

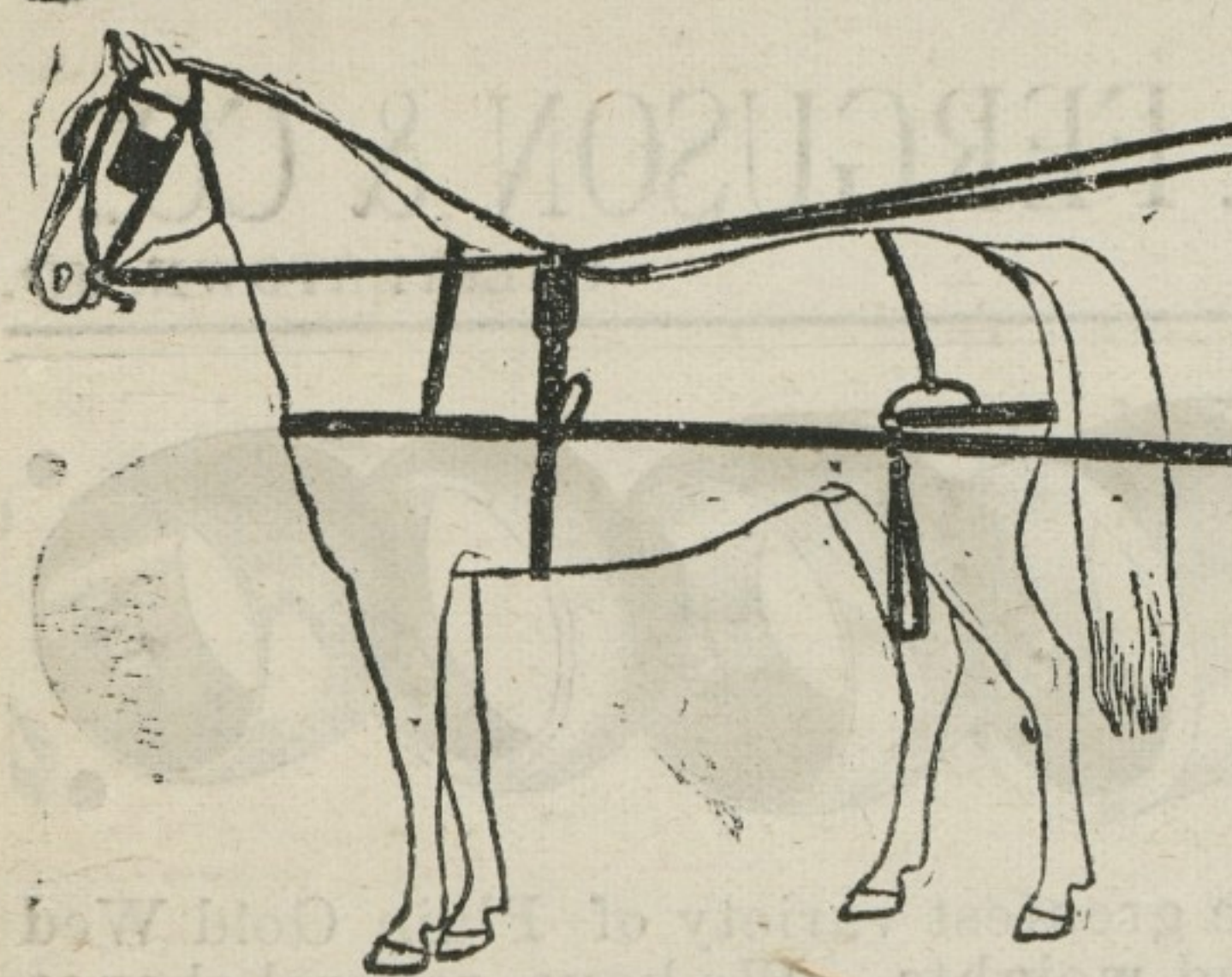

STORM VICTIMS FOUND.

A Long Search at Tolchester Ends in Finding the Two Bodies.

The bodies of James P. Post and Theodore C. Parker, who were drowned near Tolchester Beach, on Sunday, were found on Wednesday by Capt. John R. Mills and the crew of the yacht Ivanhoe, and carried to Baltimore. That of Mr. Parker was found at about 9.45 A. M. in a pound net about a mile and a half north of the Tolchester pier and about a mile off shore. That of Mr. Post was discovered at 4.45 P. M. about a mile straight out from the pier at the resort. It is thought that the Louise helped to bring it to the surface in the wide sweep she made in landing.

The body of Mr. Parker was carried to the city on the Louise and that of Mr. Post on the Ivanhoe. Both were taken in charge by Undertaker E. Madison Mitchell. The funerals were held as soon as the arrangements could be made. Col. W. H. Parker, of Deadwood, S. D., father of one of the young men, came to Baltimore.

That the search for Mr. Post's body was not continued indefinitely was due to a fortunate accident. Captain Miller noticed a speck out in the path of the Louise, leveled his glasses upon it and was sure it was the body. It was floating face downward, with the tide. Had it passed outward there is no telling when it would have been found.

Besides the father of Mr. Post, there were at the beach the four survivors of the party—Messrs. Frank W. and Robert Heslop, D. F. Griffith and James S. Morrow; Dr. Luther Parsons and Messrs. Edward Noble and Julius W. Stewart, of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad.

All expressed the highest praise of the work of Captain Mills, Mate E. E. Monsell and Engineer Stephen Hill, of the Louise. Coroner Enoch Roland, of Chestertown, was notified of the finding of Parker's body, and with Dr. W. Frank Hines at once proceeded to Tolchester. Dr. Hines made an examination of the body on the yacht. The face was badly eaten by crabs but there was no difficulty in identifying the body. After learning the details of the drowning, no coroner's inquest was considered necessary and a certificate of accidental drowning was made out.

PARTICULARS OF DROWNING. Swallowed up by a huge wave before the eyes of their friends is the fate of the two young men while out rowing off Tolchester during the Sunday storm. The victims were:

James B. Post, 21 years old, of 1116 Bolton street.

Theodore C. Parker, 20 years old, 2019 St. Paul street, Baltimore.

In company with James S. Morrow, Jr., of North Calvert street; Lee A. Griffith, of Arlington; Frank M. and R. G. L. Heslop, of 24 East Twentieth street, the young men went down to the beach on the steamer Louise in the morning, in the hope of finding relief from the heat. Shortly after landing it was proposed that the two go swimming. Clothes were hastily pulled off, trunks donned, and the party hired a rowboat from which to dive.

After spending some little time in diving near the shore, the party set out for Foote's Island. Several times before they had taken this trip and the undertaking was little thought of.

About two-thirds the distance had been traversed when a dark cloud was noticed in the west. R. G. L. Heslop, who was sitting at the stern of the boat, advised that they turn back. His wishes were complied with, but scarcely had they gone half the distance before the storm was on them. The boat was headed direct for the shore, but when the storm struck her she was turned about to face the wind and a noble effort was made to keep the bow pointed to the westward.

It was while thus laboring that a mighty wave as large as those seen on the ocean struck the boat. It was completely enveloped for a minute; then as the water subsided it was seen that Post and Parker went with it. No trace of them could be found. A minute later the vessel was overturned and the others had all they could do to save themselves.

All four clung tightly to the boat, and, though almost completely exhausted, were able to float towards the shore. For nearly half an hour they clung to the vessel, and when about 100 yards from the shore were picked up by a fisherman in a small steam launch.

The accident occurred about 3 o'clock about a mile from shore, which, on account of the waves and the rain, it was impossible to distinguish. Post and Parker were picked up by a fisherman in a small steam launch.

The survivors of the party went up on the steamer, and R. G. L. Heslop was chosen to break the news to the parents of the victims. Before going to their homes he stopped at the Central Police Station to ask the aid of the department in finding the bodies of the victims. Mr. Heslop was terribly affected by the accident and was extremely nervous while telling of his experience to Lieutenant Fulen.

"We never saw them after that wave struck the boat," said he, "and it seemed as though it swept them out of the boat. It was a terrible moment and we had all we could do to cling to save ourselves."

The parents of the young men were greatly affected when they heard of the accident. Young Post was the son of William E. Post, claim agent of the Baltimore and Ohio Railroad, at Camden Station, and held a position as clerk, while Parker was a bookkeeper. He was a South Dakotan by birth, but had been a resident of Baltimore about seven years.

OTHER DROWNINGS. Baltimore was the center of a storm which resulted in the death of 10 persons, the injury of others, unroofed 200 houses, seriously damaged shipping in the harbor, almost entirely severed telegraphic communication with the outside world, destroyed many magnificent trees, seriously interfered with street-car service in places, damaged the city's electric light facilities, caused the death of several horses and other animals by tearing down live wires, and generally wrecked more destruction than any storm which has visited Baltimore city in years.

Mrs. Mary E. Schouler, wife of Michael Schouler, and her son Charles, 7 years old; daughter Olive, 3 years old, and baby, ten months old, were drowned near the Lazaretto lighthouse while returning from Rock Creek with Mr. Schouler in a sailboat.

Royal Bateman, 12 years old, Joseph Kage, 11 years old, and John Kane, 6 years old, were drowned in the harbor by the overturning of their rowboat.

Thomas Carroll, 13 years old, was also drowned in the harbor. Charles W. Shafer, 16 years old, was killed by stepping on a live wire blown down by the storm.

Wm. Cornish, colored, 25 years old, was killed, and three other colored persons injured, by a large tree being blown down upon a tent in Paradise Grove, on the Franklin road, in which Ebenezer African Methodist Episcopal Church was holding a religious meeting.

Maurice T. Small and Harry C. Appel, of Baltimore, were drowned while bathing near Bozman, in Talbot county.
