DR. AMES TO HEAD HOPKINS

Dr. Joseph S. Ames was named president of the Johns Hopkins University Monday to succeed Dr. Frank J. Goodnow, whose resignation was accepted, whose resignation was accepted to take effect July 1.

Dr. Goodnow will continue president emeritus and will continue his connection with the university by conducting a course of lectures.

Dr. Ames, who is chairman of the National Advisory Committee for Aeronautics, has been the provost of the university and dean of the college since 1926 and during the absence of Dr. Goodnow has repeatedly acted as president. He is nearing his sixty-fifth birthday and is in robust health.

The presidency of the Johns Hopkins University had not previously been offered to anyone, but a number of names have been considered by the committee of trustees named to find a successor to Dr. Goodnow. All those considered have been eliminated.
