This may or may not be the best treatment, as frequently the victim may be suffering with epilepsy, uraemia or some one of a dozen disorders. If it be a heat case, cold water applied to head and face is the best treatment, pending the arrival of an ambulance.

HEAT PROSTRATIONS.
It does not require an examination by a physician to determine a case of heat prostration. If the victim breathes heavily, with an accelerated respiration; if the face becomes purple-colored and convulsions appear at intervals, it is safe to assume that he is suffering from heat prostration, and the sooner he is hurried to the hospital or some other place where proper treatment can be administered the better.

The hospitals make special arrangements for the treatment of these cases. Buckets of ice are carried in the ambulances, and as soon as the patient is placed in a vehicle he is stripped of the greater part of his clothing and rubbed with ice while being conveyed to the hospital.

Persons who sleep in cool rooms are usually able to ward off heat prostration. A careful observation shows that in nearly every heat case the victim, after working all day in the sun rays, was compelled to sleep in a hot stuffy room. An increase in the number of cases follows a long spell of hot days and nights, and a corresponding decrease follows one or two intervening cool nights.

TEMPERATURE RANGES
In case of sunstroke the temperature ranges from 106 to 112 degrees. If it should remain at or above 109 degrees for more than an hour it is apt to result fatally. The object, naturally, is to reduce the temperature as soon as possible, and for this reason ice has become the sovereign remedy in the treatment of heat cases. Some physicians advocate bleeding and the injection of a normal saline solution into the blood; but the majority pin their faith to ice.

As soon as possible after the discovery of the patient he is immersed in an ice bath, the temperature of the water having been reduced to about 60 degrees. Frequently he is kept in the bath 25 or 30 minutes before the desired result is obtained. Naturally, if the temperature is above 106 degrees the contact of the body with water at a temperature of 60 degrees will produce violent convulsions, and after being taken from the bath the patient is strapped to his cot and the application of ice to the head is continued for some time.

In the cases of alcoholics, strychnia, whiskey, ammonia and other stimulants are given to the patient; but in cases of sunstroke not superinduced by alcohol the treatment is confined almost exclusively to external applications of ice and cold water.

HOW TO TREAT VICTIMS OF HEAT.

ICE BATHS COMMONLY USED, AND ARE EFFECTIVE.

Two Kind's of Prostration—Few Cases Are Due to Sunstroke, and Many Are Superinduced by Alcohol—Persons (Sleeping in Cool Rooms are Rarely Affected—Ranges in Temperature—How Alcoholics are Treated—Ready Appliances in Ambulances.

With the sort of weather that usually prevails at this season there are daily reports of heat prostration. Comparatively few of the men who are picked up in an unconscious condition on the street and hurried to hospitals have sunstroke. These are, for the most part, cases of heat prostration, but usually this prostration is superinduced by some other cause than excessive temperature.

There are two classes of heat cases. In the first the victims are alcoholics, who are in a debilitated condition and are, therefore, very susceptible to prostration, especially if they are compelled to remain any length of time in the hot sun. Then, there are the genuine cases of sunstroke, the victims frequently being persons of robust constitutions and regular habits. These patients do not respond so readily to treatment as alcoholics.

This may or may not be the best treatment, as frequently the victim may be suffering with epilepsy, uraemia or some one of a dozen disorders.
