Miss Anna Hoffman, 18, of Fifth Ave., near Brown St., and Theodore Zeron, 246 Sixth Ave., Wilmington, returned to the home of Zeron's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Jesse Zeron, also of 246 Sixth Ave., early Tuesday, declaring they had been married at Chestertown, Md., and thereby hangs a tale.

Mrs. Zeron, mother of the groom, said that the marriage was somewhat of a surprise but that the young people were welcome to make their home with the groom's relatives. The couple started for Chestertown Monday morning, with Miss Hoffman's brother-in-law, David Jones, of Fifth Ave., near Brown St. The automobile in which they made the trip was of a well-known make and of the vintage of 1916.

On the way to Chestertown a puncture and two blowouts were experienced and when the bridal party made its entrance to that town it was on three good tires and one flat. They were stopped at the N. H. Holland, and Jones, the driver, was charged with driving without glass in the headlights, with having no driver's license, and with driving an unregistered car. He was placed under arrest.

It was at a late hour, but Magistrate Olin B. Stafford was aroused and a hearing was started. In the meantime Theodore Zeron has been busy. He had secured the assistance of Deputy Clerk of Court Thomas Dixon, who arrived on the scene and issued a marriage license to the couple. Following the issuance of the marriage certificate they were married by a Chestertown clergyman and returned to the trial of Mrs.

Zeron's brother-in-law, David Jones. At first a fine of \$13.90 was imposed on Jones. Much discussion ensued and the fine was reduced to \$4.90, which was paid. KENT APPLE CROP EXPECTED EARLY

Apple growers in Kent county are preparing to make shipments of their early apple crop.

For a number of years cultivation of the apple orchards has taken the place of the once famous peach orchards, which brought the growers of Kent county thousands of dollars before the "yellow" and "scale" devastated practically every peach orchard in the county. In fact, in late years more attention has been given to the cultivation of the apple crop than to any other fruit.

Growers like Benjamin F. Rash, at Worton Station; Walter B. Harris, near Betterton; Mrs. Eleanor Burns Levy, near Galena; Chas. M. Vickers and Capt. Glenn in Broad Neck; Geo. H. Watts, Worton and others, long have been recognized as among the most successful apple growers on the Delmarva Peninsula, and their early varieties are ready for market.

While the question of finding a profitable market for the crop has presented a problem in past years to the growers here, this condition has now been overcome through selling the entire orchards to large buyers or in shipping large quantities to foreign markets, where they have commanded profitable prices.

\$27,000 VERDICT TO CAMBRIDGE MAN

A jury in the United States District Court awarded Clarence D. Sewell, 58, a hardware salesman of Cambridge, Md., \$27,000 damages against the Standard Oil Company of New Jersey for injuries suffered in an automobile accident August 25th, 1927, Judge William C. Coleman presided.

Testimony at the hearing revealed that an automobile driven by Mr. Sewell was struck by a truck of the company near Ellwood, Dorchester county, and demolished. Mr. Sewell was in a hospital for many months and for seven months wore a plaster cast. The suit was for \$75,000.

ABDUCTION CHARGE

Edward Hodges, of Baltimore, was taken to Essex, Md., by police of that town Monday night to answer to a charge of abduction lodged against him by Thomas J. Estes, of Essex, whose daughter, Elizabeth, aged 17, Hodges, is alleged to have taken to Rock Hall last Saturday night.

It is alleged that the couple spent part of the week-end with Hodges' mother, Mrs. Maggie Hodges, who lives at Rock Hall.

When Sheriff J. Thomas Hadaway here, arrested Hodges at the request of Essex police he stated the girl's father had given his consent to their marriage last Saturday afternoon and that they proceeded to Westminster, Md., for that purpose, but arrived after the marriage license bureau had closed. They came to Rock Hall and expected to be married according to Hodges.

Meanwhile Estes is said to have withdrawn his consent and has had his daughter, who is under the Maryland age of consent, sent home. It was said by State's Attorney Stephen R. Collins here that, according to admissions made by the girl, Hodges may face other serious charges here later on.

FRANK MEARS DROWNED

The body of Frank Mears, 21, of Claymont, Del., who was drowned in Elk river, off White Crystal Beach Sunday afternoon, was found Tuesday by Parker Ford, manager of the beach, who had been grappling daily for the body since the accident.

Thomas King, also of Claymont, Del., another member of a party of six which drive in an auto from Clayton to White Crystal Beach to go bathing Sunday afternoon, also was drowned, but his body was found shortly after he went down. His wife was with him and she narrowly escaped with her life, her husband grabbing her when she began to sink.

No one saw Mears when he sank, and not until his clothes were found in the bathroom was it known he was missing.

Coroner Green, of Elkton, took charge of Mears' body, giving a certificate of accidental drowning. Mears was a cousin of J. Thomas Davis, of Chestertown.


