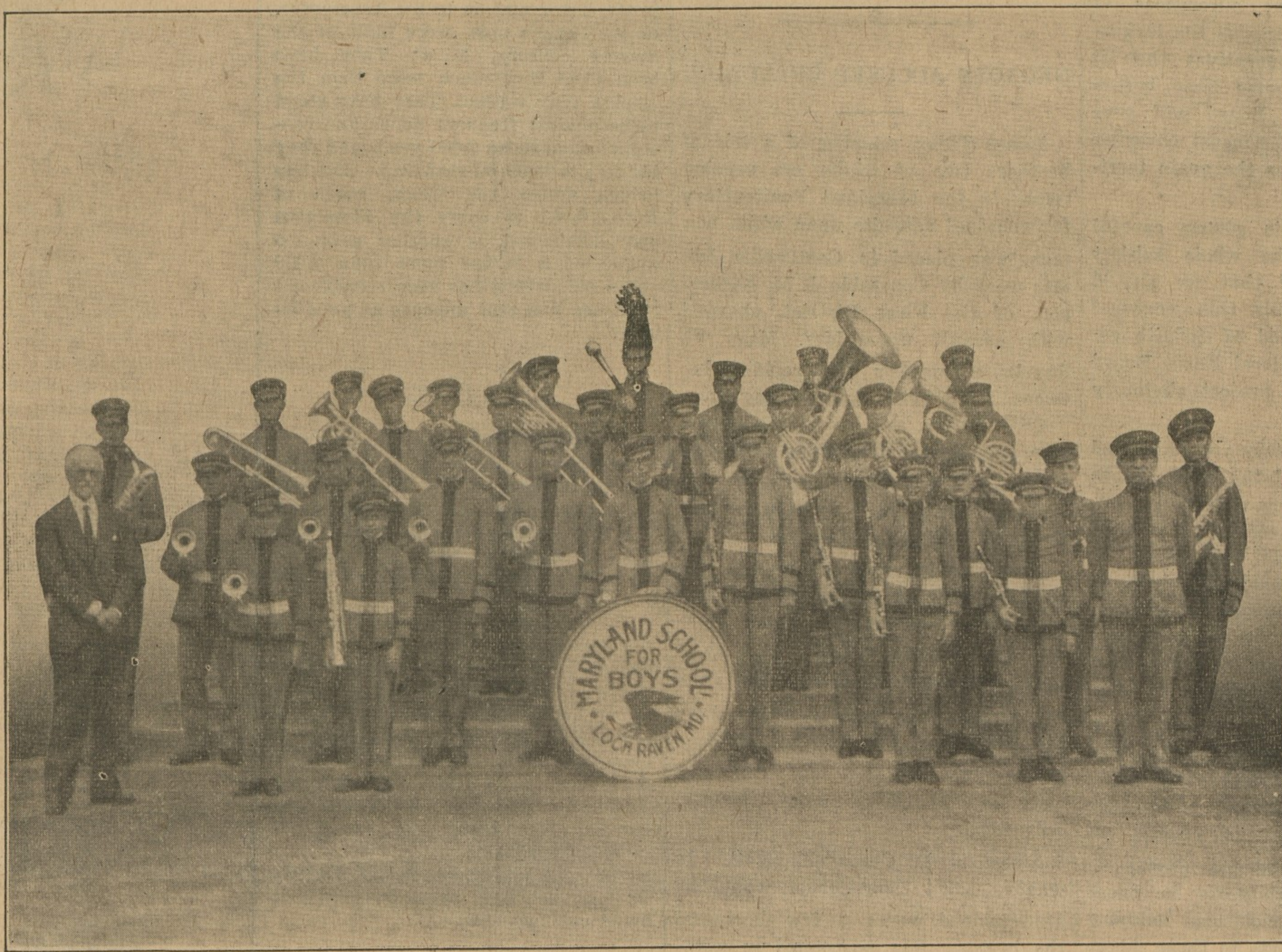

ARRESTED ON BOOZE CHARGE

Arrests under the Local Option Laws and Federal Prohibition Laws amounted to ten in Queen Anne's county.

The two alleged violators this week were:

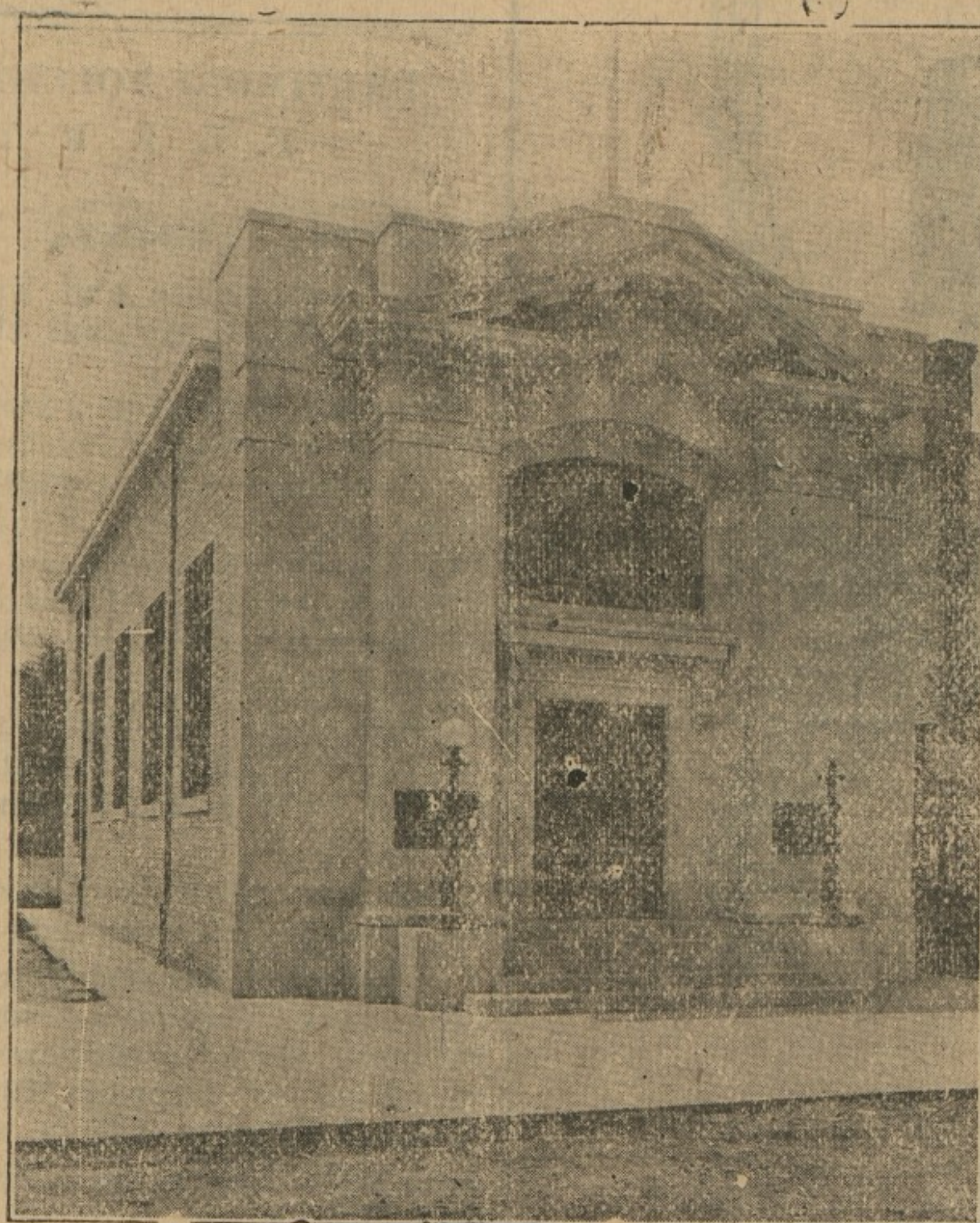
William Handy, colored, who operates a barber shop on Water street, Centerville, arrested on the charge of violating the Local Option Laws. Cooper Dorrell, white, originally of Salisbury but for some time living in Centerville, arrested by State Motorcycle officers, for moon-shining operations.

Handy was arrested Monday morning by Constable Louis B. Perkins on a warrant sworn out by Lynwood Coan, a private detective employed by State's Attorney William R. Horney. Coan testified that he purchased a pint of liquor in Handy's barber shop on Saturday afternoon at 2 o'clock. The liquor which the detective stated he purchased from Handy was submitted as evidence.

Tried in the Police Justice Court Wednesday evening, Handy was found guilty and sentenced to 15 days in jail and to pay a fine of \$50 and costs. He was represented by Attorney Thomas J. Keating, Jr., who entered an appeal. Handy was released on \$100 bail furnished by John C. Rozier, Sr., colored plumber, of Centerville.

Dorrell was arrested Thursday afternoon by State Motorcycle officers on a warrant issued by S. King White, Judge of the Police Court, Salisbury. Accompanied by Constable Louis B. Perkins the officers captured Dorrell near here and conveyed him to Salisbury. It is alleged that Dorrell has been engaged in extensive boot-legging and manufacturing operations and also has participated in several raid operations between rival boot-leg gangs.

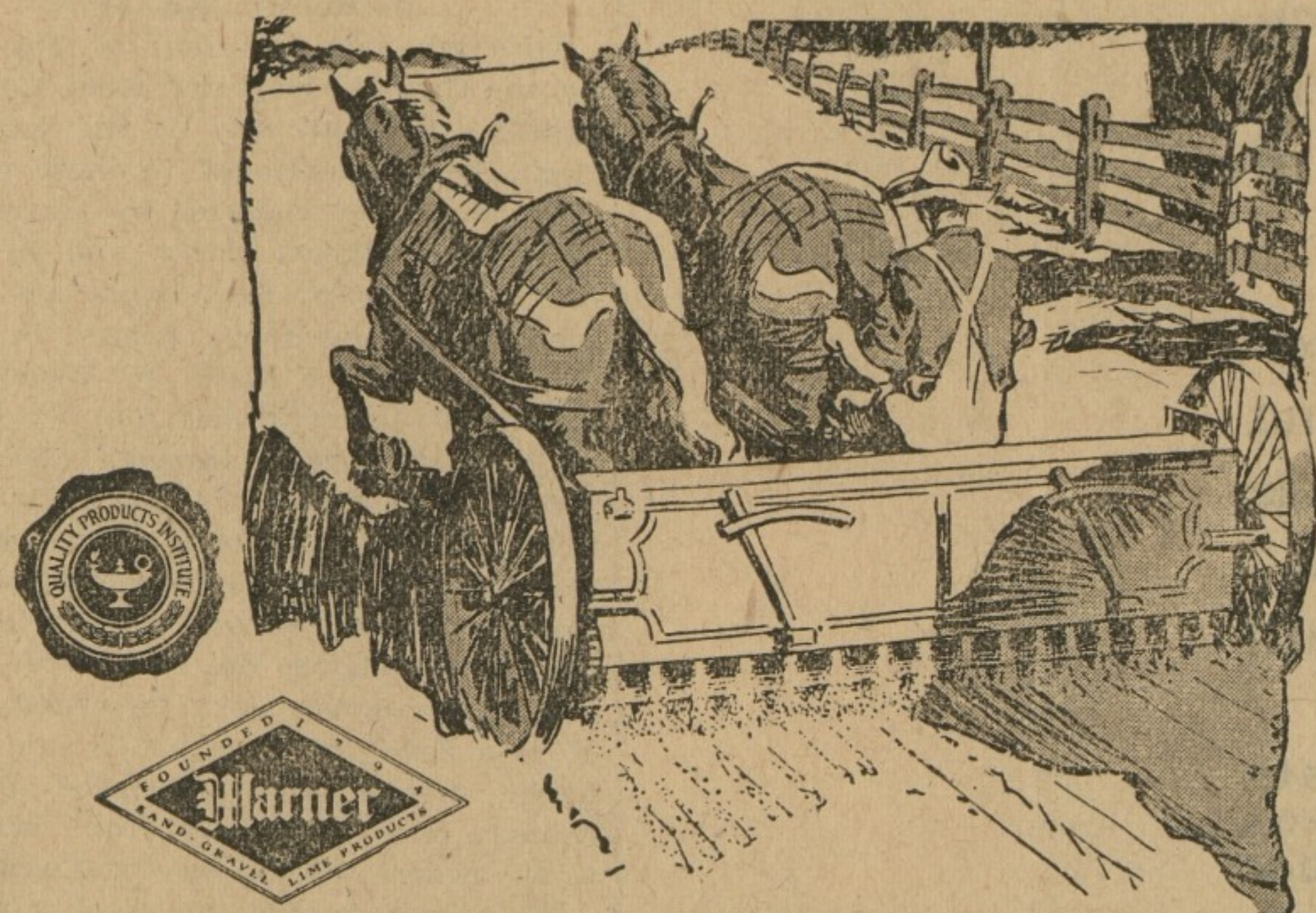
