SUCCESSFUL SEASON AT BETTERTON IS EXPECTED

The numerous reservations already listed for over Memorial Day weekend point to an auspicious season for this popular resort of Maryland's famous Eastern Shore. The excellent run of shad and large catches of other fish has been attracting much patronage this spring at the hotels and boarding houses.

The Hotel Chesapeake will this season be under the personal management of Mr. and Mrs. F. P. Jacobs, of Philadelphia, long experienced in Philadelphia and New Jersey coast resort hotels.

The recent acquisition of the Tolchester pier on the bay front here, in behalf of a new boat line to be operated from Philadelphia and Wilmington facilities for Betterton's vacationists, in addition to the fine motor highways radiating to this resort.

NEW TERRAPIN LAWS EFFECTIVE JUNE 1 ST

The new laws protecting salt water terrapins, which become effective on June 1st, has been announced by E. LeCompte, State game warden.

The laws protecting salt water terrapin were confusing. The present law, he said, makes it unlawful to take terrapin from the waters of Worcester, Dorchester, Wicomico and Somerset counties between Mar. 1 and July 1. It provides a minimum size of five inches. Baltimore City and all other counties at present have a closed season from April 1 to November 1.

IMPORTANT NOTICE TO ALL MERCHANTS AND OTHER LICENSEES Your attention is called to the provisions of Senate Bill No. 63, which was passed by the General Assembly of 1929. The provisions of the Bill are, in short, as follows: (There is imposed on all licenses, (which includes all classes of licenses, such as traders, cogarettes, billiard, garage, soda water, restaurant, plumbers, bowling alley, etc.) who fail to take out licenses in the month of May a penalty of 10 per cent of the cost of the license. In other words, licensees may take out licenses at any time during the month of May without having to pay a penalty, but on and after June 1st anyone applying for a license, who was in business in the month of May preceding, is required to pay, in addition to the cost of the license, a penalty of 10 per cent per month or fraction of a month. There was also passed at the session of the Legislature of 1929 a bill requiring a separate license for each place of business. I have no discretion in the matter and will be held accountable by the State for the collection of the penalty when my accounts are audited. Kindly give this matter your prompt attention, thereby saving yourself the penalty and me the embarrassment of collecting the same. ROBERT A. SHALLCROSS, Clerk
