

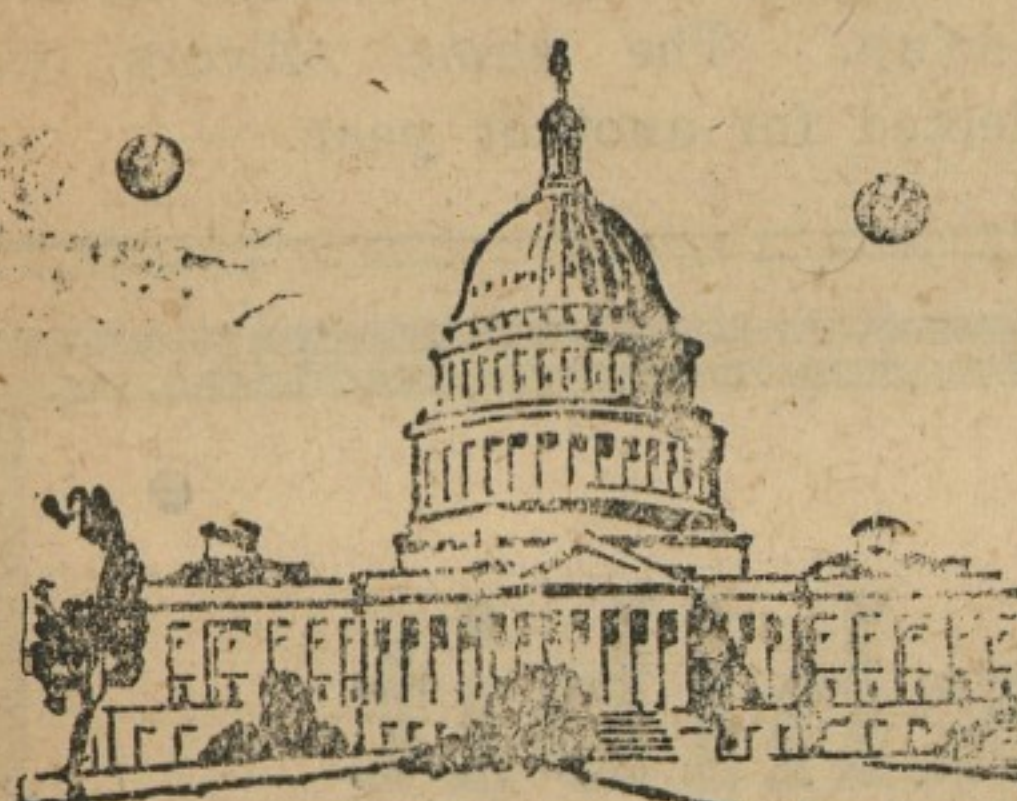

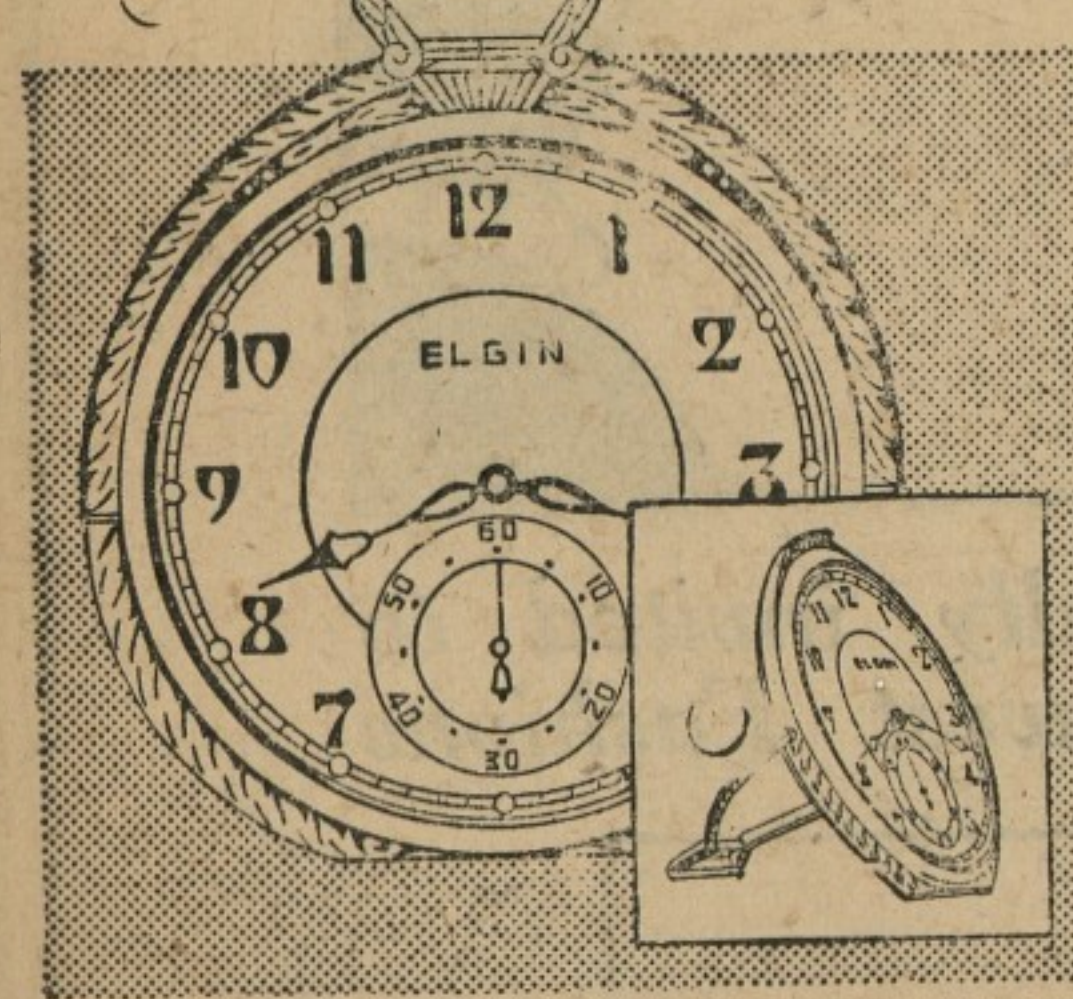

As An Agriculturalist Sees Farm Board's Job

The new Agricultural Marketing Act approaches farm relief from a materially different point of view from that of former bills before Congress in recent years, says Dean H. L. Russell of Wisconsin University College of Agriculture in the American Bankers Association Journal.

"It contains a new idea, fraught with the greatest possibilities—the organization of a Federal Farm Board," he says. "It has been possible for farm cooperatives to borrow from Federal institutions before, and at a materially lower rate than city business."

Maxims of Religion

Traced to Zoroaster

Christianity owes Zoroaster a debt in that it borrowed the devil, variously called "The Adversary" in the original Persian and "Satan" in Hebrew from the words of the Prophet of Light.

It is high time that the debt that modern religions owe to Zoroaster be acknowledged," says Charles Francis Potter, noted clergyman and professor of Antioch college, writing in the Woman's Home Companion.

"And this is not all that Christianity owes to this great thinker," continues Doctor Potter. "His was the first great philosophy of a preacher who had learned the need of a preachable theology, an attractive religion. Before his death in 553 B. C., he had formulated doctrines which resulted in the amalgamation of savage people and founded the laws of the Medes and Persians which today are examples of his wisdom and devotion to his people."
