## TEACHERS IN SESSION.

Interesting Questions Discussed at the Last Meeting of the Year.

The Kent County Teacher's Association which met in Chestertown on Thursday, was well attended and the discussions were spirited and interesting.

After the singing of that beautiful hymn "Sun of My Soul," by the association, queries were collected and Miss Sophie Miller read a most excellent essay, taking as her subject "A purpose in life."

She took the position that every well-spent life's predominant characteristic should be a definite purpose, and that purpose should be the pole-star of every effort.

The paper was carefully prepared, elevating in conception and should prove an inspiration of hope to those who heard it.

The question of promotions, one of the most important which confronts the teacher, was then taken up and discussed in its many aspects.

The consensus of opinion was that the greatest danger is from too rapid rather than from too tardy promotions.

This question was discussed at length by Miss Bertha Miller and was then taken up by the association. Misses Nellie Pierce and M. C. Weer, also discussed one phase of it.

Miss Julia M. Burchinal and Miss Arula Moffett discussed the matter of marking examination papers, after which the subject was taken up for general discussion by the association.

The view most generally entertained was that examinations are, as a rule, marked too high.

This is often done to gratify the parents. After a discussion of whether or not the second grade should have written or oral examinations, by Misses Emma Davis and Nettie Hersch, and the association, it was generally conceded that the examinations in Number Work should be written, but that other examinations should be oral.

Misses Laura E. A. Thomas and N. E. Gooding gave their views of "The feature of the new course of study which makes the number of grades seven for one teacher."

As regards "Do circumstances ever justify the promotion of a pupil when he fails in his examinations?" was discussed by Misses Clara W. Staas and Mary R. Camp, after which the association took up its further consideration.

It was thought that there are possible cases where circumstances may justify the promotion of pupils who have failed in examination, but such cases are rare.
