WILLIAM H. PRICE HURT FALLING FROM WAGON

Price, 70-year-old retired commission merchant of Philadelphia, is in a serious condition at Easton, Emergency Hospital following a fall from a hay wagon Monday on his farm near Millington. He suffered a fractured and dislocated hip and surgeons are said to be perplexed over his condition. A native of the Eastern Shore Mr. Price returned here about ten years ago after maintaining his commercial establishment for many years in Philadelphia.

GREAT FISHING FOR BASS

A new world's record in the taking of channel bass has been established in Del-Mar-Va Peninsula waters at Chincoteague Island, Va. Charles Beckman, of Brooklyn, N. Y., on Friday, June 29th, landed a channel bass weighing 71 pounds which was 54 inches in length, with a girth of 34 inches. The former record was a bass weighing 65 pounds taken off the New Jersey coast several years ago.

National Attention is directed to Chincoteague Island as a result of this remarkable catch. Mr. Beckman was fishing with Captain Tom White, in Koplins Slough, about five miles from Chincoteague Island. He was using a ten ounce split-bamboo tip 3.0 surf casting reel and No. 12 thread line. His bait was a chum cut from a mousbunker.

From Mr. Beckman's description of his battle with this gamy salt water giant it required thirty-five minutes to land it. On returning to the Island the fish was frozen in a cake of ice and shipped to New York where it was put on exhibition in a display window of a newspaper. Later it will be turned to the Museum of Natural History which institution will have it mounted and placed on exhibition.

Mr. Beckman is an ardent angler and has been fishing in Chincoteague waters for several years. Previous to his record catch the largest channel bass ever taken at Chincoteague weighed 59 pounds.

Capt. Edw. W. Emory, R. H. Collins and several guests spent a day fishing for bass and returned with some beauties. One of the bass weighed 37 pounds.

THE BAND AT ROCK HALL

POSTMASTER TEST FOR GALENA OFFICE

At the request of the Postoffice Department the United States Civil Service Commission has set Friday, July 26, as the date for holding a competitive examination in Chestertown to fill the office of postmaster at Galena, the term of Mrs. Minnie B. Hadley, who served four terms as postmaster, having expired.

Mrs. James Mulford, of Galena, recently was appointed acting postmaster. The salary of the office is \$1,100.
