Mrs. Minna Weer returned to her home in Baltimore on Friday after spending the summer with relatives in the community.

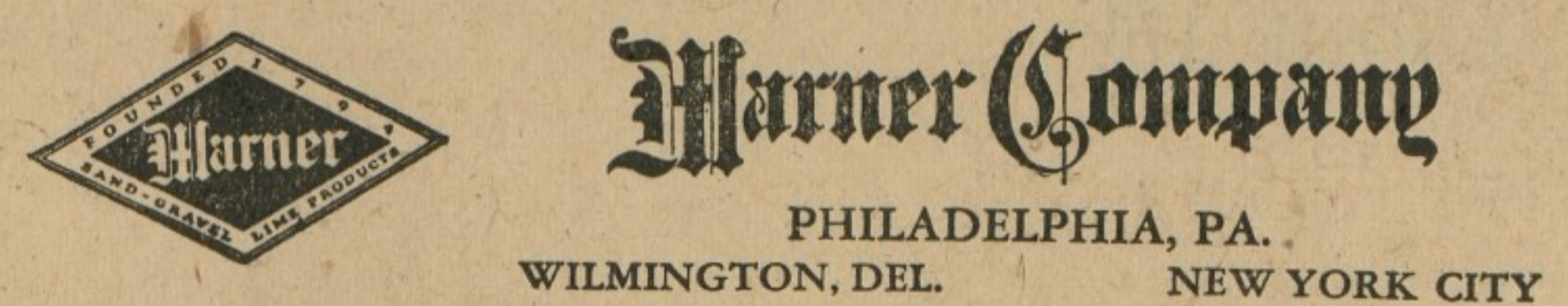
Miss Sue Johnston, of Washington spent the week-end with her sister, Mrs. James Weer.
