ETERNITY.

A Little-Known Poem by John Greenleaf
Whittier.

"This poem was written by Mr. Whit-
tier in 1831, and was printed in the *New*
England Review, which paper he was
then editing. It was never collected,
and I have never seen it copied. It was
signed 'Adrian,' as were many of his
early poems."—S. T. Pickard. This is
the note used in the *Independent*, from
which the poem is now taken:

Boundless Eternity! the winged sands
That mark the silent lapse of flitting time
Are not for thee: thine awful empire stands
From age to age, unchangeable, sublime;
Thy domes are spread where thought can
never climb.

In clouds and darkness, where vast pillars
rest,
I may not fathom thee: 'twould seem a
crime
Thy being of its mystery to divest,
Or boldly lift thine awful veil with hands un-
blest.

Thy ruins are the wrecks of systems; suns
Blaze a brief space of ages, and are not;
Worlds crumble and decay, creation runs
To waste—then perishes and is forgot;
Yet thou, all changeless, heeded not the
blow of time.

Heaven speaks once more in thunder; empty
space
Trembles and wakes; new worlds in ether
flit,
Teeming with new creative life, and trace
Their mighty circles, such as others shall dis-
place.

Thine age is youth, thy youth is hoary age.
Ever beginning, never ending thou
Bearest inscribed upon thy ample page,
Yesterday, forever, but as now
Thou art, thou hast been, shalt be: though
I feel myself immortal when on thee I
muse, I shrink to nothingness, and bow
Myself before thee, dread Eternity,
With God coeval, coexisting, still to be.

I go with thee till Time shall be no more,
I stand with thee on Time's remotest verge.
Ten thousand years, ten thousand times told
O'er;
Still, still with thee my onward course I
urge;
And now no longer hear the endless surge
Of Time's light billows breaking on the shore
Of distant earth: no more the solemn
dirge—
Requiem of worlds, when such are numbered
o'er—
Steals by: still thou art moving on forever-
more.

From that dim distance would I turn to gaze
With fondly searching glance upon the spot
Of brief existence, where I met the blaze
Of morning, bursting on my humble cot;
And gladness whispered of my happy lot;
And now 'tis dwindled to a point—a speck—
And now 'tis nothing, and my eye may not
Longer distinguish it amid the wreck
Of worlds in ruins, crushed at the Almighty's
beck.

Time—what is Time to thee? a passing
thought
To twice ten thousand ages—a faint spark
To twice ten thousand suns; a fibre wrought
Into the web of infinitesimal
Balanced against a world! we hardly mark
Its being—even its name hath ceased to be;
Thy wave hath swept it from us, and thy
dark
Mantle of years in dim obscurity
Hath shrouded it around; Time—what is
Time to thee.

THE QUEEN CAROLINE READY.
Completion of a New 16-knot Day Excursion
Steamer for the Queen Anne Line.

The new steamer Queen Caroline has
been completed by the Baltimore Ship-
building and Drydock Company, and
was delivered on Tuesday of last week.

The new vessel is named after Caro-
line county, and is for the Queen Anne
Ferry and Equipment Company, Edward
Stabler, Jr., president. She will run in
the service of the Queen Anne Railroad
between Rehoboth, Del., and Cape May.

The vessel is a steel propeller 200 feet
long and 31 feet beam. She has a
depth of hold of twenty feet and
draws 9 feet of water. She has four
boilers and triple expansion engines to
develop 1,300 horse-power and a speed
of 16 knots an hour. The vessel will ac-
commodate 800 to 1,000 day passengers
and is to go into commission in July.

The saloon deck is decorated in white
and gold. The vessel has 600 electric
lights. Among other up-to-date fittings
will be a steam steering gear, dumbwait-
ers to the dining saloon, a newspaper
stand and a searchlight. As she is a day
boat she has but six staterooms and a
director's room. The vessel was the
first to be launched by the firm that suc-
ceeded the Columbian Iron Works.

The completion of the Queen Caroline
reflects great credit on the shipbuilders
who have succeeded in constructing a
splendid craft in a very short space of
time. She was launched May 13 and had
to be delivered by July 1.
