THE GOVERNOR has issued a proclamation declaring next Saturday, July the fifth, a legal holiday.

JUDGE WALTER S. COX, of Washington, D. C., is dead. Judge Cox presided in the memorable trial of Galtman, the murderer of President Garfield.

THE CORONATION of King Edward of England was a sad disappointment, not only to the English people but to the world at large. The King's condition yesterday gave evidence of but little improvement. His condition is critical, with probabilities that the end may come at any moment.

FOR THE THIRD time in twenty years former Governor Robert E. Pattison has been made the Democratic nominee for the Governorship of Pennsylvania. Mr. Pattison, who is a native of Maryland, was born in Quantico, Somerset county, in 1850. He was elected governor of Pennsylvania in 1883 by a plurality of 40,209 votes. In 1890 he was again elected, his plurality being 15,554.

THE SUPREME COURT, Ancient Order United Workmen, of Oregon, made a ruling on lodge laws of more than usual interest, at its recent session in Portland. The question was raised whether a Spaniard is a white man within the meaning of the regulations and it was held that he is. In Arizona and New Mexico the question was raised whether a Mexican is a white man. The decision was that Mexicans of Spanish descent are white, but that the Mexicans of Indian blood are not.

AFTER AN ALL NIGHT deadlock that was distinguished by some notable scenes, including the nomination of Hon. William J. Bryan for Governor against his will, the Democratic and Populist State conventions of Nebraska, completed the fusion on Wednesday by nominating a democrat for Governor, populists for lieutenant governor and attorney-general, and a democrat for commissioner of public lands and buildings.

COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES.

Four Graduates of the Chestertown School Presented with Certificates by Dr. D. L. Greenfield—The Prizes.

The annual commencement exercises of the Chestertown Public School were held in Stan's Hall on Wednesday evening. Through the stormy evening kept some away from the exercises, but the young men who had so creditably completed their labors in the public schools. The Opera House Band discoursed many pleasant selections during the evening, and the exercises were of a highly interesting and enjoyable character throughout.

After music by the band the exercises were opened with prayer by Rev. E. P. Roberts, pastor of the Chestertown M. E. Church. Mr. Charles Frazier Wheatley, in a clear and well modulated voice delivered the first oration, "An American Citizen." The young speaker eloquently emphasized the largeness of the blessings embodied in that short but comprehensive term. The splendid possibilities of the American boy were pointed out, and a high standard of manhood was set by the speaker.

"The Evil of Immigration" were strongly depicted by the second young orator, Mr. John Wilbur Hiron. The evils of allowing the enormous influx of foreign life into America were clearly pointed out. It was insisted that these people, as a rule, are the most undesirable elements of their own country and their presence is a menace to the purity and permanency of our own institutions. The speaker objected that a native American boy must wait twenty-one years before being allowed the right of franchise, but the uneducated foreigner, out of sympathy with and even antagonistic to our form of government, must wait but five years.

William Arthur Wheatley, in his oration dealt with the "Elements of Greatness." He was a most pleasing production. He insisted that real greatness does not consist of wealth or literary success, for man might possess all of these and still not be great. That character which makes the world brighter and better—that endures and uplifts humanity is the true essence of greatness.

Walter Lushy Nicholson, in his oration, "Yesterday, To-day and To-morrow," drew a pleasant comparison between the educational methods of the past, those of the present and the advance of the young men of the graduating class and to every young man and girl present to press on in the acquisition of knowledge and intellectual culture. Henry Ward Beecher had read and digested great volumes of history between the ringing of the bell and the coming down of the family to breakfast; many people in Chestertown found time to do wrong, and he insisted that opportunity would not be lacking for daily acquisition of knowledge did the young man or woman determine upon adding to their store of useful information. His then presented certificates to the members of the class graduation.

The address of Dr. D. L. Greenfield to the graduates was a pleasant feature of the evening. The speaker appealed to the young men of the graduating class and to every young man and girl present to press on in the acquisition of knowledge and intellectual culture. McWhorter, and Merle White a pin, given by Miss Eva Hope Weasat. The pleasant exercises were closed with the benediction by Dr. Henry B. Martin, rector of Emmanuel Protestant Episcopal Church.
