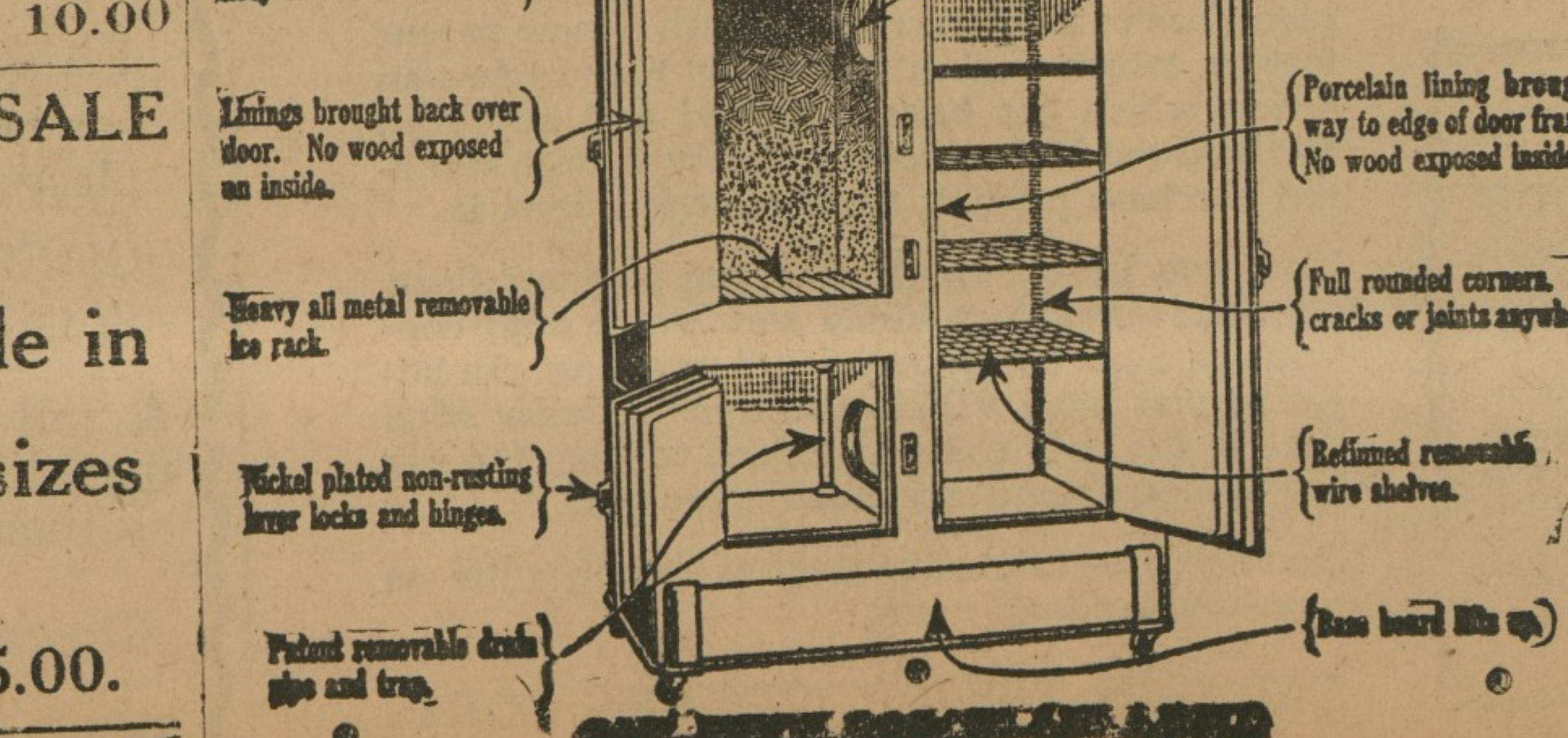
