THURSDAY'S QUOTATIONS.

WHEAT--The receipts of southern wheat today were again fair in amount, though not as liberal as on yesterday. Demand is good from all classes of buyers. Sales of cargoes on grade at 78 1/2 cents for No. 2 red, 74 1/2 for steamer 2 red and 6 1/2 cents for rejected, the greater portion of the arrivals selling on this basis. Sample lots, including small cargoes and bag parcels, brought 65, 66 70, 74, 75, 76 and 78 1/2 cents, as to quality and condition. Western today ended steady, July, 77.

CORN--The receipts of southern corn today were somewhat freer and the major portion of white, a cargo which sold on private terms. Quote prime white in round lots at 73 1/2 cents, and yellow at 75. One small parcel mixed brought 75 cents. Demand good for corn of both colors. Corn copn by the carload is quotable at about \$3.90 to \$4.00 per bbl. for prime yellow on spot. Receipts light and demand fair in a jobbing way. To arrive stuff not in favor except at a discount.
