CHAIRMAN MURRAY VANDIVER will not call a meeting of the Democratic State Central Committee until after harvest. He says the country democrats are too busy cutting wheat to take up the less profitable if not less important work of politics.

MR. CHARLES FRANCES ADAMS, one of the most distinguished citizens of Massachusetts has uttered many words—all the more to be admired since they were spoken before a distinguished audience in the great city of Chicago, where the speaker had little reason to suppose that his audience would be in sympathy with his utterance. Mr. Adams' most notable among numerous notable sentences was: "The bronze effigy of Robert E. Lee, mounted on his charger and with the insignia of his Confederate rank, will, from its pedestal in the Nation's Capital, look across the Potomac at his old home at Arlington. * * * When that time comes Lee's monument will be educational—it will typify the historical appreciation of all that goes to make up the loftiest type of character, military and civic—exemplified in an opponent once dreaded, but ever respected."

MR. JOHN DAVID URIE is managing to keep his name well in the forefront of Maryland politicians. With that girl-like diffidence so well appreciated by the citizens of his own county, he allows himself to be entrapped by newspaper reporters and quoted whenever he is found in Baltimore in a vain attempt at evading political honors which like Banquo's ghost will not "down at his bidding." The Baltimore Sun of Thursday said: "Mr. John D. Urie, of Kent county, who is spoken of as the possible successor of Mr. Goldsborough as the Chairman of the Republican State Committee, was in Baltimore yesterday. Mr. Urie said there was in his judgement, but little necessity, if any, for a change in the chairmanship of the committee, and he did not know that there would be a change. It is thought that Mr. Goldsborough may retain the chairmanship for some time, at least, and it is understood that he will be urged to continue. If Mr. Goldsborough resigns it is generally conceded that he will be succeeded by Mr. Urie."

THEY MEAN BUSINESS.

The TRANSCRIPT has never lost faith in the general proposition that a trolley line will eventually be established between Chestertown on the Chester river and Rock Hill and Tolchester on the Chesapeake bay. Time and again have the advantages to the county of such a line been pointed out and emphasized editorially. We are now, as in the past, ready to give the fullest and most qualified endorsement to this enterprise, with reasonable reservations and safeguards as to the rights of the county.

Hope H. Barroll, Esq., and Messrs. Wilbur W. Hubbard and W. B. Copper, backed by an abundance of outside capital are sufficient warranty for the bona fides of the projected enterprise. The TRANSCRIPT has always insisted that the county commissioners should demand a substantial forfeit as a safeguard against financial juggling with the people's rights. These gentlemen have met this demand, and already a portion of a three thousand dollar forfeit has been deposited and the balance is ready as soon as the county commissioners are ready to act. Assurances are given that should the request of the railway company be met, work will be promptly commenced. The surveying of the proposed line is now going on.

This is an important matter and the county commissioners should act with due care in safeguarding the county's interest. The vast importance of this improvement too, should be duly considered, and that importance should insure prompt action and the extension of the largest measure of liberality possible without infringing upon the rights of the people. It is hoped by the public generally that the commissioners will put themselves in a position to act intelligently and promptly in this important matter.
