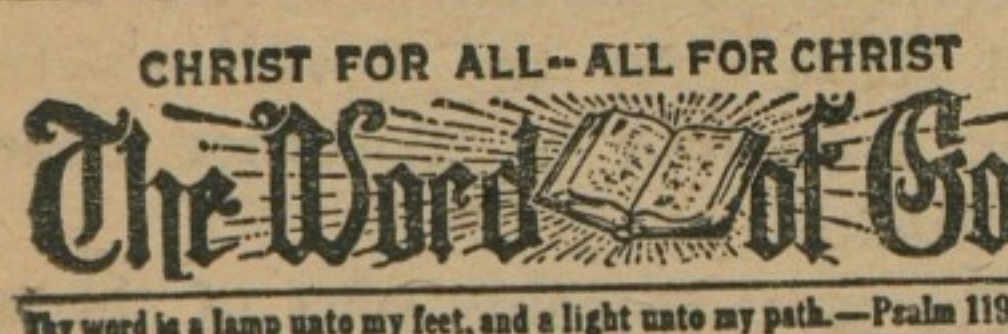


CHURCH NOTES

TURKEY RAISERS FACING HEAVY LOSS THIS YEAR

Hundreds of Queen Anne's county farmers' wives are experiencing acute difficulty this year in raising turkeys. Maladies of almost every conceivable kind have attacked the young turks, with the result that thousands of dollars worth of birds have been lost. In many instances entire flocks of from 25 to 100 have been wiped out by one disease or another.

It is reported that the turkey crop probably will be the smallest here in recent years. No explanation has been offered for the death of so many young birds, though some raisers are inclined to the belief that weather conditions, generally, have been unfavorable.—Observer.

FRACTURES ANKLE IN FALL

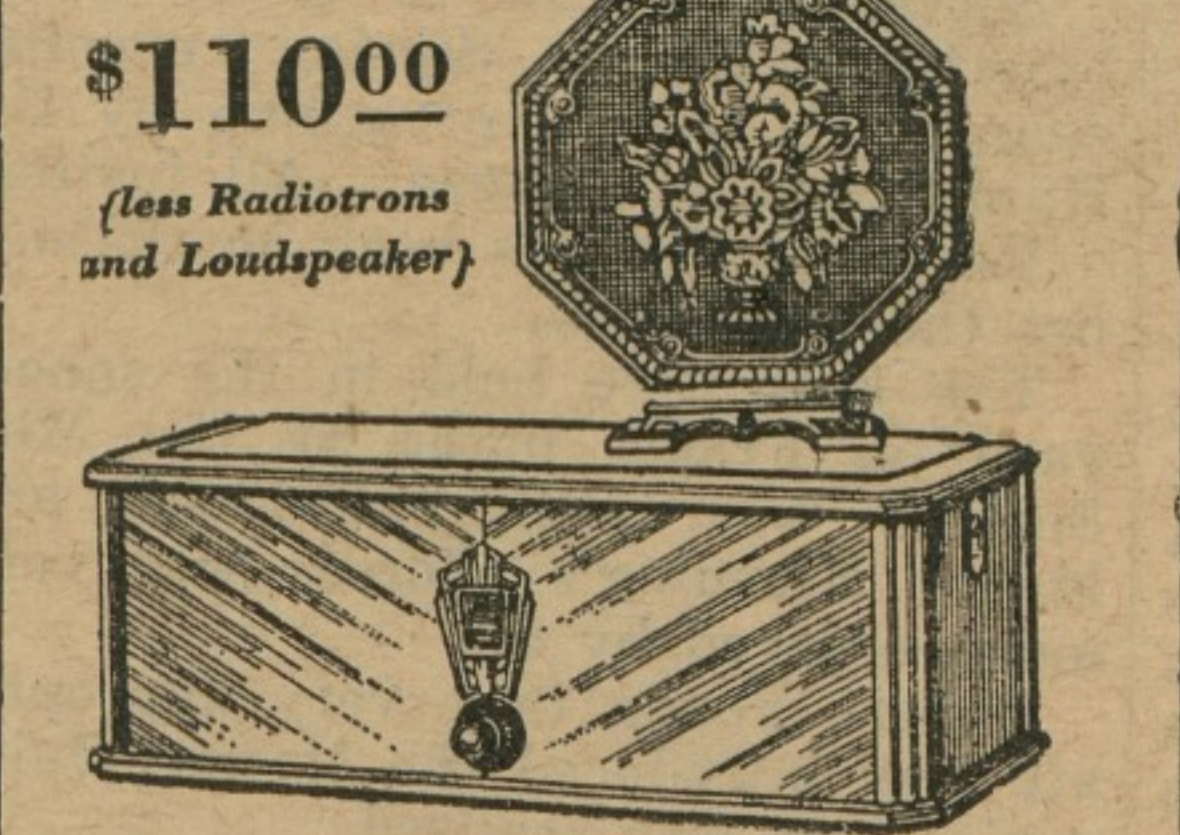
