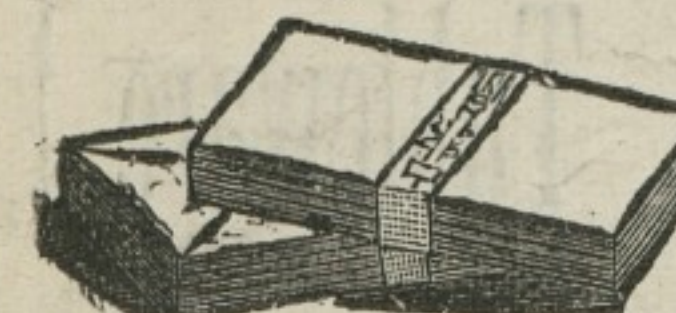

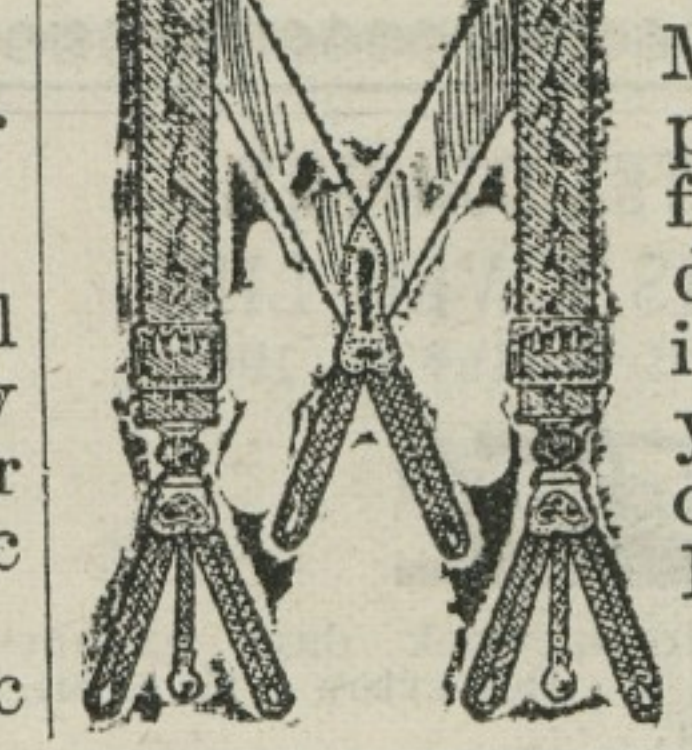

W. C. T. U. NOTES.

The W. C. T. U. of Kennedyville held its regular monthly meeting on Thursday evening of last week, in the M. P. Church. With Mrs. Annie R. GALENA NEWS.

Live News From a Live and Interesting Section.

The excursion from Fredericktown to Toledo on steamer Sasquatch today, was most enjoyable. Nearly 500 persons from upper Cecil and Kent counties spent the day at the beach. The Galena Brass Cornet Band, in full uniform, and the Dewey Park Orchestra were engaged by the charterers to enliven the excursion. Music and dancing formed one of the pleasant features of the day. A party left earlier on steamer Kitty Knight to take sterner Susquehanna at Betterton, at 8:45 A. M., bound for Rehoboth Beach.

Big wheat threshing! Who can beat it? The threshing rig purchased by Mr. B. J. McGowan from Mr. Robert Wilson, late of Galena, by F. A. McCauley, manager, threshed out from noon July 2 to noon July 17, inclusive, over 10,000 bushels of wheat. Of this amount, 4,500 bushels were threshed out for B. J. McCauley in less than three days. On Thursday afternoon, July 10, 900 bushels of wheat were threshed at the latter's place in 5 1/2 hours, the average yield there being 32 bushels per acre on fallow and stalk ground; wheat weighing 62 lbs. per bushel. This machine lost five days on account of rain and moving to different farms, exclusive of Sundays intervening. This rig is a 15-horse power Birdsall Traction Engine, Stevens' thresher, with stacker for straw, instead of blower, and has several years service. If upper Kent is short on fruit, it is long on cereals, wheat yielding beyond expectations. Corn most promising at this writing.
