RAILROAD NEWS.

Two Trolley Lines and the Removal of the Chestertown Depot Now Questions Uppermost in the Public Mind.

The work of surveying the proposed route of the Chestertown and Baltimore Railway Company of Kent county, between Chestertown, on Chester river and Tolchester Beach and Rock Hall on the Chesapeake Bay, was completed on Wednesday morning and the corps of engineers left for their homes.

While the projected railway is being given the warmest possible reception along the entire route, the enthusiasm at Rock Hall is outspoken and decided. It would be difficult to overestimate the benefit of this direct connection of the pretty bayside village by railway service with the outside world. It is understood that a delegation of prominent citizens and business men of the town will come to Chestertown on Tuesday to insist that the county commissioners, after carefully safeguarding the county's rights, deal generously with the gentlemen who would build the road. Dr. A. P. Sharp has offered rights-of-way to the water through his place without cost, and Judge George M. Sharp has been equally liberal in according rights-of-way through the valuable property of the Rock Hall Improvement Company.

The people have unqualified confidence that the gentlemen interested in this matter are acting in absolute good faith; that they propose to build the road, and it is now up to the board of county commissioners to act promptly. The people will watch with great interest the outcome of the meeting of the board on Tuesday next, when it is fully expected definite action will be taken.

Another Road.

Senator McCulloch, of Elkton; Judge Edward R. Cochran, of Wilmington, and Wilmer Emory Esq., incorporators of the Kent and Cecil Light, Power and Railway Company, came to Chestertown on Saturday for the purpose of organization. In the absence of a quorum no formal meeting was held and nothing definite was formulated. It was stated, however, that plans will be formulated and a definite proposition will be placed before the board of county commissioners on Tuesday next.

The Depot Site.

Locally, interest has crystallized this week relative to the site of the handsome new depot for Chestertown. It was literally "up to Chestertown" as to the selection of a site and right manfully have Messrs. Wilbur W. Hubbard, William E. Valliant, Charles S. Smith and others, met the issue. On Saturday M. deK. Smith, Esq., local counsel for the Pennsylvania Company, received a letter stating that they would bear \$1,000 of the expense of purchasing rights-of-way to Chestertown, and the citizens of the town would have to do the rest, and that by Tuesday. Messrs. Hubbard, Smith and Valliant took the matter in hand and a personal canvass was made, and though the subscriptions were a trifle slow the money will be forth coming and it is now practically certain that the new depot will be located at the foot of Cross street near the business centre of the town and the telegraph office will come with it.

A Special Meeting.

At a special meeting of the stockholders of the Baltimore and Delaware Bay Railroad, at their office in Chestertown on Wednesday, a resolution was passed abandoning the track between Massey and Clayton, and arrangements were made for the disposal of the rails, etc. This action was taken under an Act authorizing the company to change its northern terminus from Clayton to Townsend, and to discontinue operation of and abandon the small portion of road between Massey and Clayton. Messrs. M. deK. Smith, William M. Slay and Hope H. Barroll met the gentlemen during their stay in town. Mr. Barroll made a strong plea for an extension of the road from Worton to Nicholson's station. It was insisted that the re-establishment of this branch would be a great convenience to one of the finest farming sections in the county, and would carry to the railroad large shipments of grain, stock and fruit. Large quantities of lime would also be freighted to the farmers.

The visitors were: Supt. Holliday, Engineer Latrobe, Messrs. Rogers, George V. Massey, Charles T. Westcott, Murray Vandiver and Charles A. Lamont.

Foundation Wall Damaged.

The heavy downpour of rain on Wednesday night did considerable damage to the front wall of the new Hubbard Building. Bricks and other material had been left in the gutter, and when the great rush of water came its flow was obstructed, it spread over the sidewalk and ran into the cellar. The heavy walls were washed out of plumb and will have to be taken down and reset entailing not only considerable expense, but delay.

OBITUARY.

MRS. MARGARET ANN JUMP.

Mrs. Margaret Ann Jump, widow of the late Henry T. Jump, died of acute indigestion at her home in Still Pond Neck, at about 8 o'clock on Wednesday evening, June 25, aged 80 years and 3 months. Though Mrs. Jump had not been in good health for some time she was as well as usual on Wednesday and had eaten her supper with evident relish. After supper she was talking pleasantly with her daughter, Miss Dora, about an intended trip to Baltimore, on next Monday. Without a sign of pain or word of complaint Mrs. Jump rested her face on her hand and in an instant the end had come—she was dead. She was before marriage Miss Margaret Ann Kelley, daughter of John and Anne Kelley. She was a sister of Dr. J. Horton Kelley, of Kennedyville, and Miss Rebecca Parrott, of Still Pond. She leaves four children, Misses Dora, of Kent, Susie and Bertie, of Baltimore, and one son, Henry T. Jump.

Undertaker Krusen had charge of funeral arrangements.

FRANK QUIMBY.

A writer in the *Easton Gazette* makes the following reference to the funeral of Frank Quimby, the Washington College student whose sad death was mentioned in the TRANSCRIPT two weeks ago: "We attended the last sad services over the remains of Frank Quimby, at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Quimby, parents of the deceased, on Thursday last. The beautiful tribute of respect in well chosen, and appropriate words by student Noble of the Prayer Circle of Washington College, and of which Mr. Quimby was a member, as well as the letter received by Rev. Daniel Wilson from Rev. Mr. Roberts, of Chestertown, and best of all, the many letters penned to his mother, by his own hand while in college, are living evidences of the noble Christian life and character of the deceased."

DR. T. J. SHREEVE.

Dr. T. J. Shreeve, only son of the late Rev. Jesse Shreeve, and a brother of Mrs. Lawrence Stevens, of near Rock Hall, died at the Maryland University Hospital, Baltimore, on Saturday, June 14, 1902, of tetanus (lockjaw).

Dr. Shreeve had a slight operation performed on the bowels ten days before, which was perfectly successful though it was noticed that the instruments used were not at first rinsed off to clear them of dust. On Tuesday, June 14, he noticed a stiffness of the jaw and neck, and immediately pronounced his case tetanus and went to the hospital, where he was well known and received every attention which skilled physicians and trained nurses could give, but science failed to give relief and the sufferer died in the greatest agony on Saturday at 6:40 A. M. after an illness of four days. Dr. Shreeve was 37 years, 4 months and 12 days old. A wife and sister are left to mourn his loss. His funeral at his home in Uniontown, Carroll County, was the largest ever held in that village. Men, women and children of the community fell his loss as that of a dear friend.

Edward Ross, died of consumption, at his home between Galena and Georgetown, on Thursday, June 19, aged 27 years. Mr. Ross was unmarried. He had been a sufferer with consumption for about a year. New Wheat in Baltimore.

The first consignment of new southern wheat went to Baltimore on Friday of last week from Lancaster county, Va., and were exhibited on the floor of the Chamber of Commerce. There was one lot of 25 bags, another of 35 bags and the third of 50 bags. One of the lots, the largest, was dry, well cleaned and the berry fully developed and free from objectionable matter. This was purchased by the C. A. Gambrill Manufacturing Company at 85 cents a bushel. The next lot, about 50 bushels, was dry, but had some smut and went to C. S. Schermerhorn & Son at 85 cents a bushel. The smallest lot was sold to the Pitt Brothers' Company at 77 cents, being garlicky and very damp. All the samples were of good color. The first arrivals of new southern wheat last year reached Baltimore June 25 from Northumberland county, Virginia, and consisted of about 318 bushels. It sold at 85 to 90 cent a bushel.
