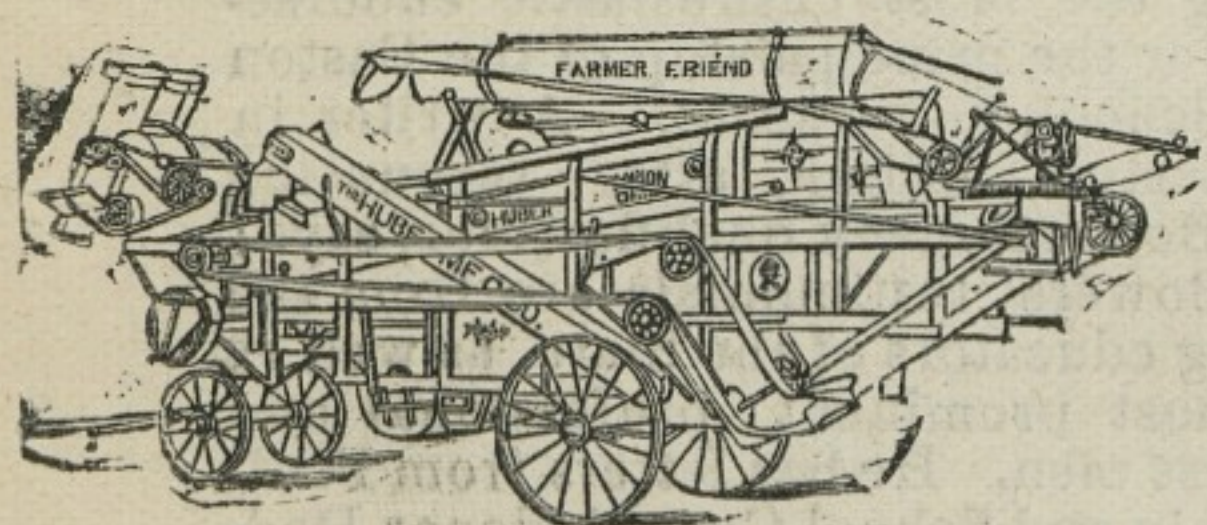

PREDICTS GREAT WAR.

Dr. Ecker, of Duluth, Sends a Letter to Mr. Roosevelt.

VISION OF A NAVAL STRUGGLE.
Man who Prophesied McKinley's Death Says
European Powers will Combine
Against America.

DULUTH, MINN., June 21.—That a dire calamity threatens the United States, that lives will be sacrificed by the thousands and havoc will be wrought from one end of the nation to the other is the prediction of Dr. A. Ecker, of this city, who has had another "vision."

His first "vision" occurred several months before President McKinley was assassinated, and he prophesied that the President if reelected would not serve out the term. So impressed is the Doctor with his latest occult message that he decided to warn President Roosevelt. He has mailed the following letter to the President:

"On the 27th day of the fourth month of the year 1902 I was in a vision at the coast, whether Atlantic or Pacific I do not know. Standing on a pier and looking out into the water I saw four or five of what seemed to be very large fish. They came quietly in with the tide, more like gunboats than fish, however. After the smoke had cleared away there was nothing to be seen in the harbor but the masts of the sunken ships. This shows how easy it is to enter many of our ports at the present time.

"Mr. President, you will excuse a perfect stranger. You cannot make ready to meet these foreign gentlemen too soon or do your work too quickly or too well."
