LOCAL MATTERS.

Will Build Residence.—Mr. W. S. Dunn, of Salem, N. J., has contracted with Mr. Walter T. Pippin for the erection of a residence on the Pennell farm. The building will be one of the most attractive and convenient farm residences in the vicinity. Contractor Pippin will commence work just so soon as the necessary materials can be gotten in place.

Improved Mail Service.—Commencing on Thursday of this week, the patrons of all postoffices along the line of the Baltimore and Delaware Bay Railroad are to enjoy improved mail facilities. On the afternoon train, as well as the morning train, there has been placed a postal agent who distributes all mail to the different points. This increased convenience will be particularly felt in Chestertown. It is now possible to send to or receive letters from all local offices in the afternoon.

St. Swithen's Day.—A drenching shower, and incidentally a fair sprinkle of hail at 4 o'clock on Tuesday, caused a drop in the temperature, and, if the legend of St. Swithen is to be believed, potens rain for the next 40 days. On the contrary, had St. Swithen's been fair the next 40 days would have been of the most sunshiny variety. The legend is as old as the hills and has had many hard knocks, but in the State of Maryland there is no inconsiderable number of persons who have an abiding faith in St. Swithen.

What Will They do With it?—The sprinkler equipment is here, a hot air engine, the tank, the pump, and the Chester river ho'ds out its abundance of water for street-sprinkling purposes, and still, except when nature sends down her showers, the citizens of Chestertown are smothered in clouds of lung-filling dust. The question is, what will the commissioners do with our new equipment? Col. Vannort says that the great stumbling block now in the way is the impossibility of securing someone to operate the sprinkler. This obstacle they hope to be able to overcome at an early date.

Real Estate Sales.—Auctioneer John H. Greenwood, on Tuesday, sold for Lewin W. Wickes, Esq., assignee of Mortgage, the lot in Betterton, on which Hotel Wilmer stood before it was destroyed by fire nearly two years ago. Mr. Alexander Mair, at one time proprietor of the Chesapeake House, Betterton, was the purchaser at \$325. Mr. George B. Westcott on Wednesday sold to Mr. George Henry Watts his 50 acre farm near town, for \$2,000. Mr. Harry Bamberger, of Millington, has purchased the B. F. Moore farm in Queen Anne's county, near Church Hill, for \$1,600. The farm contains 60 acres.

A Pleasant Excursion.—The excursion to Rehoboth on Thursday, was in every way a success. The day, though somewhat warm, was rendered comfortable by a strong breeze, the ocean was in most pleasant mood and extended to the jolly bathers a most cordial welcome. The excursionists numbered nearly 375, one hundred and eighty having gotten on at Chestertown. Church Hill sent down a strong delegation, while accessions were made at Quaker Neck, Bookers and Bogles. The arrangements were perfect, both the boat and rail service being prompt, and all that could have been desired. Mr. Allan Harris, Dr. C. P. Gilpin and Mr. J. K. Brown, of the committee, accompanied the party and did much to add to the pleasure and comfort of those on the trip.

An Interesting Case.—An interesting case was heard in Justice Melvin's court on Saturday involving a town ordinance. By an ordinance passed by the town commissioners, no hogs are allowed within the limits of Chestertown. A custom has grown up, however, to allow hogs within the corporate limits of the town between October 1, and May 1. Mr. Joseph Walters refused to remove his hogs, but locked them in his stable. The town officers discovered the hogs and Mr. Walters was duly fined. He positively refused to pay this fine and suit was entered for its collection, and Justice Melvin decided in favor of the commissioners. Mr. Walters declares that the town authorities have exceeded their authority and purposes to test the matter.

An Invalid Porker.—The officials at the Tolchester Steamboat Company's pier, Baltimore, have been nursing a sick pig for several days past. The animal was sent to the city one day last week by J. W. Robinson, of Betterton, to be offered for sale. It became ill with an illness peculiar to the swine species, and has not yet been deemed into proper shape to be put upon the market. The company's officials have been in some perplexity as to what to do with it. They have been keeping it in a pen on the wharf during the daytime, and at night have been reduced to allowing it the freedom of the office, where the invalid porker keeps watch and ward over its keepers and valuables. The clerk at the wharf, if not an elephant, at least a pretty stout hog on their hands.

Big Peach Shipments.—The Baltimore Sun of Wednesday said: The steamers Emma Ford and Gratitude, of the Chester River Line, brought 10,000 baskets of peaches to Baltimore yesterday from Chester river landings, and it is expected that from now on the shipments will be heavy, as the crop on the Eastern Shore is reported to be good. The peaches were of good quality for early fruit.

Baseball Talk.—The prospects are that Chestertown will be in line with the fever of the baseball enthusiasts within the next few weeks. Sudlersville and Centerville are the centres of interest now, and Chestertown lovers of the sport desire to get within the circle. But for the fact that Centerville has four games scheduled for next week and could not possibly give the desired dates, Chestertown would have placed a strong team in the field this week. The probabilities are that if dates can be arranged within a reasonable time with Centerville Chestertown will make a fight with Centerville and possibly with Capt. George's Sudlersville team, for honors on the diamond.

Dividends Declared.—The three Chestertown banks give evidence of prosperity. The Directors of the Second National Bank, at their meeting on Wednesday, July 16, declared a semi-annual dividend of 3 per cent. clear of taxes (payable July 19) and carried \$2,085 to the undivided profit account. The stockholders of the Kent County Savings Bank, have declared a semi-annual dividend of 3 per cent. and carried \$1,166 to undivided profits. The Chestertown National has declared a semi-annual dividend of three per cent. and carried \$1,830.30 to undivided profits.

Electric Current Unusually Active This Season.

So far this summer, the damage from lightning has been unusually widespread and destructive. During the storm of Tuesday afternoon lightning struck and killed a hog belonging to Mr. Joseph S. Trew, Jr. The animal was insured in the Royal through the agency of Joseph N. Wheatley & Co. During a recent storm a bolt ran down the chimney of a Piney Neck home, split the chimney and set fire to a bed. The family was badly scared but no member was injured.

A bolt knocked the gable out of the 15x30 feet home of Mr. Heinefelt, near Rock Hall. The plastering was knocked from the room in which the children were preparing to go to bed.

THURSDAY'S QUOTATIONS.

Wheat—The arrivals of southern wheat today were more liberal and the market at the opening weak and lower, although demand was active from all classes of buyers. Sales of cargoes on grade at 74 cents for No. 2 red, 73 1/2 for steamer 2 red, and 69 1/2 cents for rejected. Bag lots by sample brought 73, 74, 75 and 76 cents, as to quality and condition. Later: One cargo steamer No. 2 red brought 74 cents. Market 1/2 cent firmer at close.

Receipts today of new southern wheat, 75,632 bus.; same day last year, 32,001 bus. Receipts so far this season, 1,065,056 bus.; same time last year, 470,602 bus. Extreme range of prices today, 73@76 cents; same day last year, 62@76.

CORN—Receipts for today, 10,271 bus., viz., 884 bus. southern and 9,437 western. Shipments from elevators, 986 bus. Stock in elevators, 14,577 bus. The prices being realized for the small bag lots of corn daily offered furnish no guide as to what round lots would really bring. The offerings this morning consisted of a few bag parcels which sold at 73 cents for white and 71 cents for yellow, but cargoes would not draw this much. Demand slow at the moment. Cob Corn is unsettled and easy with demand slow for car lots and supplies freer. Quote carloads prime yellow on spot at \$3.75 per bbl.

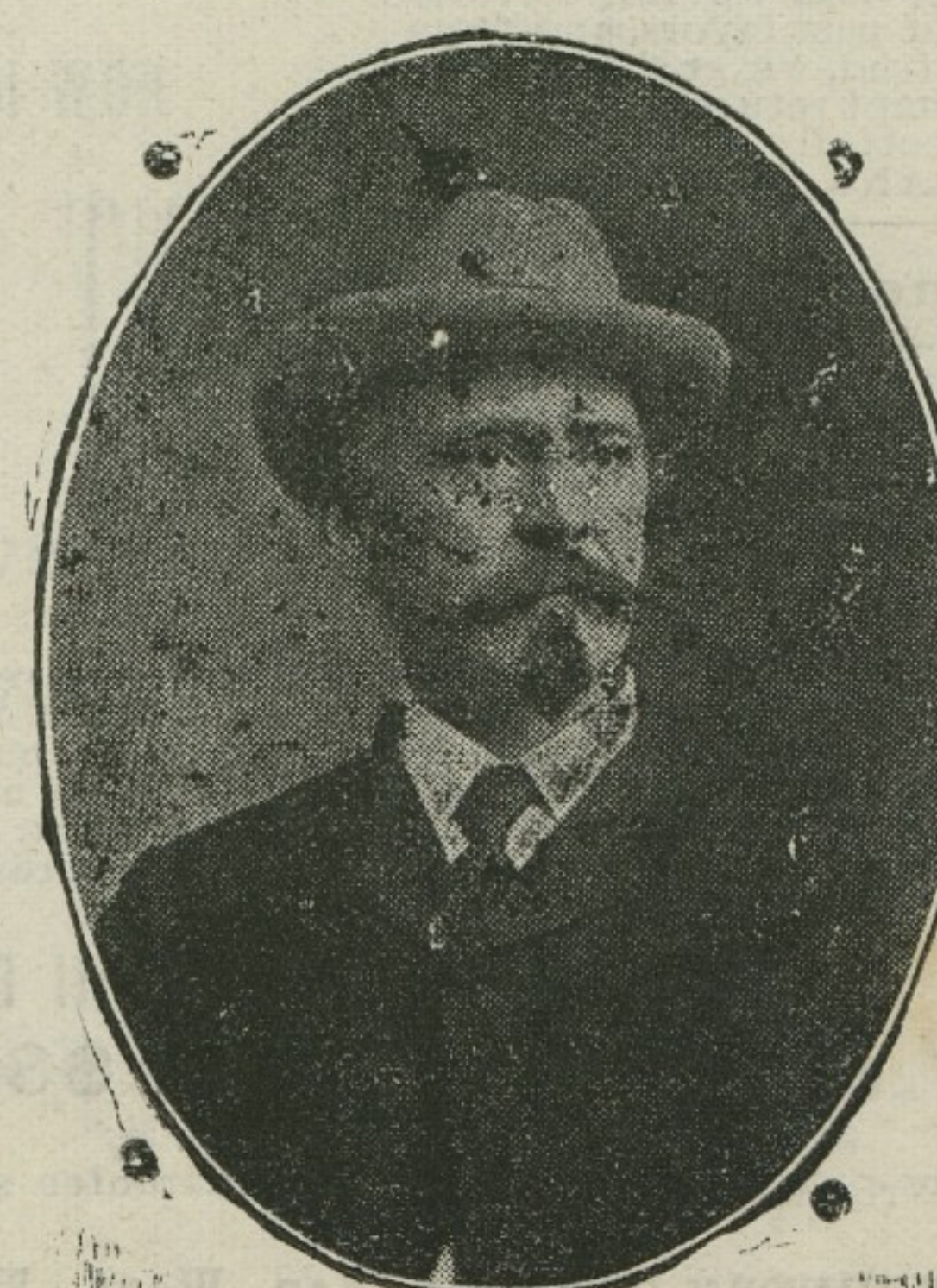
