A death of peculiar sadness was that of Miss Annie J. Foxwell, only child of Mr. and Mrs. Garrett Foxwell, on Monday evening. An only child, the undivided love and care of her parents were lavished upon her from the opening to the close of a beautiful life. With the development of a splendid physical womanhood came those charms of character and graces of manner which endeared her to all with whom she came in contact. Neither care nor expense was withheld in her education. Two years ago she graduated from school and since that time had assisted her mother in presiding over a home where the unwavering glow of an unstinted hospitality was always found.

Miss Foxwell was just twenty-two years of age. About six months ago heart trouble developed, which with other troubles, brought to an untimely end what promised to be a long and beautiful life.

Mr. and Mrs. Foxwell are crushed by the great shadow which has fallen upon their home. From every direction however, words of sympathy and regret have poured into the stricken home.

After funeral services at the house conducted by Rev. Samuel Edson, of Shrewsbury, and H. B. Martin, of Emanuel Protestant Episcopal churches, at one o'clock on Thursday, interment was made in Chester cemetery. The bearers were: David Clements, E. F. Perkins, Bertie Ireland, William A. Hyland, Jr., William Clark and Charles Jarman. Undertaker W. H. Krusen had charge of funeral arrangements.

Paul E., infant son of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Long, died at the residence of its grandfather, Mr. John Sweeney, at Kennedyville, on last Sunday evening, of cholera infantum, aged 10 months, 4 days. Funeral in charge of Undertaker W. H. Krusen, was held Wednesday morning at Kennedyville, M. P. Church, at 10 o'clock; interment at M. P. Cemetery.

John W. States, the eight-months-old son of Mr. and Mrs. George States, died last Saturday morning. Funeral was held Sunday afternoon; interment at Chester cemetery. Undertaker J. E. Ferguson had charge of funeral.

REED MEMORIALS ORDERED.

A Sufficient Amount Paid in And Subscribed to Purchase Handsome Stones.

The committee having in charge the proper marking of the grave of Gen'l Philip Reed and the scene of the Battle of Caulk's Field, are drawing their work to a gratifyingly successful termination. At a meeting on Tuesday contracts were placed with prominent Baltimore marble men, and as soon as possible the granite slab for the grave, and the granite marker for the battlefield will be ready to be put in place.

Granite was selected because of its superior power in resisting the inroads of weather and time. The monuments will be unexcelled with elaborate and appropriate ceremonies. The exact site for the battle marker has not as yet been definitely decided upon.

KICKED TO DEATH.

Mr. John W. Judefind Killed by His Horse At Rock Hall.

Mr. John W. Judefind, one of the oldest and most highly respected citizen of Rock Hall, lost his life under distressing circumstances, at about 7 o'clock on Tuesday evening.

Mr. Judefind had taken a mare over to Mr. B. H. Coburn's and was standing holding her with a long rein when one of Mr. Coburn's horses approached. The animal gave a vicious kick, at the horse planting her hoofs in her owner's stomach.

Mr. Judefind fell, was at once removed to his home and Dr. Selby summoned. The injury was at once recognized to be of a serious nature, but the injured man was made somewhat comfortable and it was hoped that it might not prove fatal. After lingering through the night the end came at 8 o'clock on Wednesday morning.

Mr. Judefind was one of the most prominent members of the Adventist church and an intelligent and enthusiastic expounder of its doctrines. In season and out of season he was loyal to his faith, and lost no opportunity to advance its cause.

For years past he had been one of the prominent members of the community in which he lived. A wife, a Miss Bruff before marriage, and six children survive him. The children are: Joseph, Mary, Charles, Gertie, Thomas and Edgar.

REMEMBERS TRACY.

The Western Desperado at One Time in Still Pond.

Edward Tracy, the outlaw who is leading the officers in the west a puzzling chase, was ten years ago doing business at Still Pond. Tracy and a fellow convict escaped from the Oregon penitentiary about two weeks ago.

He then had two murders to his credit and has since added seven others, swelling his unenviable record of murders to nine. The desperado's movements in evading escape have disclosed a skill and daring almost without a parallel in criminal history. Several of his pursuers have been shot to death, the fellow who escaped with him he killed, and the blood hounds used in running him down, were rendered useless by the use of red pepper in his tracks.

Ten years ago Tracy came to Still Pond, rented a room from Mr. George W. Harper, and opened a barbering establishment. Until recently the letters E. T. remained to recall the former presence of the outlaw in the village.

Judge J. F. Harper said on Wednesday, that he distinctly remembered Tracy, but could discover no resemblance in the pictures published in the newspapers to the outlaw who conducted the hair cutting and shaving parlors at Still Pond ten years ago. Tracy was among the first barbers who ever did business in the little village, and his patronage was small. All at once the fellow left town taking with him the razors of his patrons and all other articles which he could easily handle.

SPORT ON THE BRIDGE.

Big Catches of Small Fish From Chester Bridge.

Sport from Chester bridge has been unusually fine during the present month. Though the perch caught have, as a rule been rather under than above the average, size the freedom with which the fish have taken the bait has insured great sport.

A novel innovation was made one evening this week, in the form of a contest between Miss Mary Rogers, Miss Josephine Wickes and Miss Ethelind Christfield. Miss Rogers drew out three perch before her competitors caught one. Master Norman Crouch succeeded in catching seven dozen fish in a short time this week.

Dr. D. L. Greenfield has of course been numbered with the successful fishermen, and is frequently found at his post.

Messrs. Clinton Moody, W. H. Lambert, Jr., and J. W. Dyer, have made fine catches. Mr. Harry Brice, from Philadelphia, has joined the ranks during his summer holiday and has made some of the heaviest catches of the season.

Robinson, the colored "crab man," caught a 12-pound turtle on his trot-line, while fishing for crabs this week. A 16-inch rock caught by Mr. George Byron is the finest rock caught off the bridge this season. Messrs. John K. Aldridge, Dr. D. L. Greenfield, William R. and John H. Aldridge, and Capt. Thomas Storke, left on Tuesday night for a fishing trip down the Chester; Kent Narrows and other points will be visited.

MACHINING ACCIDENT.

Mr. D. K. Nickerson Will Probably Lose a Leg.

A serious machining accident occurred on the threshing yard of Mr. Allie Pierce, near Black's station, on Wednesday, by which Mr. D. K. Nickerson will probably lose his left leg.

The particulars of the accident are, that Mr. Nickerson went on top of the threshing machine which had gotten out of gear. Near the big cylinder which revolves with terrific speed was a board which is movable for the purpose of furnishing an opening into the machinery at that point. This board was not in place; Mr. Nickerson put his foot on it and in an instant the teeth of the cylinder were lacerating the flesh and crushing the bones of the foot and ankle. The bone of the lower leg was crushed, the flesh was cut, the heel was nearly severed from the foot, several other bones were crushed and great gashes cut in the fleshy part of the lower leg and foot. The injured man was hurried to the office of Dr. Barwick, at Kennedyville, where he was treated by Drs. Barwick and Kelley. Dr. Kelley accompanied Mr. Nickerson to a Baltimore hospital where he is under treatment.

Mr. Nickerson is 42 years old, is a widower and has four children, the oldest being 17 and the youngest ten years of age. He is a brother of Mr. C. W. Nickerson. The probabilities are that he will lose his leg as a result of the accident.

CROP NOTES.

Some Disappointments But as a Rule Crop Results Good.

While in some instances wheat yields have been disappointing, as a rule, all things considered, results have been gratifying and in some cases surprisingly large.

Mr. Alonzo Foreman, living on the farm near Tolchester recently sold by Mr. G. Wash Skirven to Mrs. Francis, is one of the exceedingly fortunate ones. His average yield was 36 bushels from 20 acres seeded.

Mr. G. Wash Skirven got an average of 32 bushels from a large acreage on his Tulp Forest farm.

Mr. Jacob Schirley, on the Poplar Neck farm of Mr. George D. Lyland, threshed 32 bushels per acre from his 50 acre seeding.

Mr. Thomas Matthew's fine Avery rig threshed 2050 bushels of wheat in one day on the yard of Mr. George W. Rash. The rig was sold by Mr. A. S. Turner, and Mr. Turner bought Mr. Rash's crop at 75 cents per bushel. Mr. Rash got an average of 20 bushels per acre.

A splendid rain fell at Chestertown on Tuesday afternoon. At Fairlee there was considerable hail, but no damage.

Mr. Biddle Hossenger received an average of 27 bushels of wheat per acre off 80 acres seeding.

Corn outlook is fine so far but there is ample time for drought and disaster.

Trucker Wm. H. Kirby on Tuesday shipped 60 baskets of fine tomatoes. This is the largest early shipment from this section.

RAILROAD MATTERS.

Meeting Held in Chestertown on Thursday.

Hon. H. M. McCulloch, of Elkton, Md., W. A. Comegys, Middletown, Del., E. R. Cochran, Wilmington, Del., and Wilmer Emory, Baltimore, representing the Kent and Cecil Light, Power and Railway Company, held a meeting on Thursday. An organization was effected, the entire field was talked over and all preliminaries perfected for a meeting in Chestertown on Tuesday next.

Mr. Emory stated that the affairs of the company were in entirely satisfactory condition, and give every assurance that should the commissioners accede to the requests of the gentlemen backing the movement for a trolley line to the bay the road will be built. Work will commence, he said, at the earliest possible date.

Hope H. Barroll Esqr., as local representative of the Kent county company, will formally represent the gentlemen who have given such satisfactory evidences of the boni fides of their proposition to build a road from Chester River to Tolchester and Rock Hall, before the commissioners on Tuesday.
